

# FARM SCHOOL FOR PEOPLE OF JEWISH RACE SUCCESSFUL

Representative of Institution Located at Doyleston, Pa., Tells of Plans and Hopes of School.

A. H. Frommann of Philadelphia executive secretary of the National Farm school a Jewish institution located at Doyleston, Pa. is in Portland for a few days interesting the public in the school work, which is that of teaching farming scientifically and practically to men of the Jewish race.

Tomorrow evening Mr. Frommann, who is a former newspaper man will talk before the Portland lodge of I. O. O. F. B. and explain the plans of the school and tell of what has been accomplished since its establishment 13 years ago.

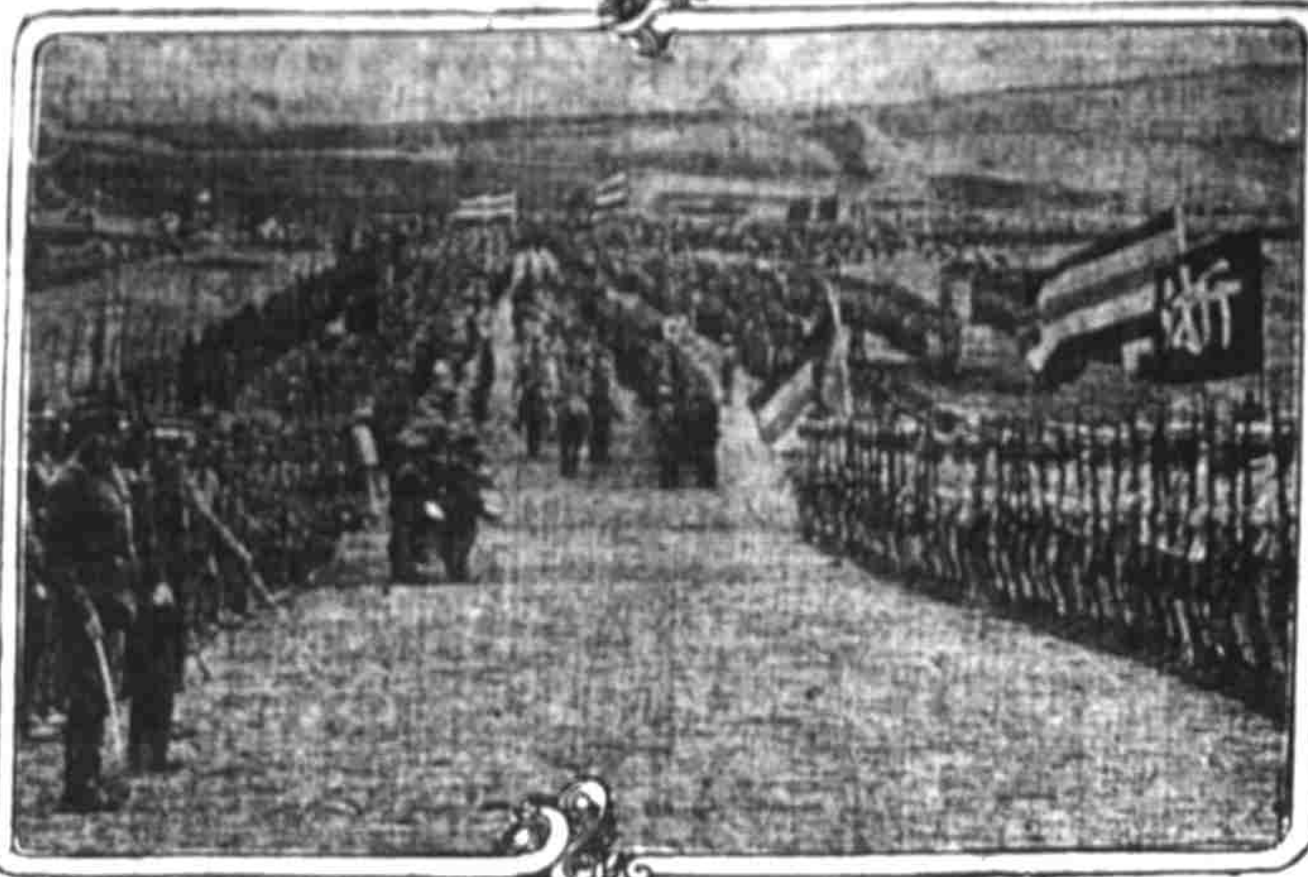
"Our school is a public institution," said Mr. Frommann yesterday, "and tuition is free. The course is four years and every branch of farming is taught with the object in view of making the students natural leaders in large colonization undertakings, which will have to be indulged in by the Jews of this country in order to break up the already existing ghettos and slums in the large cities of the east, and to prevent a duplication in the cities on the Pacific coast of the same frightful conditions that have resulted from a congestion on the Atlantic coast."

"This danger to the Pacific coast is decidedly more imminent than a great many people realize and will become acute as soon as the Panama canal is opened to traffic.

**Many Emigrants.** "Every transatlantic line that will start from a European port will bring the steamer full of emigrants. This class of business is now being stimulated by the agents of the various steamship companies, who are telling stories of the wonderful Pacific coast in every town, village and hamlet in Europe."

"The prospective emigrant is already familiar with conditions obtaining in the east and therefore lends a willing ear to the steamship booster, who talks Oregon, Washington and California. "Anyone acquainted with Jewish history knows that the Jews were originally an agricultural people and that it was only the long centuries of persecution, discrimination and prejudice which changed his original character and weaned him from his original vocation. But the desire to till the soil has always persisted with the Jew and thousands of Jewish immigrants in this

country have attempted agriculture in preference to working in the sweatshops or engaging in petty trade. That these attempts were not uniformly successful is due to the fact that a people which has forgotten how to farm needs to be taught, and the object of the National Farm school is to supply the necessary teachers.

**Four Hundred Acre Farm.** "The graduates of the National Farm school being of the same race and faith and having everything in common with the immigrant they are to teach, and understanding their psychology and their language, are more certain to lead these contemplated agricultural colonies to success than are teachers who are not Jews and who do not understand them."

"The school farm comprises 400 acres, and there are today 100 names on the official roster. From these 100 and others who will enter leaders of colonies will be drafted."

"In Utah, near the town of Gunnison, there is a prosperous colony led by four graduates of the school and it will not be long before this colony will blossom into a large community of excellent homes. It was originally started by a number of sweatshop workers who tired of city life and their surroundings, each one of them putting up

time for his share in the land that was purchased. Each was given a 40-acre tract. The money was a large amount but these attempts were not uniformly successful because small to them, because they have won their independence. After a short experience the colony sent to our school for a leader and later three more were added to assist them. The colony now has about 150 families.

A number of New England farms have been reclaimed by Jews and are now in flourishing condition. I mention this only to show the success that can be attained by educating the farmers in the forward to the soil movement."

(Special to The Journal) Vancouver, Wash., April 13.—Harriman officials, half a dozen of them, were in Vancouver yesterday in the persons of William McMurray, general passenger agent, A. C. Martin, assistant general passenger agent, J. H. McGrath, traveling passenger agent, and J. L. Miller, district passenger agent, and others. Further than to explain that they had long contemplated a trip to Vancouver, nothing could be learned from them concerning the object of their visit.

The Harriman interests own no property in Vancouver except a lease on the Northern Pacific tracks. That the officials were here to look over the holdings of the Washington-Oregon corporation, the controlling interest in which is claimed to have passed to their hands, is considered the most plausible reason for their presence here.

Officials of the local concern strenuously denied the story published recently that the controlling interest had passed to the Harriman line and that a road would be built from Vancouver to the sound, yet a survey was being made from Chehalis in Olympia and the grade is being thrown up.

The proposed line, it is contended, will be built from Ormston, the present terminus of the road, to connect with a line built this way from Chehalis and will cross the north fork of the Lewis river near Elton.

The officials were entertained by the usual club and driven about the city in automobiles.

# Dr. B. Earl Smith

For 14 months he was assistant surgeon of the O. R. & N. Co. lines, and since engaged in his profession.
