

VILLAGERS KNOCK BEAVER PITCHERS TO ALL CORNERS

Tigers Victors by Score of 7 to 2; Carson Pitches Masterly Game; McCredie May Depend on Harkness Today.

The Beavers fall before the blasts of all corners while the Tigers knock out a series of pitchers Harkness and Stelger to all corners of the lot. When the final curtain was rung down, the score stood 7 to 2 in favor of the Villagers.

At Carson pitched a masterly game and kept the five hits he allowed well scattered, with the exception of the second inning when the Beavers managed to get two, which netted one of his runs.

Klawitter started on the mound for the locals and the Tigers put a run across in the first inning. Three singles by a new and dangerous line-up, McCredie to yank the former Southern leaguer and put in Stelger, who fared but a little better. David Gregg, Vern Gregg's brother, appeared on the mound in the fifth, lining and pitched splendid ball.

Plenty of Speed. He had lots of speed and appeared cool throughout the five innings that he pitched. He fanned four batters, allowed three hits and one base on balls. McCredie was very much pleased with the showing of Gregg.

Two singles and a sacrifice netted Vernon a tally in the first. A double play put an end to further scoring. McDowell's beautiful peg, which doubled Carlisle out at the plate in the third inning pulled Klawitter out of a tight hole.

In the third the Beavers scored their first run. Two singles and a sacrifice fly netted the run.

In the fourth Harkness scored five times. Klawitter was touched up for three singles in a row, which allowed one run. Brown was out and Carson walked. McCredie derided Klawitter and Stelger took his place.

Good Outfielding. Hays Fielded Carlisle's bunt in time but made a hurried throw to the plate which Howey missed. Hopp scored. Harkness singled and Carlisle and Carson scored. Carlisle scored on Patterson's sacrifice fly and the scoring ended when Harkness was out stealing.

Portland was unable to do anything again till the sixth when Butler doubled after Chasbourne walked and the second Beaver tally was scored.

Two of the three men to face Gregg in the fifth fanned. Walk and single came near giving Vernon a tally in the sixth but the Beavers broke up a double steal. In the seventh a single, a sacrifice and a double netted the Tigers their last tally.

Butler reached second in the ninth but died there when the next two batters flied out.

McDowell and Bayless had busy times in the outfield, both playing great ball. McCredie will likely depend on Harkness in today's game, while Hogan will use Harry Stewart.

The drivers will be dressed in white coats and trousers and will also have on regulation racing caps of the club's colors. The club will furnish the members who enter with ribbons of the club's colors to use in decorating.

Much enthusiasm was displayed last evening by the members and a very successful year is looked for by the race followers and horse admirers.

COAST CONFERENCE TRACK MEET TODAY

Eleven Teams Entered in Annual Meet on Berkeley Oval; Expect Records.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Berkeley, Cal., May 4.—Eleven universities and colleges representing the states of Oregon, Washington, California and Nevada, compete this afternoon in the annual Pacific coast conference track and field meet on the University of California oval. The athletics comprise the greatest gathering of talented athletes on the Pacific coast and a number of records are expected to be smashed.

The competing teams are: Washington university, Washington State college, University of Oregon, University of Nevada, Stanford University, University of California, St. Ignace college, Santa Clara college, St. Mary's college, Pomona college and the University of southern California.

The best balanced team is conceded to be that of the University of California, but each of the 11 teams has one or more stars, and individual performances will mainly decide the meet. Among the athletes who are looked for to record this afternoon are Courtney of Washington, who has done the 100 yards in 10 flat; John of Oregon and Wallace of Stanford, 440 yard men; MacLaren of Oregon, with a record of 4:27 4/5 to the mile run; Hurdie of Stanford, holder of the world's championship in the high jump; Crabbe of California in the two mile event; and Rice and Coolidge of California in the weights.

ENTER C. MORRIS INTO THE DISCARD
Oklahoma Giant Is Knocked Out in Sixth Round by L. McCarthy.

Springfield, Mo., May 4.—What is probably a final quietus has been placed on the "white hope" aspirations of Carl Morris, the Oklahoma giant, today as a result of his knockout in the sixth round by Luther McCarthy, the Springfield heavyweight.
