Candidates' Expense Accounts.—According to the statement filed today with the county clerk by W. C. North, Republican candidate in the primary for sheriff, his campaign cost him \$446.12. Like all other candidates the large part of the expense was for advertising. Joe S. Hutchinson, candidate for county clerk on the Republican ticket, states in his report that his campaign cost him \$231.52. Of this amount \$150 was for the placing of his picture on the moving picture curtains. J. H. Nolta, candidate for state representative, sets forth in his statement that his campaign cost him \$15.75. N. H. Bird, candidate for sheriff, spent \$123.61 on his campaign. All candidates were on the Republican ticket.

Murder Trial Begins.—The trial of Ernest L. Oettinger, saloonkeeper, charged with the second degree murder of E. S. Mutch, began this morning before Judge Gantenbein of the circuit court. A jury will possibly be secured late this afternoon, thereby allowing testimony to begin Tuesday morning. The plaintiff is accused of shooting Mutch on the night of January 19, in the Merchants saloon, 3 First street. Oettinger is proprietor of the place. Mutch is said to have threatened Oettinger, which caused the shooting. Attorneys John Logan and John Stevenson are representing the defendant, while Deputy District Attorney Fitzgerald and Collier appear for the state.

Indoor Picnic.—Members of the executive staff of the Portland Young Men's Christian Association will hold their annual picnic tomorrow. As the weather is not suitable for an open air excursion the "picnic" will be held in the association auditorium. It will be attended by the secretaries and their families. Each year the Y. M. C. A. staff devotes a part of one day to a picnic. Usually an effort is made to hold it in the open air, but on account of inclement weather is sometimes necessary. It was decided this year to set a date and hold it rain or shine. The secretaries have planned for an informal dinner and general good time and will meet in the auditorium at 6 o'clock.

James O'Donovan Dead.—James O'Donovan, 71 years old, died at his home, 350 Summer street, yesterday afternoon after a long illness. He was formerly a well known business man of Graceville, Minn., living in that city over 30 years. About a year ago he came to this city for his health. He is survived by six sons, three of whom are living in this city. The latter are James Clement and Thomas O'Donovan. The funeral will be held from the family home tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock, with service at the St. Andrew's church. The Hibernians will have charge of the services. Friday the body will be taken to Graceville, Minn., his old home, for burial.

Bald Oupham Dead.—The most complete opium outfit that has ever been captured by the police, and practically the only one where white people are known to visit, was raided last night by Sergeant Kienlen and Patrolmen Hutchinson and Stewart at 237 1/2 Everett street, owned by Ah Hong. Two white men, giving the names of Frank Anderson and Frank Howard, and one white woman, Mabel Wilson, were watched for some time as it had been reported that there was an opium den there and many white people have been seen to visit there. The case has been set for April 30.

Earth Education at Rotary Club.—"Earth Education Day" will be celebrated tomorrow by the Rotary club. Superintendent of Public Instruction L. R. Alderman and Professor Arthur G. B. Boquet of Oregon Agricultural college will be the speakers. Ralph R. Routledge, chairman of the Rotary club's garden contest committee, will serve as chairman of the day and Phil S. Batten, chairman of the general garden committee, will exhibit and explain a series of stereoscopic slides which show how the students in the schools of Portland are getting into the prize contest.

He says he escaped two years ago from the brick yard with two other men, both of whom have since been captured. He will be returned to Salem.

Dies of Diphtheria.—Little Mabel Toussy of 1245 Delaware street, aged 3 years, succumbed yesterday to a violent attack of diphtheria after she had been rushed to St. Vincent's sanitarium in an ambulance. She died upon the table while undergoing an intubation operation. The case was reported to Dr. Chester G. Hall Saturday and was so far advanced that it could not be checked in time to save the child's life.

HEROISM OF RICH MEN SUNG BUT NO PRAISE GIVEN "POOR DEVILS"

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Washington, April 29.—"The real heroes of the Titanic tragedy went down to their death unscathed and their bravery unheralded—and the millionaires are getting credit for such a large share of courage that nobody has been paying any attention to the 'poor devils' of the leviathan," said Representative Victor Berger, the Wisconsin Socialist, today.

"Every year we kill thousands simply in order to save money and pay dividends," Berger continued. "The Titanic horror is only one instance. There are now plenty of bills pending before congress to safeguard ocean travel—just because the wealthy class was hurt. Until a crowd of millionaires are injured or affected we will never get safety appliances on boats, on railroads or in the mines."

"Greed and speed are the characteristics of the capitalist system. They caused the Titanic disaster, and are causing disasters almost as appalling every day in the industrial world. 'I do not want to belittle the heroism of the rich men on board the ill fated vessel. They were brave, and their bravery should be applauded. But we do not want to lose sight of the fact that the real heroes were the working people—those who stuck to their posts of duty on the ship—the engineers, for example."

"Fifty per cent of the first class passengers were saved, a small percentage of the second class and only 10 per cent of the steerage."

"In this country we learn only by experience of our own. Fifteen or sixteen hundred lives have to be lost before we realize that there are not a sufficient number of lifeboats on Transatlantic vessels."

COFFIN SHIP DELAYED BY STORM; HALIFAX IS FILLED WITH MOURNERS

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Halifax, N. S., April 29.—The Mackay-Bennett, the coffin ship sent to the scene of the Titanic wreck to recover bodies of victims, probably will not arrive here until 9 o'clock tomorrow morning, according to a wireless message received today from Captain Lardner. The message stated that the vessel had been delayed by bad weather. Aboard the Mackay-Bennett are 205 bodies of victims of the Titanic disaster, including those of Colonel John Jacob Astor and Isidor Straus.

Thousands of persons are awaiting the arrival here of the Mackay-Bennett. Including the bodies carried by the steamer Minia, 225 bodies in all have been found. Of this number, 180 have been identified.

Vincent Astor, son of Colonel John Jacob Astor, has arrived here in the private car Oceanic, and plans to rush his father's body aboard and hurry it south for burial.

William Widener also has arrived in the private car Constitution, and is awaiting the arrival of his father's corpse. No word has been received here as to whether the body of Mrs. Isidor Straus has been found. Only 100 coffins are aboard the Mackay-Bennett, the other bodies being packed in ice and wrapped in burlap and canvas. The

WILL CONFER WITH ELECTRIC RY OFFICIALS

Officers of the American Electric Railway association and of the American Electric Railway Manufacturers association are scheduled to arrive in Portland May 14, on their 11,000 mile trip from New York city to the Pacific coast and return. The party left April 11. The itinerary takes in Galveston, Texas, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Portland, Seattle and Vancouver, B. C., and on the return trip the cities of the middle west will be visited.

The objects of the visitation are to confer with electric railway management, representatives of public utility companies and with public officials and civic bodies, with a view to exchanging ideas to establish a better understanding between the public and the corporations. It is also hoped to cultivate closer relations between the remote members of both associations, and to enlarge the membership of both associations.

The companies already holding membership in the American Electric Railway association own and operate 38,863 miles of track, 7,192 cars, carrying 7,192,000,000 of passengers in a year, and employing 120,000 persons. The 1200 electric railway companies operating in the United States today own and operate 41,000 miles of track, 80,000 cars, carrying between 10,000,000,000 and 11,000,000,000 passengers a year, and have more than 150,000 employees.

Both the American Electric Railway association and its allied organization the American Electric Railway association, are constantly studying in their respective fields, and developing by constructive work along the lines of standardization and efficiency.

It is recognized that transportation by electricity is a public service, the success of which is largely dependent upon popular good will, and it is to get nearer the will of the people that the officers of the two organizations are making their extensive tours.
