"If I had known of this feature of the assessment I would not have signed the ordinance assessing the cost of improving Macadam street," said Mayor Rushlight today. "Hereafter I shall insist on all contracts being completed fully before I sign any measures which compel property owners either to pay cash or apply for the privilege of bonding to cover the cost of the assessment." The mayor's remarks were made after he had heard a protest made by L. E. Thompson, representing Mrs. L. Zimmerman, a widow, who has been as-sussed nearly \$2000 for a pavement which has not yet been laid. The Consolidated Contract company

obtained the contract for the paving of Macadam street from Dakota street to Hamilton avenue. The work lacks 10 per cent yet of being finished, yet the council has passed an ordinance assessing the cost of the pavement at \$64,000. The contractor will not receive this amount in full until after the remainin partian of the improvement is done. Bu under the charter property owners wh own lots abutting on the unfinishe portion of the improvement must fil an application to bond their propert before the expiration of 10 days from the date the mayor signed the ordinance Mrs. Zimmerman believes it is unjus to force her to apply for the bonding privilege before she has as yet been benefited a single lota-in other words to arrange to pay for a pavement that has not been laid.
