

### BIGAMIST ELUDES MANY OFFICERS

#### Man of Many Names and Many Wives Not Yet Arrested.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Oakland, Cal., April 18.—That "Dr. Milton Abraham," bigamist and forger, also known as "Dr. Harry Westwood Cooper" and as Ernest Moore Chadwick, used three aliases during his visit to London and changed his name every time he visited a new city, was learned here today in a telegram sent to Mr. and Mrs. Herman Milbrath of Oakland, parents of Miss Anna Milbrath, Abraham's sixth wife of record, with whom he fled to England from this city. Abraham fled for not apprehending him, saying that he should have been arrested a New York weeks ago. He predicts difficulty in capturing the elusive bigamist.

### ATTORNEY GENERAL FAVORS CONFERENCE

(United Press Leased Wire.) Salem, Or., April 18.—In reply to a request made by the state board of canal commissioners that Attorney General Crawford take proper action to protect the interests of the state and receive any money that might be due it in connection with the sale of the Oregon City locks, the attorney general has advised the canal commissioners that a conference should be held by the representatives of the state, of the federal government and the canal company to determine the rights of each interest before any money be paid over. He suggests that an agreement might be made by which \$200,000, which is the amount of equity the attorney general contends the state school fund has in the canal and locks, could be placed in bank, subject to decision of the courts as to whether it should be paid into the school fund or to the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, which now has title to the canal.

### "THE FAUN" PROVES TO BE PLEASING COMEDY

Witnessed by a small but appreciative audience, William Faversham opened a three night's engagement at the Irving theatre last night, with the most novel of comedies entitled "The Faun," by Edward Knoblauch, in which the artist shows himself in a role different from any in which he has appeared here before. In the quality of an embodied immortal, Faversham is introduced to ultra-polite society of London and it is in his adventures while posing as an Italian prince that an opportunity is given for many subtly humorous passages. He proves to be an influence for good among those with whom he has been thrown and gradually softens hearts that have heretofore been hardened to real love through contact with a selfish world. Two stage settings which were apparently thoroughly appreciated by the audience were a thunder storm in the second act and a sunrise in the third just before the "Faun" returns to his beloved woodland, which he does after unting the hearts of those intended for one another. Little more could be asked for in the supporting cast, which was headed by the charming actress, Miss Julia Opp, and each and every one contributed their share to the piece. The engagement ends Saturday night.

### WOMAN IDENTIFIES BLOODSTAINED RAZOR

A blood stained razor, a keen edged vegetable knife, and a sharp hatchet are mute evidence of the instruments by which Seid Bing, the canny foreman, met his death last October, at the hands of the "highlanders," Wong Si Sam and Low Soon are on trial in the circuit court for the crime, which is now conceded to have been committed by order of the Hop Sing tong over O-Sen, a fair Chinese woman member of the great secret society. O-Sen has testified that the two accused men committed the crime. She identified the blood stained cut-throat razor, which she says she found in the trunk in which the body was found and the clothes found in the trunk. The little woman has not only told on the two defendants or "hatchet men," as they are called among the Chinese, but she has related many secrets of the Hop Sing, the most powerful and warlike tong in the Chinese tongue. For this information O-Sen declares the Hop Sing will kill her. She will not be alone at any time, day or night. She told yesterday of how the Hop Sing made up purses to protect members who take life, how the lives of objectionable members are declared forfeited, and how the life of Seid Bing, her best friend, was taken by the tong. The state has rested its case, and the defense will begin Saturday morning.

### WHOLE PRIMARY BOARD OF SILETZ PRECINCT IS MISSING; SOME ARE WITNESSES; 1 SHOT

(Special to The Journal.) Newport, Or., April 18.—A remarkable condition of affairs in the Siletz precinct has grown out of the numerous shooting escapades there the last month. Forty witnesses were subpoenaed and taken to Portland this week. They include the whole election board for today's primary election with one exception, but the exception is Scott Lane, who has three bullet wounds received in the last mixup. Were it not that this is the quietest election the county has ever had, the absence of the 40 voters out of the Siletz precinct would have precipitated a real hot campaign all over the county. This precinct has been used ever since the Indians were enfranchised to "tip the balance." Any man who could split the rest of the county and then corral the Indian vote always won out. When the Indians were numerically stronger, some years ago this district saw some interesting and often amusing clashes between stump speakers for some of the state officers.

### NEHALEM, OR., BANK PRESIDENT FORGETS TO TELL FOR WHICH OFFICE HE IS A CANDIDATE

(Special to The Journal.) Tillamook, Or., April 18.—The political dilemma of Frank A. Rowe, a candidate for the Republican nomination for the state legislature, is unique. Mr. Rowe, who is president of the Nehalem Valley bank at Nehalem, consented to run for the nomination as joint representative from Tillamook and Yamhill counties. The decision was reached too late to present a petition and have his name printed on the ballot. Therefore it was determined to address a letter to the voters urging their support for Mr. Rowe and requesting them to write his name into the ballot. The letter was written and sent and then it was discovered that it failed to mention the office Mr. Rowe sought. As many county officials and federal officers are to be nominated beside the state ticket, there is some speculation among Mr. Rowe's acquaintances as to what office he will get.

### New School Superintendent.

(Special to The Journal.) Hood River, Or., April 18.—Professor J. O. McLoughlin was selected to be superintendent of the city schools for the next year to take the place of E. E. Coad, resigned. Professor L. B. Gibson, a high school teacher, has been appointed to fill Professor McLoughlin's place as principal.

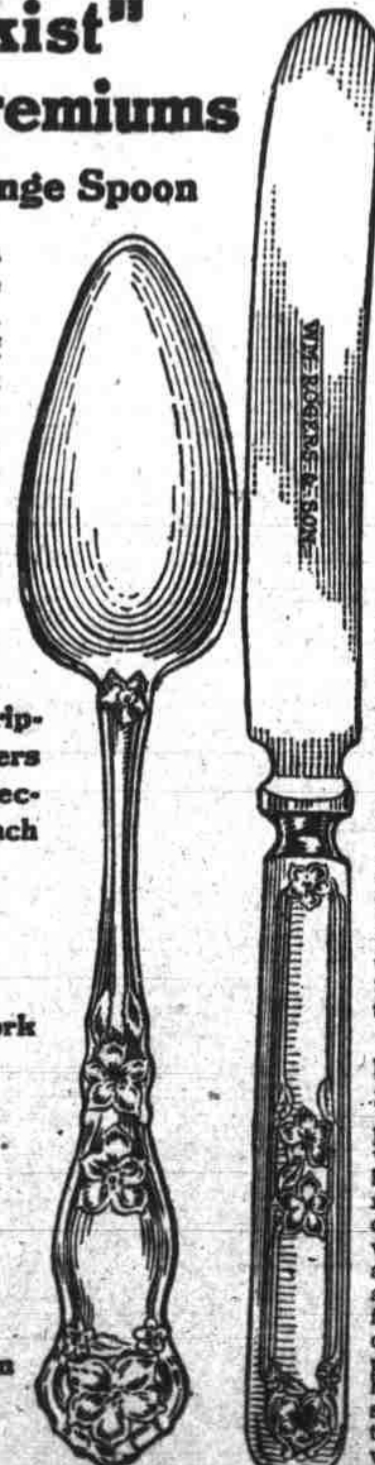
