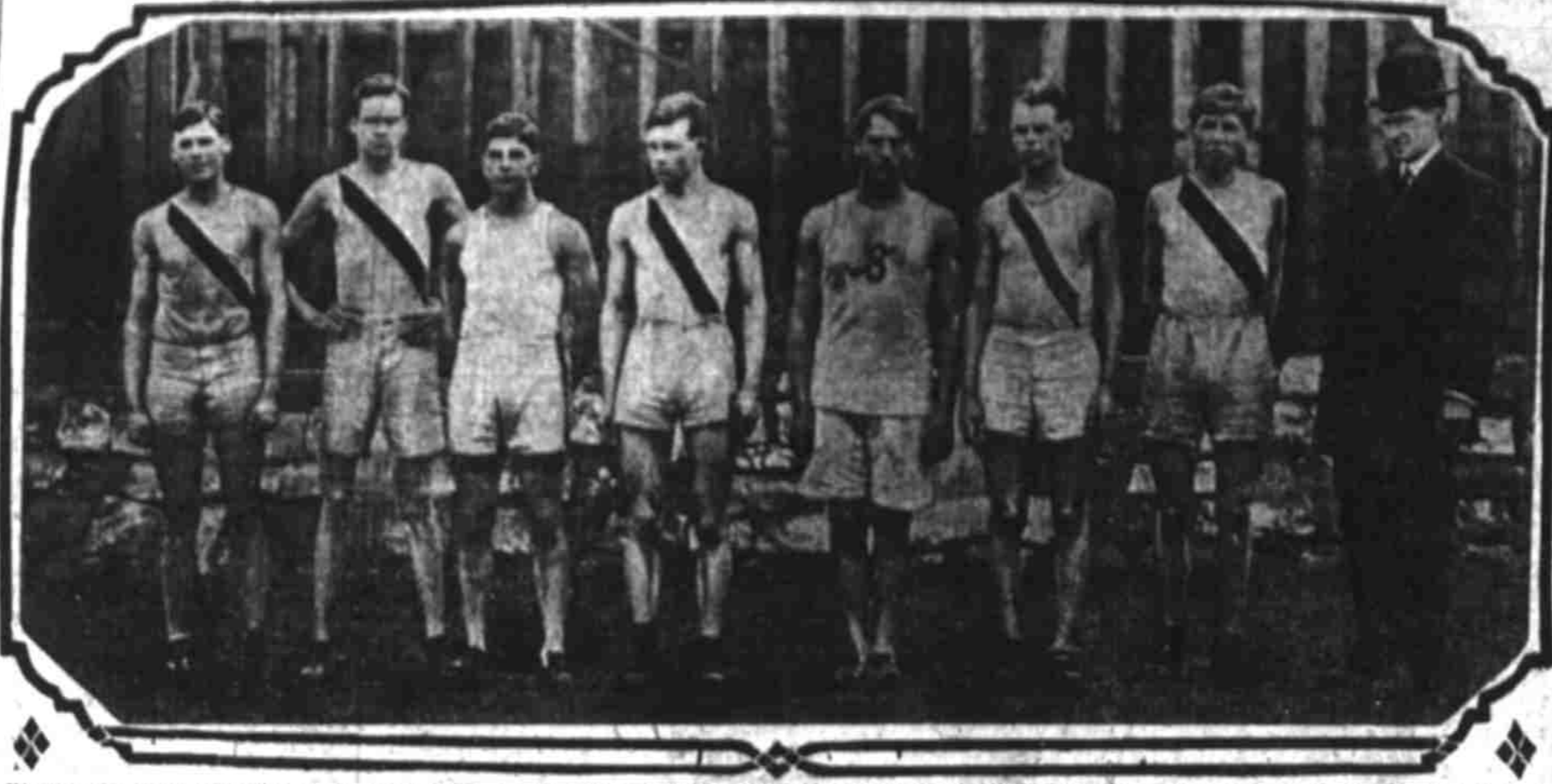

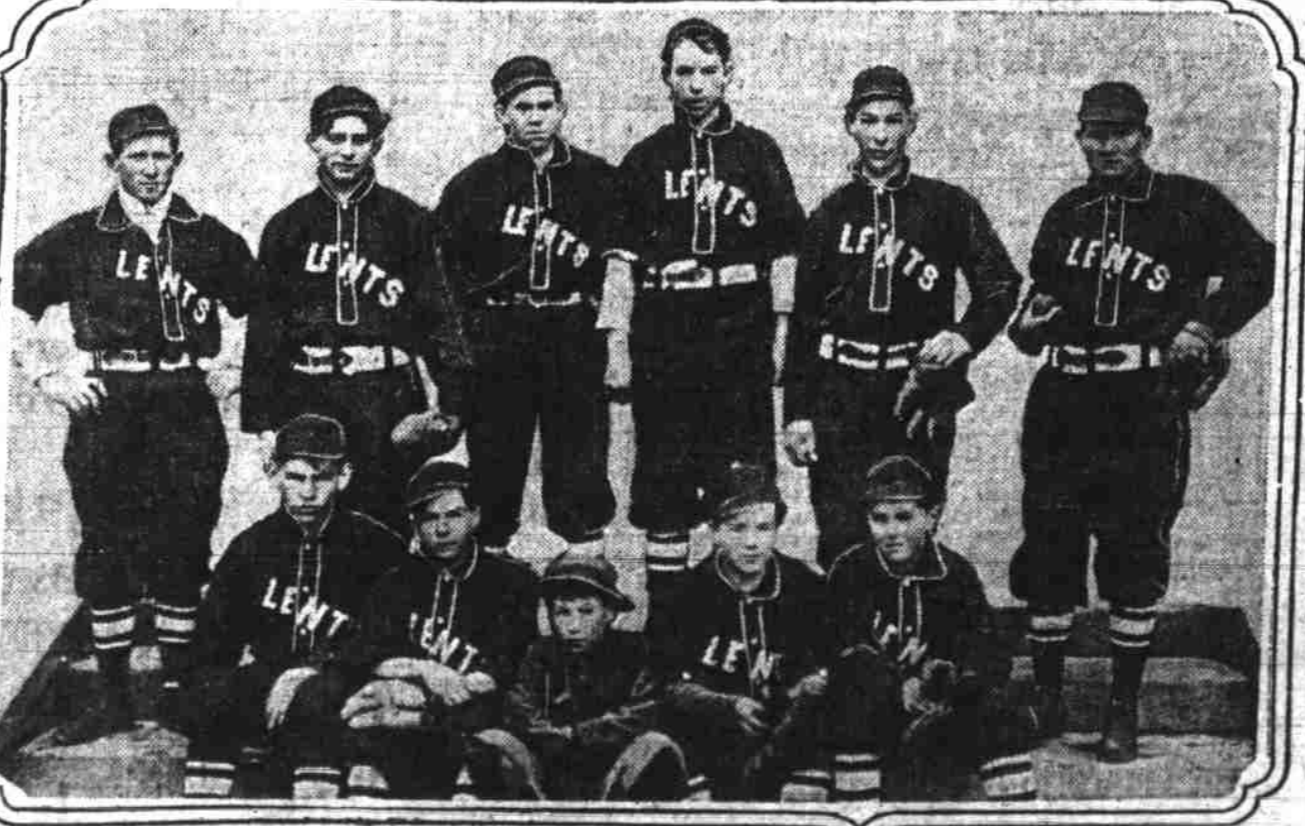
Whether the Superbas will start their games at home at 3:30, 3:45 or 4 o'clock will be decided by a vote of the Brooklyn fans.

INDIANS TO PLAY BASEBALL IN EAST HORINE MAY HAVE RECORD AFTER ALL

Team of Young Redskins Being Organized at Willamina for Tour.

Officials Asked for Information on Minor Details of High Jump.

Willamina, Or., is the home of an Indian baseball team known as the Young Redskins. A. Miller is the organizer of the team and he is planning to take the Redskins on a tour of the east.

(Special to The Journal.) Berkeley, April 20.—The overlooking of a few minor details may rob Horine, Stanford's peerless high jumper, of the world's record for the high jump.

Miller has been in Portland several days preparing for the team's trip. He has bought new suits and a whole outfit of hats and balls, including several of the "Buddy Ryan" sluggers, for the Indians.

When Horine made his great jump of 6 feet 4 1/2 inches, the officials signed up for every contingency that might arise, but they overlooked three details Sullivan in his letter suggests that the signing officials give their opinion on the following questions:
