Ismay shook hands with a number of those gathered about him. He declared that the United States senate committee under Chairman Smith, which investigated the Titanic wreck, and before which Ismay was one of the chief witnesses, had treated him well.

Ismay characterized as unfair the American newspapers, by which he was made the target of criticism for escaping in the Titanic's lifeboats with the women and children instead of going down with the lost vessel.

FLOOD ALLEN TAKES STAND AS WITNESS

Bandit Nervous and Pale and Testifies in Voice That Shakes.

Wichita, Kan., May 11.—Nervous and pale, and in a shaking voice, which was almost inaudible, Flood Allen, of the notorious Allen bandit gang, on trial here for his life for the shooting of several persons in the Hillville courthouse, testified today in his own behalf.

Allen recited his history and swore that he told his attorney at the Hillville trial, which was interrupted by the murders committed by the Allen gang, that he intended to "take his medicine from Judge Thornton Massey."

Allen's two sons testified yesterday, saying they believed their "Pop" shot the man in the courtroom, but said he did so when he saw Clerk Good "pull a gun."

LOCAL OPTION LAW VIOLATOR ARRESTED

J. B. Lefeur, representing the Eastern Liquor house at 40 North Sixth street, was arrested at noon today by Deputy Sheriff Bulger for selling liquor in dry territory. This arrest is the result of a watch of several weeks by the officials in efforts to stop "underground" methods of liquor stores to evade the local option law.

With the arrest of Lefeur, evidence was also secured that liquor is being delivered each Saturday in large quantities in Montavilla and other dry precincts. Lefeur was arrested at the Standard Brick Yards on the Canyon road, where he was delivering the liquor. He claimed he solicited the order early in the week and therefore was not violating the law.

Part of Lefeur's orders had been delivered when Deputy Sheriff Bulger made the arrest. Lefeur had one quart nicely wrapped, bearing the name of F. Becker, another for Mr. Wright, and a half gallon of whiskey for Mr. Stockdale of Silverton, another half gallon for B. Wells of Silverton, and a gallon for Mr. Thompson of Silverton. For a quart of whiskey \$1 was collected. The half gallon just cost \$1.75.

Lefeur explained that this was his second trip to this precinct, having made one delivery last Saturday. He further stated he had sold liquor at Montavilla. His work was under the direction of the owner of the Eastern Liquor store. Lefeur further declared that the other liquor concerns in the city were doing a fine business in dry territory, especially in Montavilla.

TURNER, OR., FARMER ENDS LIFE BY CARBOLIC ACID

Mr. Green had been despondent for some time, and had threatened to take his life. Mr. Green was discovered by his daughter sitting in a chair in the kitchen, and, noticing something strange in his manner, she discovered the empty bottle. Medical aid was immediately called, but he died in a few minutes.

Mr. Green was 55 years of age and had lived in this vicinity for the past 30 years. He leaves a widow and five sons and four daughters.

The San Francisco delegation will be joined by advertising men from Oakland, Sacramento, Los Angeles, Portland, Tacoma, Spokane, Denver and Salt Lake, and after short stops at Salt Lake City, Pueblo, Denver and Kansas City will go direct to Dallas.

The Dallas convention will be attended by representatives of the advertising and publishing business from all points in the United States, Canada and England.

AMUSEMENT RULE SPLITS CHURCHMEN

Majority Report Favors Elimination by Methodists of Restricting Clause.

Minneapolis, May 11.—Two reports, caused by a split in regard to regulation of church amusements, were submitted here today to the quadrennial general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church by the committee on state of the church.

The majority report favored the elimination of the amusement clause from the rules of church discipline, so as to allow wider latitude to church members in this respect. The minority report favored leaving the rule unchanged. A marked division on the question occurred among the delegates. Today was the anniversary of the Men's Brotherhood organization of the church. Delegates from all parts of the world, numbering about 400, were present.

SHERIFF'S OFFICE AND CAMERON AT NEAR WAR

Trouble has broken out in earnest between the offices of Sheriff Stevens and District Attorney Cameron over the case of A. B. Conley, who is charged with contributing to the delinquency of a 16-year-old girl. Deputy Sheriff Leonard accuses the district attorney of not playing fair in handling the case. The district attorney accuses him of having knowledge of the case, saying it was handled by Deputy District Attorney Mitchell.

The storm broke between the offices Friday morning, when the deputy sheriff read an article in which the district attorney was quoted as saying the sheriff's office had the warrant for Conley, and "something must be done." Leonard immediately asked the sheriff to read the article. The sheriff read it and said he had seen the district attorney and everything was all right. Leonard then called the district attorney to the sheriff's office. The district attorney had charge of the case. Deputy Leonard learned Conley came into court Tuesday, entered a plea of not guilty, leaving the date of trial to be determined between the district attorney and Conley's attorney. Nothing was said to Leonard, who has been looking for Conley for three years. Leonard then demanded that the district attorney cancel the warrant, which was done. Leonard now accuses District Attorney Cameron with having knowledge of the court action, and also knowing considerable about the case.

The crime for which Conley was indicted was alleged to have been committed in November, 1908. He was indicted in March, 1909, and the trial taken from him at the Union depot, when they were ready to board a train for California. Conley escaped and has been traveling over the country since that time. He recently returned to La Grande, where he is known as the wheat king of eastern Oregon. Shortly after his indictment strenuous efforts were made to settle the case. The girl has become of age and is outside the jurisdiction of the court, and it may be difficult to have her return as a witness. However, efforts to this effect are being made. Conley was released upon his own recognizance and is at his home near La Grande.

Two Indians on Trial.

On charges of murder two Indians were arraigned in the United States court this morning. They were Andrew Faithful, charged with killing his wife on the Klamath reservation, and William Judah Jim, indicted for shooting to death Quimby Cheakaska. Both pleaded not guilty. They will be tried next week. Deputy United States attorney Johnson appeared for the government.

Taft Delegates Bolt.

Tacoma, Wash., May 11.—Angered by the fact that the progressives were in control of the county here this morning, 75 Taft men bolted in a body, apparently following a previously arranged plan, and proceeded to Eagles' hall to hold a rump convention.

ATTORNEY KING IS ACCUSED; FORMER CLIENT COMPLAINS

Lawyer Induced Man to Sign Over \$331.35 in Irregular Way, Says Complainant—Accused Before.

Henry C. King, attorney, a Republican nominee for the state legislature, has been made the defendant in a civil suit, charged with fraud on the part of King, who has often been before the public in a bad light because of alleged disregard of the law, and who has already faced disbarment proceedings on charges of unprofessional conduct.

One Joe Miller, an Austrian, is the plaintiff in the most recent suit against King, an action filed in the circuit court May 7 last. That King, taking unlawful advantage of Miller's inability to read or write the English language, so tricked him out of \$331.35 and a revolver valued at \$10 to the path of the complaint. Miller is suing for the recovery of the money.

Miller, it seems, was arrested in Portland September 18, 1911, on information from Aberdeen, Wash., that he was wanted there for participation in the robbing of a fellow countryman. At the time of his arrest \$331.35 in cash and a revolver were taken from his person and held by Chief of Police Silver pending the disposition of the case.

Signs Order for Money.

Miller hired King the next day, the complaint in the present case states, for the purpose of defending him and getting him out of jail, for the expressed and stipulated sum of \$50. It is further alleged in the complaint that at this time King sent to Miller with a document, purporting to be an order on Miller for \$50 in payment of the stipulated attorney fee, and that King demanded that Miller sign the document. Miller says that King gave him to understand clearly that the document was for \$50, and that King's solicitation and being unable to write, he "made his mark" as his signature to the order.

The court records show that Chief of Police Silver on September 18, 1911, turned over to King, upon his presentation, when he learned that \$5,000 of Miller's money, \$331.35, and also the revolver, then in the keeping of the chief of police. The basis of Miller's claim is that King is misrepresenting to him the nature of the paper which he signed, and which he was unable to read, fraudulently cheated him out of the sum of \$331.35. The \$331.35 Miller asks for is the remainder of the \$331.35 after deducting \$50 which Miller says he agreed to pay King for defending him.

It was for a similar offense in 1908 that King was charged with unprofessional practice by the grievance committee of the bar association. At that time it was claimed that King had charged one Roy Hunter, a client, \$500 for some services of slight consequence. It was also alleged that King had appeared in court in a drunken condition.

Assaults City Attorney.

The supreme court finally dismissed the disbarment complaint on motion of James C. Cole, the bar association prosecutor.

November 11, 1908, as a result of the disbarment prosecution, King assaulted City Attorney Frank Grant, in front of the Chamber of Commerce, and knocked him down. King then threatened personal violence to all who had been connected with his prosecution. King later brought suit against Grant, M. E. Payne, A. F. Fiegel and Ralph B. Fisher, all of whom had been connected with the disbarment proceedings, to recover \$11,000 for alleged damages for slander, because of the disbarment charges. The case was dismissed November 23, 1909, on motion of King's attorneys.

Another case in which charges of fraud were made against King was that brought by Frank Philippi, who claimed that King had fraudulently obtained from him a note in connection with an estate to which Philippi was an heir. King was cleared of this charge by County Judge Webster, who, however, reduced King's fee in the case from \$2000 to \$1500.

HAS MUCH PRAISE FOR CONTEST PLAN

Government Official Says Organization in Charge is Best in Country.

"No other city in the United States has so comprehensive an organization for school garden contest as Portland," declared C. H. Lane, first assistant in the educational division of the government department of agriculture, when he came to Portland this morning to address an audience of principals, teachers and advisory committees in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium at 4 o'clock this evening.

"I know of no more progressive or hopeful or inspiring organization than you have in Portland," continued Mr. Lane enthusiastically, after he had been informed concerning the plan of organization that has enlisted 15,000 boys and girls from the 53 schools of the city in a "bush, bean and cabbage" contest. "The nation is aroused over earth education. Next to Oregon, the southern states are perhaps more progressive. The value of the work is beyond dispute."

"I believe the earth education contest in Portland will so convince the school directors of its importance, economically and as valuable student activity, that the study will be included in the school curriculum. Instructors should be appointed for this work. The greatest difficulty in the earth education movement is to find teachers who can teach elementary agriculture."

At the meeting in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium tonight Professor Lane will illustrate his address with views that show how gardens are made in all the cities of the United States. He has made earth education almost a life-time occupation and came to the department at Washington from the chair of agriculture in the University of Tennessee.

This afternoon, by courtesy of Frank C. Riggs, head of the Packard Motor Car company in Portland, Professor Lane visited the Irvington, Woodlawn and other school gardens. He was accompanied by O. M. Plummer, vice chairman, and James J. Sayer, secretary of the general committee, by Mr. Huggins, Calvin C. Thompson, and the chairman of the general committee. He expressed the greatest interest in the work as it is going forward in Portland and throughout Oregon, and expressed surprise when he learned that 15,000 exhibitors are expected at the all-city exhibit in the Armory, June 15, and 50,000 exhibitors at the all-state exhibit in connection with the state fair at Salem next September.

BOTH LIGHT SCRAPPERS READY FOR STRUGGLE

Wolgast said he would waste in from the start, as though no decision could be given, a popular verdict against him would be damaging. Ritchie also declared he would fight every second.

From Spokane they plan a sid trip into British Columbia to look over a district with a view to possibly making an extension into that territory. President John H. Young, who will succeed Mr. Gray here, will arrive in Portland next week from Seattle, where he is now winding up his affairs as president of the Alaska Steamship company and general manager of the Copper River railroad.

CLACKAMAS PIONEER DIES OF PARALYSIS

Oregon City, Or., May 11.—W. W. Watsenbaugh, a prominent pioneer of Clackamas county, and a veteran of the Civil war, died early today of paralysis. He was stricken Friday and did not regain consciousness. He was a member of Meade Post, Grand Army of the Republic. He always took a prominent part in memorial day celebrations and other exercises.

Mr. Watsenbaugh, who was 74 years of age, is survived by his widow and the following children: Thomas Longdon, Fred and John Watsenbaugh, Mrs. O. T. Clark, Mrs. D. Howland and Mrs. E. Macdonald. Meade Post, Grand Army of the Republic, will have charge of the funeral, which probably will be held Sunday afternoon.

Woman's Mind Breaks.

Tacoma, Wash., May 11.—Miss Pearl Wilcox, aged 35, of Hillhurst, who attended the funeral of Robert Ritchie two days ago, collapsed in a nervous breakdown and the next day became raving insane. She was committed to Stellanor asylum this morning. Physicians are hopeful for her recovery. As far as known she was not a close friend of the dead man.

Gets Evidence Against Enumerators.

To complete the preparation of evidence against three census supervisors and one enumerator under indictment for alleged census frauds in Portland, Hart Monahan, special agent for the Census Bureau, is in the city. The cases will come up for trial next month.
