

Official Count in Oregon; Wilson Carried 1 More County Than Clark; Lane Had 22 Counties; Pierce Leads in 9

Wilson carried one more county than Clark and in one county Grant, their vote was a tie. Wilson won Benton, Blackhawk, Columbia, Gilliam, Hood River, Josephine, Lincoln, Marion, Multnomah, Polk, Washington, Yamhill, Wasco, Wasco, and Yamhill.

County Carried by Clark were Baker, Clatsop, Clatskanie, Coos, Curry, Deschutes, Harney, Klamath, Lake, Lane, Malheur, Morrow, Sherman, Union, Wallowa and Wheeler.

In the historical contest Lake carried 22 counties, Pierce led in nine and Johnson in two. Miller, who withdrew too late to have his name removed from the ballot, was complimented with the highest vote in his home county of Lincoln.

San Francisco, May 1.—Charged with entering into a conspiracy with his brother to defraud the latter's wife, Norman Gertrude Jenner, leader in London society and daughter of the late Field Marshal Stewart of the British army, of her alimony, Daniel T. Murphy, local millionaire, member of the Hurlingham set and prominent clubman, is named today by his sister-in-law as co-defendant in the suit which she has filed against her divorced husband.

Murphy's counsel, Joseph F. Platonette 'Nold Murphy, collect \$12,125.75 each alimony. The Murphy brothers are sons of the late Daniel Murphy, senior member of the firm of Murphy, Grant & Co. The suit is brought in San Francisco, where the plaintiff identifies her former husband owns valuable property here. This property, she declares, he has turned over to his brother Daniel to avoid paying the alimony, with the understanding that the money was to be turned over to him all the revenues derived from the property.

Salem, Or., May 1.—While the city primaries are six months away, candidates are beginning to make their appearance, and there are indications that one of the hottest fights the city has ever known will be waged over the office of chief of police.

In most cities this office is appointive, but here it is elective, and is considered one of the best plum jobs in the city. Chief of Police William Patton, who was defeated in the recent primaries for the Republican nomination for sheriff of Marion county, will not be a candidate for re-election, but two of the men on the ticket for the office are racing.

These two are Officer Sam Burkhardt, who has made a good record as a criminal catcher, and seems popular, and Frank Shedeck, who has the night depot beat.

Another candidate will be Charles Brandt, foreman of the mechanical department of the Salem Statesman, who will have a strong following, it is said.
