POSTAL BANKS SHOW STRONG IN OREGON

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.) Washington, April 19.—There seems to be very good reason for saying that the opening of postal savings depositories throughout the country has been fully justified by the results attained. Oregon has taken to the idea with something approaching enthusiasm. While other states may have bigger deposits Oregon makes an excellent showing. It is officially stated that January 31 there were 52 postal savings depositories in operation in Oregon with deposits amounting to more than \$50,000. This amount was deposited by about 2300 depositors or an average of \$100 per depositor. Since the opening of postal savings depositories in Oregon there have been approximately 7000 accounts opened and more than 1500 deposits made or an average of two deposits to each depositor, and about 6500 withdrawals, or an average of less than one to each depositor.

Compared with number of depositors and amount on deposit with other states, Oregon ranks eleventh in number of accounts remaining on deposit, showing that as compared with other states the average amount to the credit of each depositor is higher in Oregon than is the average amount for the United States.

DALTON MISSING; ACCOUNTS SHORT

Salesman for Vacuum Cleaner Company Sought—May Have Gone to Orient.

Under the pretext of having to go to Seattle for the company for which he was working, L. S. Dalton left Portland, April 7, Sunday, and no trace of him has been discovered since. Meanwhile investigation of his accounts discloses a shortage of fully \$2000. G. H. F. Owen, Pacific coast manager for the McCrum-Howell company, is in Portland for the purpose of checking up on the business left by Dalton. Yesterday he gave out the facts about Dalton's disappearance and the failure of his accounts to check. A sum of money, about \$1200, was drawn from the bank by Dalton just before he left the city. The McCrum-Howell company installs vacuum cleaning systems, and Dalton was a successful salesman. He gathered in plenty of business in Portland, and was reasonably careful in his collections. It is said that he had not expensive habits, and the idea that there is a "woman in the case" is mentioned by those who know Dalton best. His friends are given to think that he left the country for Australia or the Orient while laboring under imaginary financial troubles. It is said his domestic life was pleasant, and that he spent much of his time at home.

Dalton formerly worked in the Coeur d'Alene district, living at Murray, Idaho. For seven years he had been in the vacuum cleaning business, going over to the McCrum-Howell company with a company that was bought out by the larger concern. With his wife he lived on Eldmore street, his wife being a daughter of Frank Laver, a successful Willamette valley farmer. Dalton was about 36 years of age, of dark complexion and tall.

Arriving at Seattle Dalton went to the office of the company for which he was working and visited with the manager briefly. Announcing that he had been discovered since, except the receipt of a letter by his father-in-law in which Dalton stated that he had concluded to quit his family and the country and leave for parts unknown. Mr. Laver has not given the facts in the letter.

The Story of a Modern Laundry and Its Service

No. 3 The Wash Room

After reaching this room the different articles are first carefully sorted by colors and quality of fabrics. Separate lots are made of the white, the light blue, the dark blue, the yellow, the brown and the black pieces, and each of these lots is washed separately. Then all pieces of fine fabrics and fancy pieces are picked out and these are either washed in nets or by hand. 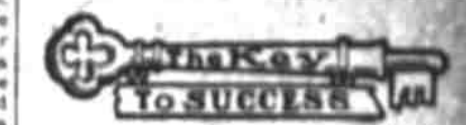
