WILSON CHOICE OF HIS PARTY; CLARK IS NOT FAR BEHIND

Roosevelt Probably Nominated by Republicans, Though La Follette Is Running Him a Very Close Race.

TAFT IS BAD THIRD ALL OVER THE STATE

Results of Both Presidential Primaries in Doubt Till More Full Returns In.

Woodrow Wilson is apparently the choice of Oregon Democrats for president though the vote for Champ Clark is heavy in many outside counties. Theodore Roosevelt is probably the choice of the Republicans, but La Follette is running him almost a neck-and-neck race, and may finally prove the victor.

Results of both the Republican and Democratic presidential primaries will be in doubt until more full returns have been received.

The race between Roosevelt and La Follette is spectacular. The Wisconsin man has a plurality in Multnomah county and, as a rule, in the counties which he covered in his brief campaign of speechmaking in this state. Roosevelt, however, is strong in the rural districts. Incomplete returns from 25 outside counties give:

Results on the Democratic presidential vote are coming slowly, it is evident that Wilson has carried Multnomah county by a plurality that will probably exceed 1000.

OLCOTT IS WINNER OVER FIELDS FOR STATE SECRETARY

Former Multnomah County Clerk Concedes His Defeat in Telegram to Successful Incumbent at Salem.

(Special to the Journal.) Salem, Or., April 20.—Ben Olcott received this forenoon a telegram from Frank S. Fields conceding the latter's defeat in the race for the Republican nomination for secretary of state.

South to Join Roosevelt?
(United Press Leased Wire.) Sacramento, Cal., April 20.—In a telegram to Governor Johnson, Senator J. M. Dixon, campaign manager of Colonel Roosevelt, says the south may be counted upon to break away from President Taft and join the Roosevelt bandwagon in Chicago. He quotes messages from the Roosevelt contingent delegations in South Carolina to this effect.

Slashes Restaurant Man.
Theodore Chelakes, a laborer, last night slashed and severely injured Tom Pappas, a restaurant man at Sixth and Burnside streets, when Pappas interfered in a fight between Chelakes and a strange man. Pappas sustained a deep slash in the arm. Chelakes was captured by several messenger boys who chased Chelakes to Fourth and Couch streets. Patrolmen Mass and Eanis arrested Chelakes.

Oldest Army Officer Dies.
(United Press Leased Wire.) San Diego, Cal., April 20.—Lieutenant Colonel Frank Bridgman, oldest army officer in the United States, died today at Coronado. He was 92 years old. Colonel Bridgman had lived for some time with his daughter, Mrs. Urie Seebrook, and her husband, the admiral.

15 DIE IN FLOODS AT BENOIT; MANY ARE MAROONED

Feared That Number of Lives Lost When Levees Break Will Reach 200; Towns Under Water.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Greenville, Miss., April 20.—Fifteen persons met death in flood water near Bogfort last night that came from levee breaks between there and Benoit, Miss., according to reports received here today. It is expected that the loss of life in the flooded sections of Louisiana and Mississippi will reach 200.

Tallulah, La., April 20.—With Tallulah already inundated under from two to 10 feet of water, the waters from the Dog Tail crevasse in the Mississippi river levee continue to rise here today. An appeal has been made to the relief committee at New Orleans for assistance.

Rosedale, Miss., April 20.—With the crevasse in the levee at Beulah now more than 2000 feet wide, and with the ends still caving, the work of rescuing residents marooned there continued here today. The water is proaching Rosedale.

Dr. Harry Lane, nominated by Democrats for United States Senator.
That Dr. Harry Lane will be the Democratic nominee for the United States senate now seems certain. The incomplete count from the state outside of Multnomah county at 11 o'clock this afternoon showed the following results: Lane, 2180; Pierce, 2066; Oshover, 1188. In Multnomah county Dr. Lane will roll up a heavy majority that it is conceded cannot be seriously affected by losses in other parts of the state.

Returns from 134 precincts out of 197 in Multnomah county this afternoon show the following results: Lane, 1757; Pierce, 491; Oshover, 158.

LA FOLLETTE LEADS ROOSEVELT; TAFT IS 3D IN MULTNOMAH

Bourne Ahead of Selling by Over 1500 Votes; Nomination of Lafferty Seems Virtually Assured.

OLCOTT HAS LONG LEAD OVER FIELDS

Evans Nominated District Attorney Beyond Doubt; Coffey Has Safe Lead.

With the count complete from 150 of the 193 precincts in Multnomah county, Robert M. La Follette is in the lead as the Republican choice for president by 226 votes over Roosevelt. President Taft is trailing a bad third, 3441 votes behind La Follette and 3165 votes behind Roosevelt.

These returns include a good representation of the outside town precincts of the county, and nearly all of the voting places on the west side. Of the precincts not yet heard from or not yet tabulated, most are from the east side precincts in the eastern part of the county. In the latest returns, Roosevelt appears to be gaining slightly on La Follette, with Taft maintaining about the same ratio as a bad third throughout.

The vote as tabulated for these 150 precincts stands: La Follette 7682, Roosevelt 7127, Taft 5022.

Bourne Leads Selling.
Jonathan Bourne in 150 precincts complete in Multnomah county, now has a lead of exactly 1517 votes over Ben Selling in the contest for United States senator. The count: Bourne 951, Selling 1164, Lowell 1451, Morton 557.

Selling is gradually gaining on Bourne, earlier figures having given Bourne a lead of nearly 2000.

With a lead of 748 votes over Judge C. U. Gantenbein, in 138 precincts complete, the nomination of W. Lafferty for congress seems virtually assured. Latest returns are increasing Lafferty's advantage, and many precincts yet remain to be heard from in eastern Multnomah, which Lafferty counts a stronghold. The race is entirely between Lafferty and Gantenbein, with 5945 and 5201 votes, respectively. Clyde and Shepherd finishing far behind in that order. Totals give Clyde 279 and Shepherd 1070.

In the same precincts Ben Olcott, secretary of state, has a lead of 671 votes over Frank S. Fields, his opponent for the office. The count stands 8131 for Olcott and 7460 for Fields.

Evans Nominated.
Walter H. Evans has such a huge lead that he is nominated district attorney of Multnomah county beyond possible doubt. Evans has 2932 more votes than Seneca Fouts, his closest rival, in only 127 of 193 precincts, 66 remaining to be heard from. Evans has 7309 votes, more than Fouts and Cameron together. Fouts has 4227 votes, Joy 2772, while the incumbent, George J. Cameron, made the insignificant showing of only 1780 votes in these precincts.

With two candidates running neck and neck and a third close in the rear, the contest for county commissioner is exciting. The incumbent, W. L. Light-

ROOSEVELT AND C. CLARK LEAD IN NEBRASKA VOTE

Colonel Carries Every District in "Cornhusker" State; La-Follette Is Second; Clark's Plurality Estimated as 6000

(United Press Leased Wire.) Lincoln, Neb., April 20.—Suffragent votes in yesterday's presidential preference primary election had been counted at noon today to make certain that Colonel Roosevelt had carried every district in the state. Senator La Follette is running ahead of President Taft but Roosevelt polled more votes than both of the other candidates. Champ Clark has carried the state by a plurality estimated at 6000, the other aspirants for the Democratic presidential nomination—Governor William C. Olin—being far behind. In the second district Governor Harmon received two votes, Clark getting the rest. In the eastern counties, favor, Harmon polled a heavy vote.

Adherents of Colonel Roosevelt claim that their candidate polled 20,000 more votes than President Taft.

The length of the ballot makes the counting very slow and it will be hours before accurate figures can be obtained. Before the election William J. Bryan pledged himself to accept the choice of the Nebraska voters as his own.

That Colonel Roosevelt polled more than twice the combined vote of La Follette and Taft is shown in returns from one fourth of the total number of precincts in the state. The count so far tabulated gives Roosevelt 11,896, La Follette 5685, Taft 2972.

The race between Senator Brown and Congressman Norris for the senatorial nomination is close while former Governor Shallenbarger is leading in the Democratic senatorial contest.

The Republicans have renominated Governor Chester Aldrich. R. L. Metcalf probably will be the Democratic gubernatorial nominee.

Champ Clark's plurality over Wilson and Harmon almost equals that of Roosevelt over La Follette and Taft.

ISMAY MUST STAY UNTIL INQUIRY ON WRECK IS FINISHED

Managing Director Had Made Plans to Leave for England but Is Held for Hearing by Second Subpena.

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, April 20.—No additions to the list of dead or survivors of the Titanic wreck were made at the offices of the White Star line here today. A revised list as given out by company officials places the number of survivors at 705, including 205 members of the crew, 20 of the latter being women. A total of 1635 persons perished, including 654 members of the Titanic's crew.

New York, April 20.—J. Bruce Ismay, managing director of the White Star line, must remain in the United States until the federal government has ended its investigation into the wreck of the Titanic. This much was made certain here today when Senator William Alden Smith of Michigan, chairman of the subcommittee appointed by the senate commerce committee to fix responsibility for the disaster, curtly refused a request from Ismay that he be allowed to sail this afternoon for England on the steamer Lapland.

"I told Ismay," announced Senator Smith just before the committee met today, "that under no circumstances could he leave the country now. To make sure that there would be no mistake about it I ordered that Ismay be served with another subpoena, compelling him to remain in the United States until this inquiry is ended."

All Officers Are Held.
In addition to Ismay, subpenas also were served on 22 members of the Titanic crew, including the four officers all of whom arrived here on the Carpathia. These men will also remain in the United States until the investigation is finished. Other members of the crew were permitted to sail this afternoon on the Lapland.

The big Transatlantic lines announced here today that preparations had been made to change the deck construction of liners so as to permit the installation of additional davits necessary to accommodate sufficient lifeboats and rafts to care for every passenger aboard. Many lines also plan lifeboats to be equipped with automobile engines.

Ismay Tries to Sail.
That he had received positive information that J. Bruce Ismay intended sailing for Europe on the day after the Carpathia docked was admitted here today by Senator Smith.

"We had information," said Smith, "that the White Star company planned to send Ismay and other surviving members of the Titanic's crew out of the country. Passage, even before the Carpathia arrived, had been engaged for them on the Cedric, which sailed Thursday, and the Lapland, which is due to sail this afternoon. I ordered government detectives to subpoena 22 members of the crew, men whom I believe can tell an amazing story to the American people."

Operator Harold Bride, one of the two operators aboard the Titanic, whose feet were badly crushed in the wreck, was placed in a wheel chair and taken to the Waldorf-Astoria where he appeared before the investigating committee. The hearing will continue, it is expected, for a week.

BEN SELLING WINS NOMINATION FOR U. S. SENATE SEAT

Bourne's Lead in Multnomah County Is Overcome by the Pluralities for Portland Man in Outside Counties.

EASTERN OREGON VOTE FAILS PRESENT SENATOR

Many Surprises Shown by Incomplete Returns Being Received.

Ben Selling is the Republican nominee for United States senator. He was defeated in Multnomah county by Bourne, but this adverse vote was more than overcome by pluralities in outside counties.

Incomplete returns from counties outside of Multnomah give the following results: Bourne 952, Lowell 1451, Morton 1245, Selling 14,067.

These figures give Selling a lead outside of Multnomah county, of 4145. With the prospect that Bourne's plurality in Multnomah will not exceed 2000, it is clear that Selling's lead is decisive.

There are many surprises in the vote, and Selling was victorious in a number of counties which had been confidently counted as in the Bourne column.

Incomplete returns indicate that Selling carried Clatskanie, Coos, Douglas, Gilliam, Hood River, Clatsop, Lane, Linn, Marion, Union, Wallowa, Wasco, Washington and Yamhill counties by decisive pluralities.

Bourne received a handsome plurality in Jackson and Tillamook, but failed to display the expected strength in eastern Oregon.

Returns thus far received are chiefly from the cities and towns, and it is possible that the farmers' vote may tip down Selling's lead somewhat. Selling's lead is so great, however, that it is scarcely possible that the campaign will duplicate the sensational result in 1907, when Bourne finally pulled out victor four days after the nomination had been conceded to Calk.

KEEP WATCH ON ISMAY; MRS. ASTOR MAY GIVE TESTIMONY IN INQUIRY

Federal Officers Fear White Star Official Will Try to Make His Escape.

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, April 20.—Determined that J. Bruce Ismay, "the saved from the Titanic" managing director of the White Star line, shall not escape from the country before the senate investigation into the disaster is concluded, Sergeant at Arms Randall's men are today keeping Ismay under close surveillance. They are also keeping a close watch on Vice President P. A. Franklin, the New York representative of the White Star line.

Adding greatly to the public interest in the inquiry, it was declared today that Mrs. John Jacob Astor, Colonel Gracie and other prominent survivors of the Titanic, probably would testify before the investigating subcommittee of the senate.

Explaining the surveillance of Ismay and Franklin, Senator Smith, chairman of the subcommittee, declared this afternoon that the federal government wireless stations had picked up messages from Ismay to Franklin proposing that the Titanic's crew and Ismay should be hurried out of the country, Smith said.

"Wireless on a government vessel picked up these messages and relayed them to Washington. That is why the investigating committee rushed to New York and met the Carpathia. Ismay has been eager to get away ever since they arrived."

Chairman Smith said that the messages were signed "Yankee," Ismay's code signature, and were to Franklin's cable address, as follows: "Islefrank, New York: Very important you hold Cedric daylight Friday for Titanic crew. Answer."

"Islefrank, New York: Think most unwise keep Titanic crew until Saturday. Strongly urge detaining Cedric, sailing for midnight, if desirable."

"Islefrank, New York: Unless you have good substantial reasons for not holding Cedric, please allow him to sail. Undesirable hold crew New York home."

The subcommittee adjourned at 4 o'clock this afternoon to meet in Washington Monday, when it will resume the examination of Ismay, Franklin, and the wireless operators and officers of the Titanic.

Chairman Smith declared that the committee undoubtedly would summon Mrs. Astor and all other passengers who can be expected to know anything about the disaster.

2000 ARE SLAIN BY CHINESE TROOPS IN CAPITAL OF THIBET

Women and Children Shot Down by Fire From Maxim Guns, Following Uprising.

London, April 20.—The Calcutta correspondent of the Central News today called here that Chinese troops, using Maxim guns, slew 2000 women and children in quelling an uprising at L'Hassa, the capital of Thibet.

Wainwright Put in Charge.
Montreal, April 20.—William Wainwright, senior vice president of the Grand Trunk, was appointed today to take temporary charge of the Grand Trunk railway, as successor to President Charles M. Hays, who was among the victims of the Titanic disaster.

CRACKERS OF SAFE GET COIN, JEWELRY

Clothing Store Made to Give Up \$35 and Diamonds; Experts Did Work.

Expert safe crackers last night broke a safe in the office of Weinstein Brothers, clothiers at 167 First street, securing \$35 in money, several checks, a ladies gold watch, two diamond rings, a bracelet, two gold charms and several ring settings. Entrance was gained by the back way, which was arrived at by descending a ladder used on an adjoining building that is being repaired. The safe was opened in an expert manner, muffled with blankets taken from the store, and damped. Nitro-glycerin was used. The Bertillon expert, James Hunter, was sent at once to the place with Detectives Coleman and Snow, but all finger prints had been skillfully concealed.

MILLIONAIRE HILLMAN LANDS IN PENITENTIARY

(United Press Leased Wire.) Tacoma, Wash., April 20.—With his moustache missing, which changes his appearance completely, C. D. Hillman, millionaire real estate man, reached Tacoma at 9:30 today on his way to the McNeil's Island penitentiary to serve two and a half years for using the mails to defraud.

Hillman lit up a big cigar while waiting to be transferred to the Steiencamp car, and seemed to be cheerful. He conversed with his brother and Deputy United States Marshal Anderson.

Safeguards for Travelers.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, April 20.—A resolution requiring President Taft to immediately cooperate with all nations in securing an international agreement to establish additional safeguards for ocean passengers was adopted by the senate today.
