

# KELLAHER LEADS FIELD FOR SENATE, 13 CANDIDATES

### Moser, Farrell, Day and Perkins Other Winners — Clohessy Apt to Land in Cellular—19 More Precincts.

Dan Kellaher, Guy C. Moser, Robert H. Farrell, I. N. Day and Dr. T. L. Perkins were the five successful candidates for the Republican nominations for state senator from Multnomah county at the primary.

Complete returns on the senatorial contest from 174 precincts late last night placed them in that order, according to the vote polled by each, and with only 15 precincts missing they are so far ahead of the field that there will be no changes.

Dan Kellaher was high man of the 13 candidates with 11,281 votes. This was 250 more than the vote cast for Moser, who had 10,992 and 6292 more than was received by W. P. Swope, the low man on the ticket. The other three successful candidates followed in this order: Farrell 10,191 votes, Day 9202 votes, and Dr. Perkins 8829 votes.

Republican Who Lays Loss of Multnomah to La-Follette's Boost for Bourne.

"I attribute my failure to carry Multnomah county in the campaign for United States senator," said Ben Selling last night, "partly to the speech La-Follette here in favor of Senator Bourne and partly to the antipathy of the timber interests. If it had not been for La-Follette's talk I am confident that my plurality would have been, as I first predicted, between 10,000 and 15,000 votes. Even with the handicap, I estimate that the complete returns will show that I have been nominated by a plurality of from 5000 to 8030."

"I am deeply gratified with the confidence reposed in me by voters of Oregon. The people have spoken, and in doing so have chosen me as the Republican candidate for the United States senate the highest office within their power to give. It has been the work of friends and loyal supporters all over Oregon and my promise and pledge to them is constant attention and effort in Oregon's behalf, earnest support of the people's measures to the end that progressive legislation may be taken up to a greater extent by the national congress."

"This is an important time in Oregon's history—a time when commercial interests of the state may be broadened, resulting in international commerce of far greater volume than at present enjoyed. As senator of this great state, which I now feel certain I shall be, I will do everything within my power to push forward Oregon's interests."

After the five winners, the other candidates finished in the following order, which will not be changed except possibly in the case of Swope and Clohessy by additional returns: George M. Hyland 8519 votes, W. A. Storey 7685 votes, George W. Caldwell 7084 votes, C. W. Hudson 7159 votes, Boon Cason 6712 votes, E. E. Coover 5237 votes, Michael J. Clohessy 4644 votes, and W. P. Swope 4992 votes.

## REPRESENTATIVES WIN AN EASY RENOMINATION IN LANE COUNTY

(Special to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., April 20.—With 14 precincts not yet reported, Roosevelt has 1123 votes in Lane county, Taft 801, La-Follette 648, Selling 1471, Bourne 678, Lowell 542, Morton 162. For secretary of state, Florida has 1842 and Olcott 171. For day and food commissioner, Mickie leads with 764, Cottle has 584, Lea 472, Edwards 394.

On the Democratic side, Champ Clark leads with 324, Wilson has 178 and Harrison 48. Harry Lane leads for senator with 228, Coshow 127, Pierce 124. For state representatives, Allen H. Eaton and I. B. Cushman, incumbents, are renominated, and for the third place a very close race was between C. J. Hurd and M. Vernon Parsons. This will not be decided, perhaps, till votes from the last precinct are counted.

## TILLAMOOK GOES TO BOURNE; ROOSEVELT LEADS BY 7 VOTES

(Special to The Journal.) Tillamook, Or., With three precincts still to be heard from Roosevelt leads by a margin of seven votes, the count standing Roosevelt 241, La-Follette 234, Taft 227. Bourne carried the county. The vote for district attorney is: Hill 320, Winslow 248, for state senator, H. T. Botts 248, W. H. Hollis 147, T. H. Handley is the choice of the county for joint representative. County officials were renominated with the possible exception of H. V. Alley, county commissioner, the count standing Alley 274, Edner 232.

## UMATILLA STANDS FIRMLY BY LOWELL; ROOSEVELT LEADS

(Special to The Journal.) Pendleton, Or., April 20.—Complete returns from 24 out of 44 precincts and partial returns from several others give Roosevelt a strong lead over Taft, with La-Follette a close third. Wilson is strongly indorsed for the Democratic nomination. For senatorial nomination, Judge Lowell was paid a great tribute by the people of his home county, defeating Selling by more than a 2 to 1 vote. Walter Pierce beat the field in the Democratic contest.

Judge Ellis also gets a good home vote but hardly a majority. Fields has a slight lead over Olcott. Aitchison scored a big lead. Mickie is Umatilla's choice for food and dairy commissioner. Frederick Steiner won out over James P. Near for the district attorneyship nomination while G. W. Phelps was renominated for circuit judge. I. L. Mann and J. T. Hinkle were the Republican choice for legislators.

## TONGUE HAS NEARLY 2 TO 1 AT HOME OVER NORBLAD; WOOD WINS

(Special to The Journal.) Hillsboro, Or., April 20.—It will require the official count to show how Washington county voted for president, but it is probable Roosevelt carried the county by about 100. La-Follette's vote was larger than was expected and it may be that he will lead Taft. With two precincts missing, Selling has 1445 to Bourne's 586. Field leads Olcott by 1173 to 1119. Mickie was the favorite for dairy commissioner with 1454; Edwards 106, Cottle 229 and Lea 339.

E. B. Tongue carries the county for district attorney with 1571 to Norblad's 849. Hollis for joint senator has 1599 to Botts' 538. The race for state senator was close, W. D. Wood, former incumbent, leading H. T. Bagley, mayor of Hillsboro, by 34 votes. D. B. Reasoner for county judge, leads ex-Judge Goodby by 36. Representatives elected are John A. Chapman, Virgil H. Massey and S. A. D. Meek. Chapman was a member of the last legislature and Meek of the legislature that preceded it. J. C. Applegate leads F. E. Cornelius for sheriff by 362. The above are all Republican candidates.

Democratic registration and vote was light, there being but two candidates for county offices. All indications point to Wilson being the choice.

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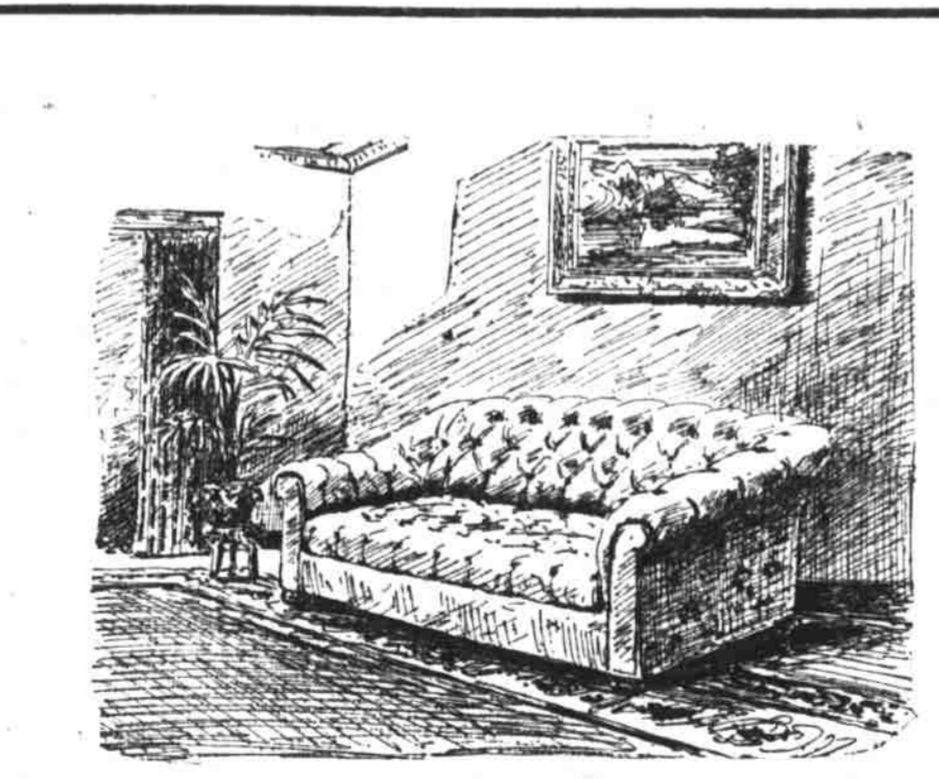
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
