

### WARNING OF BERGS GIVEN TO TITANIC; NIGHT WAS CLEAR

### Parisian's Wireless Operator Tells of "Talking" to Jack Phillips Aboard White Star Ship Just Before Sinking.

Halifax, N. S., April 18.—The liner Parisian, one of the last vessels to communicate with the Titanic before the latter went down, arrived here today. Captain W. R. Haines and J. B. Sutherland, the Parisian's wireless operator, advised that last Sunday night was clear, and that the Titanic undoubtedly was making great speed when she collided with the iceberg.

If these statements are true—and they are backed up by other wireless communications received here—it explains the catastrophe. The Titanic must have struck the ice fine a fearful blow. Captain Haines declared that Captain Smith of the Titanic must have known all day Sunday that the largest iceberg seen in years were floating at least 100 miles south of the ordinary route.

The Parisian's wireless operator Sutherland says that the Titanic was 100 miles west of the Parisian and that he was in communication Sunday with Jack Phillips, the Titanic's wireless operator.

Know Phillips Well.

Sutherland said Jack Phillips well. I sent greetings to him Sunday and then sent a business message from Captain Haines to Captain Smith. I got the transport liner Mesaba, and reported having started huge icebergs. The Mesaba was running between the Titanic and Parisian, relaying my message regarding the icebergs to the Titanic. The weather was fine and we could see the bergs clearly on Sunday night.

Sutherland declared that his last communication with the Titanic was at 10:30 o'clock (ship's time) Sunday night. While Star officials declare the Titanic struck at 10:30 o'clock (New York time) or about an hour after the Parisian had talked with the Titanic.

The Parisian carried but a single wireless operator who had been at the key 14 hours when he sent the last message to the Titanic. He had spent the day trying to get assistance to the disabled tank steamer Deutschland. After sending his final message to the Titanic, Captain Haines ordered him to bed. He slept while the Titanic sent the "S. O. S." call.

Asks to Hear News.

When Sutherland awoke Monday morning he donned the wireless cap and the first message he caught was one from the operator aboard the Carpathia describing the Titanic's plunge into the water. The Parisian was helping, and Sutherland broke down over the news.

Asked if it was possible for an iceberg to lie so low in the water as to be invisible on a clear night, Captain Haines said:

"I never heard of an entirely submerged iceberg of sufficient size to wreck the Titanic."

Captain Haines admitted that he never saw a clearer April night than last Sunday when the Titanic struck the iceberg.

### CHARGES TONGUE WITH MISREPRESENTATION

Misrepresentation on the part of District Attorney Tongue, who is engaged in a struggle for reelection with A. W. Norblad of Astoria, is alleged by Mr. Norblad. This is in the district competing Clackamas, Washington, Clackamas and Clatsop counties.

Norblad claims paid advertisements of Tongue in which Tongue attempted to offset the Norblad fire by a general campaign. Norblad had said that an attorney of Astoria had not caused any extra expense for legal assistance. Tongue said that C. Fulton received \$400 for trying a case for the city of Astoria last March. Norblad reports by showing that Fulton was employed over a year before he became city attorney.

Replying to Tongue's statement that W. D. Fulton of Portland was employed to frame a new charter for Astoria while Norblad was city attorney, the latter responds that Fulton was retained for this purpose during the term of H. M. Brownell, his predecessor, whereas it was Tongue's deputy district attorney in Clatsop county.

Finally, Norblad points out that Tongue failed to perfect the appeal in the supreme court in the case of Macbeth against Columbia county, involving \$1000 in taxes, and the case was thrown out of court. Loss of a Clatsop tax case, in which Tongue was assisted by F. J. Taylor, under pay from the county, is also referred to, this being the case of Callender against ex-sheriff Pomeroy.

### WOMAN MUST PAY FOR PAVEMENT NOT LAID

"If I had known of this feature of the assessment I would not have signed the ordinance assessing the cost of improving Macadam street," said Mayor Rushlight today. "Hereafter I shall insist on all contracts being completed fully before I sign any measures which compel property owners either to pay cash or apply for the privilege of bonding to cover the cost of the assessment."

The mayor's remarks were made after he had heard a protest made by L. E. Thompson, representing Mrs. L. Zimmerman, a widow, who has been assessed nearly \$2000 for a pavement which has not yet been laid.

The Consolidated Contract company obtained the contract for the paving of Macadam street from Yakota street to Hamilton avenue. The work lacks 10 per cent yet of being finished, yet the council has passed an ordinance assessing the cost of the pavement at \$4,000. The contractor will not receive this amount in full until after the remaining portion of the improvement is done. But under the charter property owners who own lots abutting on the unfinished portion of the improvement must file an application to bond their property before the expiration of 10 days from the date the mayor signed the ordinance. Mrs. Zimmerman believes it is unjust to force her to apply for the bonding privilege before she has as yet been benefited a single iota—in other words, to arrange to pay for a pavement that has not been laid.
