

FINAL GAME GOES TO VICTORIA BEES IN BOBBLY BATTLE

Adams' Double Play in Ninth Stops Imminent Rally and Robs Colts of 3 to 2 Contest; Nurdyke Injured.

Portland didn't figure to win yesterday's game with Narveson pitching unshakable and Jimmy Adams flagging. But the Bees, under ordinary circumstances would have given for a hit and scored two runs. Portland's hope of a comeback was made in the second inning on a wild throw by Narveson, else the Bees might have been blanked. On the other hand the Bees stung Doty for four hits in the first inning, one of which brought in two of the three runs drawn by the visitors. The other was made on a hit, a stolen base and two errors. The afternoon was marked by an unfortunate accident that befell Lou Nurdyke, who broke a small bone in his right ankle, while sliding to second in the fourth.

The largest crowd that ever attended a Northwestern league game in Portland was present, there being some 4,000 fans of both warring bands. The large crowd was an endorsement of the splendid article of baseball being played in Northwestern league under the leadership of President Fielder Jones.

The First Round.
The game was a ground out to Williams in the first round, when Adams poked one into right and Kennedy followed with a slam to left that put Jimmy on third and Ed took second on the throw in. At this juncture Behemoth Meek charged into left field and both Adams and Kennedy scored. Nurdyke fled to center, which was followed by Keller's infield roller to the same place that went for a hit, but Brennan closed the inning by popping to Kibbie.

The count was evened in the second round. Harris opened with a single but was forced at second on Kibbie's attempted sacrifice. Coltrin fled to Rawlings, but Doty was ticked with a pitched ball. Meek hit a tantalizing roller to Narveson and had it beaten out when the Moose Jaw recruit hurried in from the outfield to head to the bleacher netting. Kibbie and Doty scored and Meek reached third before the ball was returned to the infield. Adams couldn't get the pill past Brennan and the inning was over.

Nurdyke's Leg Broken.
Nurdyke walked in the fourth inning and started to steal second. He "hooked" into the bag and beat Harris' throw but snapped a small bone in the right ankle when his heel spiked caught and rolled over the bag, being touched out by Coltrin. Lou was carried to the clubhouse, where Dr. J. D. Sternberg rendered first aid, and he was then taken to St. Vincent's hospital for treatment. Dr. Sternberg stated that it would be two months at least before the popular Victoria manager would be able to get back into the game.

Merritt, who went to right field after Nurdyke's injury, Kennedy going to first, singled into left and stole second. Brennan hit one down to Coltrin that Bobby bobbled and Merritt took third, whence he scored on Doty's bad throw to Williams to catch Brennan napping. Brennan didn't try to take second, but was safe there when Meek dropped the ball on his attempted steal. Eddie getting an error. Rawlings' hit into a sparkling double play, Coltrin grabbing his hard fly and mousing Brennan at second on a throw to Meek.

Williams started the ninth with a poke to right and took second on Harris' sacrifice. Kibbie walked and the pair moved up on Coltrin's fielder's choice to Narveson, who made a slow play on third. With the sacks groaning from their weight, Moore was sent in to bat for Doty. Otto shot a low fly to center, but the foxy Jimmy Adams was playing right back of second and lassoed it off his shoetops, doubling Kibbie out.

B. RODGERS AND B. SPEARS ARE FIGHT STARS OF THEIR RESPECTIVE LINEUPS

Champion Must Be in Better Shape in July, Says Naughton.

Captain Bill Rodgers was the bright and shining star in the series which the Portland Beavers won from the Sacramento Senators last week. Rodgers was second in the batting averages for the week, with .356 and led in extra base hitting. His slouts were very timely and netted the Beavers several scores. He hit for a total of 12 extra bases.

Walter Louie was the leading hitter of the week with the percentage of .423. The former Southern leaguer lacked the pill of a terrific clip. Artie Krueger was also strong with the willow, hitting at .318.

The batting averages of Beavers and Senators were far below the weekly standard. Butler hit pretty well but his reason for being benched is unexplained. He was outplayed by the Beavers.

He hit for 10 doubles, 4 triples and 1 home run, a total of 34 extra bases, while the Senators managed to get 11 extra bases, 2 home runs, a triple and a double.

Hope led the base stealers with three steals, and Hancock was second with two. That the Beavers have hit their stride is shown by the fact that they fielded against the Senators only eight errors were credited to them during the week and they batted 272 chances, 106 of which were fielding assists.

Big Dave Gregg pitched all over the Senators while he worked, but the heat got the better of him in the eighth inning and he retired in favor of Temple, after walking Miller. Temple managed to get by all right.

Bancroft scored the first run for the Beavers, in the first inning. Schwenk was sent to the mound and Ban was safe on Shinn's error. Then he stole second and also third, scoring on Krueger's long sacrifice fly.

Two batters in succession by Krueger, Rapp and Dougan and a single by Lindsay gave the Beavers three runs in the third. Baum then relieved Schwenk.

WOLGAST NOT LAD WHO BEAT NELSON

Champion Must Be in Better Shape in July, Says Naughton.

Bill Naughton, the veteran San Francisco ring scribbler, whose word is the final in things pugilistic, has the following to say of Ad Wolgast and his bout with Willie Ritchie Saturday:

It was well that Wolgast knocked Ritchie down twice for had it not been for his success in that direction, the crowd would have felt like giving Ritchie the credit of a victory over the price of 123 pounds. This because Ritchie outboxed Wolgast in each of the other three rounds and sent him staggering repeatedly with hard lefts and rights.

A knock-out blow, of course, wipes out all the indignities previously thrust upon a fighter by a pastering opponent and as a knock-out blow is the nearest thing to a knockout it stands to reason that a referee would take more heed than of a number of blows which did not carry knock-down force.

On this basis of reasoning it is possible that if a decision had been given it would have been in favor of Wolgast. If, however, there had been a decision and it had been a draw, the writer believes it would have found favor with the majority of the spectators.

Is Not the Fighter.

To judge from Wolgast's showing he is not the fighter he was before the operation for appendicitis. If his contest with Joe Rivers, were scheduled for a week or two from now the chances are that Rivers would be an even money choice if, indeed, not a favorite.

As sure as the sun shines, if Wolgast is in no better shape in July than he was Saturday there will be a different tale to tell.

One of the most noticeable things about Wolgast's boxing was the frequency with which he missed. Only one out of every four blows reached the mark. Ritchie on the contrary, lashed out with wonderful precision and if it had not been for the local man's nervous condition, Wolgast would have fared worse than he did.

The importance of the occasion overwhelmed Wolgast. He was in a flustered condition when he appeared in the ring—but not from fear, for he is a game lad. The idea of his meeting with the world's champion had its effect on his nervous system. Instead of taking things coolly and watching for a chance to inflict a severe blow, he was all nervousness as he tore after Wolgast and defeated the very purpose he had in view.

Ad's Defense Poor.

Wolgast's defense was poor and after what happened in the first round, was proof that the operation had had its effect. In forcing Ritchie toward the ropes, Wolgast slid up on Ritchie's shoulders while the San Franciscan was ducking and then dropped his haunches to the floor. A look of pain came over the champion's face and Ritchie chivalrously grabbed Wolgast in his arms and assisted him to his feet.

Wolgast, when the round ended, seemed to sink in the chair in his corner and the look of distress was still with him. He said later that he had hurt his back when he bumped over Ritchie in the manner described, and it is more likely that the jar he received when he collided with Ritchie's shoulder was felt by the champion somewhere near the seat of the surgeon's operation. If this surmise be correct it means that the Wolgast has a poor chance of keeping up his championship title for the title bump he received today did not seem severe enough to distress the average properly trained ring man.

BATTERED AD GOES EAST FOR BIG REST

Champion Won't Box Again Until He Meets Wells Next June.

(United Press Local Wire.)
San Francisco, May 12.—Suffering with a badly split lip, two black eyes and a lame back, strapped up with adhesive plaster, Champion Ad Wolgast, accompanied by his wife and manager, Tom Jones, and wife, left today for his home in Cadillac, Mich., for a rest.

It is probable that the injuries suffered in his bout with Ritchie here Saturday may prevent the champion's bout with Daniels in St. Joseph, Mo., next Friday night. For the first time in his career Wolgast flatly admits he may fear to fight. "I want to look this fellow Daniels over before I make sure," is the way he puts it.

Wolgast gives Willie Ritchie credit for putting up the hardest four rounds in which he has ever engaged, but declares he would have stopped the San Franciscan man in a few more rounds. While his lame back is bothering him considerably, he said he would be in trim for his bout with Matt Wells in New York June 1, and would easily beat Joe Rivers in Los Angeles, July 4.

Wolgast and Jones will stop off in

St. Joseph, and if the Daniels match is called off, will hurry at once to Michigan, from which state Jones will continue to New York in advance for the Wells match and whatever other bouts he can pick up for the champion.

Wolgast is more worried about his back than he will admit. He branched it in the same way four years ago in a bout with Jack Richmond. Three stitches were taken in the champion's lip.
