

WILSON LIKELY TO SECURE DELEGATES FROM WASHINGTON

State Convention at Walla Walla Organizes With Clark and Wilson Forces Each Claiming Control.

(Special to The Journal.) Walla Walla, Wn., May 6.—With five men in the field for the nomination for governor, two more being talked of, and with a fight in regard to the seating of a delegation from King county, the state Democratic convention opened at 2 o'clock this afternoon at the Keylor Grand theatre.

The convention was called to order by the chairman of the state committee, Charles Heffner of Seattle, a Wilson leader and candidate for national committeeman. C. C. Hill, assistant prosecuting attorney of Spokane county, gave an address in which he warned the delegates and aptly reminded the questions in mind before the convention.

The five candidates for governor are W. H. Dunphy of Walla Walla, Hugh C. Todd and E. C. Millon of Seattle, F. E. Chester and William H. Haskins of Spokane. Charles Heffner of Seattle and John Patton of Spokane seem to be the leading candidates for national committeeman, with Maurice Langhorne of Tacoma rumored as a compromise candidate.

For chairman of the state central committee Earl Husted of Everett, Hugh Wallace of Tacoma, and W. H. Cochran of Spokane are in the running.

All Delegates Present.

The last of the delegations arrived in the city last night on a special train from Seattle. Upon the arrival of the train caucuses were held by nearly all delegations and work lined up for today.

Interest centers principally around the contest for seats in the King county space. The hand picked men and the elected delegates are fighting hard for the 150 places given King county. The "hand picked" men are holding out for the seating of both delegations, giving each a half vote. This is not proving satisfactory to the elected delegation. Charles Heffner, who heads the King county elected delegation, states that the "hand picked" delegation is in existence by fraudulent means and that if the delegation is seated he will withdraw from the convention. The elected delegation from King county will not hear to the seating of both delegations, saying that "they are all right or all wrong."

Another fight before the credentials committee is from Adams county, which has sent 11 delegates and 11 contesting delegates. The split in Adams county was on a "wet" and "dry" question. The lineup seems to be the Clark and Harmon forces against the Wilson and Bryan men. If there may be said to be any Bryan men. The Bryan men want no instructions and the Wilson men are of the opinion that they can not get them. The Clark forces expect to control the convention and therefore are in favor of instructions.

Wilson May Control.

Wilson controls more counties than Clark, and his supporters are practically sure of seating the King county primary delegation which was contested. But even with those delegates seated and the Bryan delegates lined up behind him, Wilson musters at best 248, lacking 12 of enough to control the convention, which is made up of 719 delegates.

Wilson and Bryan have solid delegations from Clallam, Cowlitz, Douglas, Ferry, Grant, Island, Jefferson, Okanogan, San Juan, Skamania, Stevens and Whatcom counties, with a total vote of 160.

Shoshone county delegates plan to introduce a resolution indorsing what Taft says about Roosevelt, what Roosevelt says about Taft and what Follie says about everybody and everything.

There are over a dozen women delegates in the midst of the fight, led by May Arkwright Hutton of Spokane. One of the women delegates, Mrs. Molly Garry of Seattle, stated that she does not know whether she is on the "hand picked" or elected delegation, but she is for Clark. Mrs. L. T. Phillips of Seattle is on the elected delegation while her husband is on the "hand picked" delegation. Both are for Clark.

POSSES PURSUING OFFICERS' SLAYERS

Heavy Firing Heard Near Clinton and Believed Fight Has Started.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Vancouver, B. C., May 6.—Despatches from Ashcroft, B. C., today state that three posesses, all heavily armed, are in pursuit of Moses Kaul and Paul Quintan, the murderers of Constable Kindness and two others, who escaped from the old log jail at Clinton, and that a pitched battle is expected before the desperadoes are captured. Heavy firing has been heard south of Clinton and fears are felt that the murderers have invaded one of the lonely ranches in the district in their search for food.

The fugitives are dead shots and it is expected that loss of other lives will occur before they are taken or disabled.

The edibles were furnished by the newspaper men of Hood River—the women of the Hood River Congregational church having made more than 1000 sandwiches.

PROHIBITIONISTS WILL NOMINATE THEIR TICKET

Multnomah county Prohibitionists will nominate a ticket tomorrow by holding a mass convention at the Behrke-Walker building, corner Fourth and Yamhill streets. The convention will be called to order at 10 o'clock by N. G. Hedin, chairman of the Prohibition county committee.

One of the nominations certain to be made is that of Virgil G. Hinshaw as a candidate for district attorney. He is the only candidate and is one of the few who could qualify, as the candidate must be an attorney and only a few attorneys are members of the party.

Another nomination regarded as certain is that of Dr. Joseph E. Hall as a candidate for the legislature. Dr. Hall, whose office is on Williams avenue, polled one of the heaviest votes as a candidate two years ago, and will be unanimously nominated.

The plan of the Prohibitionists is to nominate a full party ticket for the county, so far as the chief offices are concerned, but a few of the minor places may go unfilled. As the Prohibitionists did not poll a large enough vote to hold primaries, their nominations must be provided for by a mass convention.

INSTALLATION OF DENIO ALARM SYSTEM FAVORED

Despite earnest opposition on the part of Councilman James A. Maguire, the new council committee on Industries, at its maiden meeting, held this morning, voted to recommend the passage of an ordinance granting to the Denio Fire Alarm company the right to attach its system to the wires of the Home Telephone company.

The only consideration received by the city, if the ordinance passes, will be that the Denio company must install its device for receiving and transmitting fire alarms in fire headquarters. Opponents of the ordinance say this will be a detriment both to the municipal fire alarm system and to the telephone service.

The ordinance was first referred to the health and police committee of the council. A majority of that committee recommended it for passage, but Councilman Maguire objected to the measure. It was then referred to the license committee, where it again received a majority vote. In this latter committee, however, it met with the disapproval of Councilman Ralph C. Clyde, who submitted a minority report recommending that the ordinance be amended to provide for the payment to the city of a license of 3 per cent of the gross annual receipts of the company. Councilman Maguire said today that he would favor the measure with the Clyde amendment incorporated.

Attorney L. A. McNary, representing the Denio company, stated the company would not install its system if the city adopted the Clyde amendment. He said the city would be getting enough return in the increased receipts of the Home company, which pays an annual tax on its gross revenue, and in the increased



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protection from fire afforded to houses by the Denio company, without the alarm device attached. He said the system had not met with favor in Los Angeles and Rochester, where it has been tried, and that it is not favored by the National Board of Fire Underwriters. Representatives of the Denio company say they will obtain the endorsement of the underwriters before installing the alarm service in this city.
