

"MOST BEAUTIFUL ACTRESS" IN SUIT

Daughter of Major General Young Asks Divorce From Charters.

(Continued From Last Week.)
 Paterson, N. J., April 29.—Hearings are in progress here today in the divorce suit of Mrs. Lillian Young Charters, daughter of Major General R. M. Young, U. S. A., at one time in command of the President of San Francisco, against her husband, Charles Charters. Mrs. Charters alleges that her husband was named in the suit for divorce brought by George Wilder of Stansfeld Castle, Sussex, England, against Una Evelyn Mistle, called "the most beautiful actress in England." In his answer, Charters declares that Mrs. Charters' affections were alienated by the "wicked arts and skillful equivocations" of Thomas L. Temple, president of the Southern Pine & Lumber company of Texas, Texas. Disputes over alimony and counsel fees are occupying the attention of the court today.

PHYSICIANS INVESTIGATE MEDICAL WORK ABROAD

 Boston, Mass., April 29.—A party of distinguished American medical authorities sailed from Boston today on a two months tour of investigation in Europe. The party of physicians will inspect the big hospitals and medical schools in London, Paris, Vienna, Berlin and other European countries and upon their return will recommend to the similar institutions in America the adoption of such features and methods of work as are deemed desirable. Included among the members of the party are Dr. Henry A. Christian, dean of the Harvard Medical school; Dr. Lawrence P. River, pathologist of the Montreal general hospital; Dr. Francis G. Peabody, an instructor in Johns Hopkins hospital at Baltimore; Dr. Thomas F. Leen, head physician in the Carney hospital of Boston, and Dr. George F. O'Day, of Worcester.

SCHEME TO DEPOSE SENATOR PENROSE

Finn of Pittsburg Wants Seat and Also Leadership of Quaker Republicans.

 Harrisburg, Pa., April 30.—Republican leaders of Pennsylvania arrived on every train today in anticipation of the state convention which is to meet in the majestic theatre in this city tomorrow. There will be nominated at this convention a candidate for auditor general, state treasurer and four congressmen-at-large. The convention will also elect twelve delegates and twelve alternates-at-large to the national convention at Chicago.
 The Flynn-Van Valkenburg combine, which espoused the cause of Roosevelt, intends to follow up the notable victory scored in the recent primaries by capturing the state convention and making their control of the party unquestioned.
 The ultimate aim of the anti-organization faction is believed to be to capture the seat of United States Senator Boies Penrose for former State Senator William Finn of Pittsburg, who aspires to be the Republican leader of the state, and who, since the rout of the Penrose machine in the recent primaries, appears to be in a fair way to realize his ambition. While the term of Senator Penrose does not expire until 1924, the campaign will be of great importance to the Finn plan, as half the state senators to be elected next fall are to vote on Senator Penrose's successor.

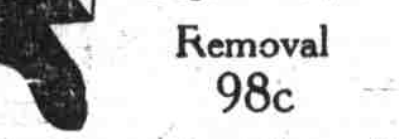

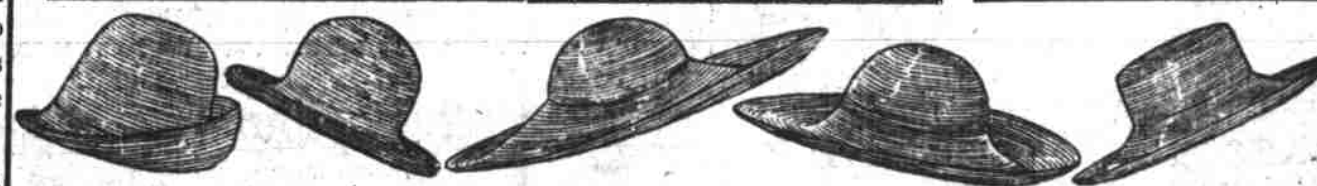
