

13 BURIED MINERS DIE WHEN BLOCKED SHAFT IS FILLED WITH GASES

Cave-in Chokes Shaft With
Debris and All but Two of
Entombed Workers Die.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Ironwood, Mich., May 14.—Thirteen
men known to be dead as a result of a
cave-in today in the Norris iron mine near
Ironwood. Two were rescued at noon,
the rest perishing in the poisonous
gases which filled the mine.
The cave-in blocked the mine shaft
with debris. It is believed the lower
workings of the mine are burning. Work
on all neighboring properties was sus-
pended, and rescue parties formed.
These are searching for bodies.

Five saloons were consumed.
The town is to be rebuilt immediately,
some of the burned out business map
beginning today. Seaside was not well
laid out before and the new city will
be a better looking one. Streets are to
be widened and a new water system
installed.
No one was injured. A water short-
age was felt soon after the fire began
and the flames thereafter went un-
checked.

The Astoria fire department came,
leaving Astoria at 1:30 o'clock this
morning by special train and reaching
Seaside 32 minutes later. In 15 minutes
more the engine was in action on the
banks of the Necanicum but too late to
save any business houses.
The fire began in the rear of the
Bridge Exchange saloon. A few articles
of value were carried to the street and
some of these burned later. A resume

Fires Many; Loss Small

May fires are numerous in
Oregon and Washington but tim-
ber loss is trifling so far. No
green timber is ablaze; none
probably will burn at this sea-
son. The principal danger is to
logging camps and farm build-
ings, several of the latter burn-
ing near Rainier and one log-
ging camp near Grays Harbor.
The following fires exist:
In Nehalem valley, Oregon
On Washougal river, back of
Prindle, near the Clarke-Skan-
ania boundary.
Between Rainier and Aslary,
Or.
On upper Necanicum river,
Clatsop county, Oregon.
Along the Tillamook county
beach on Tillamook bay.
In slashings on Hamilton
creek, Linn county.
Near Lake Vainault and
around some of the dams and
Polson logging camps in Che-
halia county, Washington.
Near Estacada and Bridal
Veil, Or., and in many other lo-
calities.

Telephone wires are down and further
information has not reached Rainier.
The district now burning is stump land
or land burned over in former years. No
green timber is ablaze. It is rumored
the Portland Lumber company has suf-
fered some loss.

A severe windstorm sprang up at noon

yesterday and probably caused slashing
fires to spread.

Blasier's Camps in Danger

Stevenson, Wash., May 14.—Seven
miles north of Prindle, Wash., in the
woods belonging to the Blasier Timber
company, a fire has roused out the
camps of the vicinity. Ninety men
were trying last night to check it. Camp
3 of the Blasier company had hard work
to save its equipment and bunkhouse
and cookhouse. The wind is down-
stream. The fire has crossed Washougal
river.
A locomotive on the Blasier logging
road ran through and got the women
from Camp 4, bringing them down to a
safer place.
It is reported here a fire exists back
of Bridal Veil, Or.

Coats' Camp Buildings Lost

(Special to The Journal.)
Aberdeen, Wash., May 14.—Fire which
broke out in the slashings of the Coats
Logging company yesterday did consid-
erable damage, burning over a mile
square. It is under control today.
Camp No. 4, together with all buildings
and engines, was destroyed. The loss
of logs is nominal.

The warm weather of the past few
days made good opportunity for burning
of slashings, which must be done before
June 1, and in all directions fires were
set by loggers, who seek to burn over
the workings, thus lessening the danger
in hot weather.

It is said fire has endangered the
little town of London, 13 miles north
of here, and that Polson's camp 7, in
that vicinity, is in danger. Warm
weather is prevailing today and the
wind has changed from east to north-
west.

Residents at Lake Quinalt are en- gaged in fighting to save the Highly Hotel, which is said to have been in danger last night.

State Forester's Reports

(Special to The Journal.)
Salem, Or., May 14.—Ten days ago
State Forester Elliott sent notice to all
timber owners in the state to burn their
slashings before dry season. As a re-
sult many fires are burning, but so far
no information that any have seriously
got beyond control has come.

The supervising warden of Columbia
county wired the state forester today
that a fire near Clatskanie may get be-
yond control. Another message was re-
ceived from the warden in Clatsop coun-
ty that a fire was spreading on the
upper Necanicum river. A report was
received that a fire was raging in Linn
county, on the headwaters of Hamilton
creek, but investigation showed it was
confined to slashings.

"These small fires probably are due
to lack of precautionary measures,"
said State Forester Elliott. "Undoubt-
edly they have failed to make proper
trenches around the slashings. But I
do not anticipate any serious fires at
this time. The timber is too green for
fire to gain headway in standing tim-
ber. I am glad to see that timber own-
ers are burning the slashings now in-
stead of leaving them to be fire traps
in dry season."

Three Bay City Buildings Burn

(Special to The Journal.)
Bay City, Or., May 14.—Fire broke
out yesterday in the timber in the
northwest part of town. Three build-
ings were burned. Grave fear was en-
tertained yesterday for the cannery of
the Oregon Fishing company and sev-
eral residences. Several small fires in
the timber east and south of the city
are reported. If the wind freshens the
fire will endanger Hobsonville and

Clatskanie Is Smoke Enveloped

Clatskanie, Or., May 14.—The large
fire which started yesterday in the tim-
ber adjacent to Benson's camp east of
town has been brought under control,
with very little loss to the timber own-
ers. Fires are also raging in the Ne-
halem valley south of here and near the
Jennings McRae's camp west. The en-
tire city is enveloped by smoke from the
surrounding forest fires.

GUADALAJARA AWAITS ERUPTION OF VOLCANO

Mexico City, May 14.—Four earth-
quakes in rapid succession today led to
the belief that a volcano below the city
of Guadalajara is about to erupt. Four
buildings were engulfed today and 19
damaged, while steam and sulphur
fumes issued from cracks in the earth.
Guadalajara is virtually deserted, the
people fully believing that the whole
city is doomed to be swallowed up.

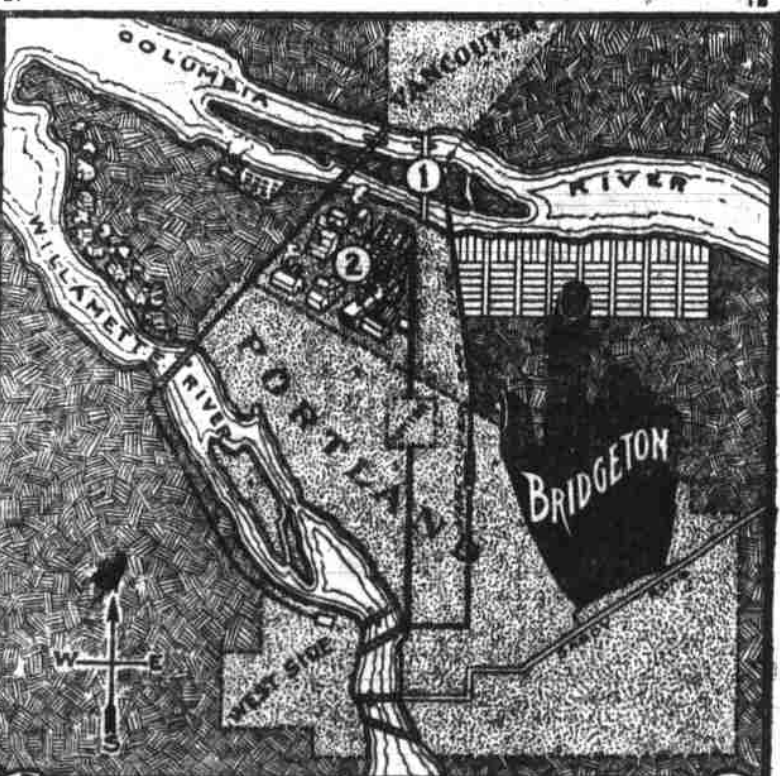
