

MANY SURVIVORS INJURED OR MAD, NEWSPAPER SAYS

Story Purported to Come Direct From Carpathia, Printed in New York, Tells of Condition on Rescue Ship.

(Special to The Journal.)
New York, April 15.—Every newspaper here and news carrying association in this city is making frantic attempts to get some inkling of conditions aboard the Carpathia, the ship which is bringing the Titanic survivors to New York.

One morning newspaper prints a story, purported to come from the Carpathia, saying that many of the survivors were injured and that some of the women are insane. Two messages from the ship, however, say "All well."

Danger Not Realized.
The story published today says that the officers of the Titanic did not realize the vessel's danger, and sent out a wireless call of distress merely as a precautionary measure. When the danger was realized the boats were packed with women and children, and what was crowded in. Many were held back by the officers. Some of the women were actually dead. Some were in a weak state.

Then the story goes on to say that the sea was rough and that the survivors were drenched. The temperature of the air was but little above zero. Suffering was intense. The dynamo room was flooded and the boats were launched in darkness.

The Carpathia reported to the cruiser Chester that the Titanic had been proceeding slowly for hours, feeling her way among the icebergs. The survivors said that the berg that sent her to the bottom was almost upon her before it was sighted. Her bow was crushed and her bottom ripped out.

Not Told All Were Lost.
It is persistently reported here that the survivors aboard the Carpathia, many of them widows and relatives of the victims, have not been told that all of them were lost. The Titanic was drowned.

Friends of Captain Edward John Smith, master of the Titanic, say that the commander had said that the Olympic, the Titanic's sister ship, was not sufficiently equipped with life-saving apparatus to save all, in case the vessel sank. He had said that the Olympic did not have the vessel could be sunk and thought more life-saving equipment unnecessary.

Mrs. Henry B. Harris, wife of the theatrical producer, has "wireless" relatives here that she is "safe, on board the Carpathia." This message is taken to mean that her husband was drowned.

Bodies Will Not Rise.
Experts in physics here say that the bodies of the Titanic's victims will never rise to the surface. If once carried to the bottom by the ship, at a depth of two miles the pressure of the water is something like 6000 pounds to the square inch, far too great to be overcome by buoyancy. Changes in the ship itself have undoubtedly been wrought by the great pressure of the depths. The weight of the water has crushed in like paper all watertight or airtight compartments that remained intact when the vessel went down.

Arriving here from Hamburg, the Hamburg-American liner President Lincoln reported that on April 13 she entered a large field of ice, scattered with icebergs of all sizes. Her master said that the center of the field was near where the Titanic sank. Other arriving steamers report that the sea, 100 miles south of the known ice line, is dotted with bergs.

Vessels report a nasty sea outside last night.

Reports are current here that the Baltic picked up 25 of the Titanic's survivors. On Sunday night or Monday morning the Baltic should have been near where the Titanic foundered. No direct word has been received from her.

One woman, shrieking for her husband, sobbed and sobbed. The following statement was issued today by Mrs. Eleanor Smith, wife of Captain R. J. Smith of the liner Titanic, who went down with his ship.

"To my poor fellow sufferers: My heart overflows with grief for you. I am laden with sorrow for you and weighed down by this terrible burden which has been thrust upon us. I pray God He will comfort us all."

Nothing of a nature to give any hope has been received at the office of Kiehn, Wolf & Netter regarding Herman Kiehn and little doubt remains but that he perished when the liner sank. All of the friends and relatives of the people in the wreck are waiting anxiously for the arrival of the Carpathia.
