Congressional.

A prophecy that the ore held by the United States Steel Corporation would be exhausted within 25 or 30 years and that the natural resources of the far west would be utilized was made Friday before the House steel trust committee, by Joseph Sellwood, an ore expert, who says he has secured the North American continent in search of merchantable ore.

President Taft has decided to submit to congress a plan to place the Panama canal under the jurisdiction of the navy department. This decision is in line with the original object of the administration to transport fleets quickly from ocean to ocean. Through giving the control to the navy department the administration believes this can be accomplished better than in any other way.

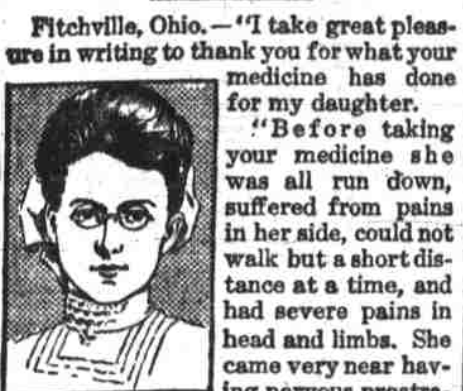
At scathing denunciation of the house committee on expenditures in the interior department was delivered Friday by Mann of Illinois, the minority leader. He charged that Graham of Illinois, chairman of the committee, had permitted a woman lobbyist, known by him to be in the employ of persons pressing claims before the committee, to shape legislation. Mrs. Helen Pierce Gray, of Minnesota, was the woman named by Mann. He charged that for three months she had occupied a desk in the office of the commissioner of Indian affairs on the strength of her relations with the house committee.

The foreign affairs committee of the house recorded themselves in favor of the Sulzer bill for American owned embassies and legations abroad.

The house resumed debate on the postoffice appropriation bill and was in session until 11 p. m.

Political.

F. C. Lowery, before the senate finance committee, repudiated the statement that refiners would derive all the benefit from the free sugar bill.

A bill authorizing the state to engage in all kinds of industrial pursuits in competition with private capital, was passed by the lower house of the Arizona legislature Friday by a vote of 21 to 14.

Governor Harmon, of Ohio, delivered a spirited address at Omaha Friday night in reply to criticisms of his public record and the assertion that he was a "reactionary." He resented as a slander the intimation that he stood for or permitted special privileges and declared the charge that he took part in the sale of government bonds while a cabinet officer was mere wantonness.

The child labor bill introduced in the Arizona senate gained many supporters Friday and leaders freely predicted its passage. The bill fixes the minimum age limit at 14 years.

Criticism contained in a statement by President Prince, of the New Jersey senate, concerning the action of Governor Wilson in vetoing a large number of bills, are answered by Wilson through his campaign headquarters.

He points out that only five days were available for the consideration of more than 150 bills and asserts the legislature deliberately arranged matters so he could not have more time to go over the measures.

Eastern. Mrs. Matilda Radloff, whose husband died at Cincinnati Friday after accusing her of shooting him, has made a confession. She met Radloff by appointment, he fired five shots at him, meantime raising her own voice, so that his cries for help might not be heard.

At the concluding session of the Episcopal house of bishops, held in New York, Rev. George Bellers, Jr., formerly of New Jersey, was elected Bishop of South Dakota, and Rev. Herman Page, of Chicago, was elected bishop of New Mexico.

The Intercollegiate Clivo league will submit to a referendum vote of its members through the country the proposal to admit women to equal membership. A vote favorable to the proposal will be regarded as a quasi endorsement of the suffrage movement, it is said.

A large mail order concern at Chicago has purchased life, accident and health insurance for 3000 employees under two policies. Each of the policies, one for life insurance and the other a health and accident contract, are the largest of the kind ever written. The life insurance totals \$4,000,000, the annual premium being approximately \$42,000.

The body of George E. Marsh, president of a soap manufacturing company at Lynn, Mass., was found Friday. There were five bullet wounds in the body. The police believe Marsh was murdered.

The First National bank of New Berlin, N. Y., which closed its doors Thursday, is more than \$300,000 short in funds, according to an estimate of the new cashier, transmitted to Controller Murray by National Bank Examiner Rorebeck.

Dr. Beattie Nesbitt, ex-president of the Farmers National bank, of Toronto, Canada, is in the custody of the United States government at Chicago, awaiting extradition proceedings on behalf of the Dominion on the charge of misappropriating the funds of the bank, resulting in the ruin of the institution.

Because of the refusal of the Oregon Short Line to submit to the railroad commission the complete annual report required by law, the commission has instructed the attorney general to bring proceedings against it.

Supplementary articles of incorporation have been filed by the Nehalem bank, increasing its capital stock from \$10,000 to \$30,000.

The long war was begun again in Chinatown at San Jose Friday afternoon. Bullets driven by smokeless powder, from small bore, high power rifles and big bore revolvers, crashed through the houses of whites and orientals for a few minutes in an attack on the Hip Sing Tong headquarters. Several Chinamen were wounded.

The Albany high school team won the debating contest Friday evening, defeating North Bend high school. The debate was held in North Bend and was largely attended. This decides the southern Oregon championship and the winners must contest for the state honors.

Mustaf Dikran, prince of Albania, a province of the Turkish empire, who has been in Portland, Seattle and Tacoma lecturing on conditions in the Turkish empire, was arrested Friday night at Puyallup by Chief Immigration Inspector Fulton, of the Tacoma bureau, on a warrant sent out from the department of commerce and labor at Washington, D. C. The nature of the charge against Prince Dikran is not known.

That men were being recruited in Los Angeles for service against President Cabrera of Guatemala, was the statement made by Colonel Alexis de Claremont, aide to the Guatemalan president, who stated that he was in Los Angeles investigating an alleged conspiracy to unseat Cabrera.

Harriet L. F. Devine has been sentenced to serve ten years in San Quentin for forging a will of the late Mary L. Swain, of Berkeley, disposing of an estate valued at \$40,000.

Harry Ashland, who shot and killed John Goffield at Stockton, Cal., after Mrs. Ashland confessed that she had been intimate with Goffield, has been found guilty of murder in the first degree. The jury recommended that a life sentence be imposed.

Ambassador Wilson of Mexico, has issued a formal denial of a report that various Americans had enrolled themselves with the British Embassy, counting on it for better support than their own country might give.

Dr. Sun Yat Sen soon will succeed Yuan Shi Kai as president of the Chinese republic, according to L. Berghois, United States consul at Canton, who arrived at San Francisco Friday from the Orient.

The Cuban government, which had been reproached for not receiving Secretary Knox with the honors due his high office, answered the critics Friday by making Mr. and Mrs. Knox the guests of honor at the most magnificent ball they have attended during their trip to the Latin-American republics.

Is it officially announced that the powers have made proposals of mediation to Constantinople with a view to bringing to an end the war between Turkey and Italy over Tripoli.

General Canova, commander in chief of the Italian army of occupation in Tripoli, has telegraphed that the Italian flag was planted Thursday on Bou Chermez, near the Tunisian frontier.

United States Consul Letcher, stationed at Chihuahua, is not the American consul as far as General Pascual Orozco, commander in chief of the rebel army, is concerned. General Orozco made this statement in the course of an interview Friday. He said that inasmuch as the United States government does not recognize the belligerency of the rebels, the latter cannot recognize him in his official capacity.
