

MOTORBOAT CRUISE PRONOUNCED BEST

Portland Excursionists Royally
Entertained by Residents
of Wilsonville.

Taking the accommodations of the little town of Wilsonville, Portland motorboatists yesterday enjoyed the greatest river cruise in their history, which began Saturday afternoon and ended last evening, with a chicken dinner, a big dance and a racing card as the two days' entertainment features.

Bill Flynn, one of the big Wilsonville citizens, had the affair in charge and he showed the Portlanders the time of their lives. There was something doing every moment.

The boats left the yacht club at three o'clock Saturday afternoon and made an imposing spectacle as they passed up the stream and through the Oregon City locks.

A chicken dinner was served Saturday evening at Wilsonville and it was followed by a dance. At the close of the hop a late supper was served in the dining rooms of the two hotels.

Races Are Entertaining.

The motor boat races were started at 1 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

In a close race for six horsepower boats, the Jug was winner over the Marguerite. Ferry finished third in the race.

The Ruth K. won the cruiser race from the Flick. In the runabout race the Betty Brown won from J. A. Krela's new boat.

The feature race of the day was the one speed event, which was won by the Question Mark. The Winsome, the other boat starting in the race, withdrew on account of engine trouble.

The Charmalee and the Sylph did not enter any of the races.

The boats began the return voyage at 5 o'clock, the cruisers arriving here before sundown.

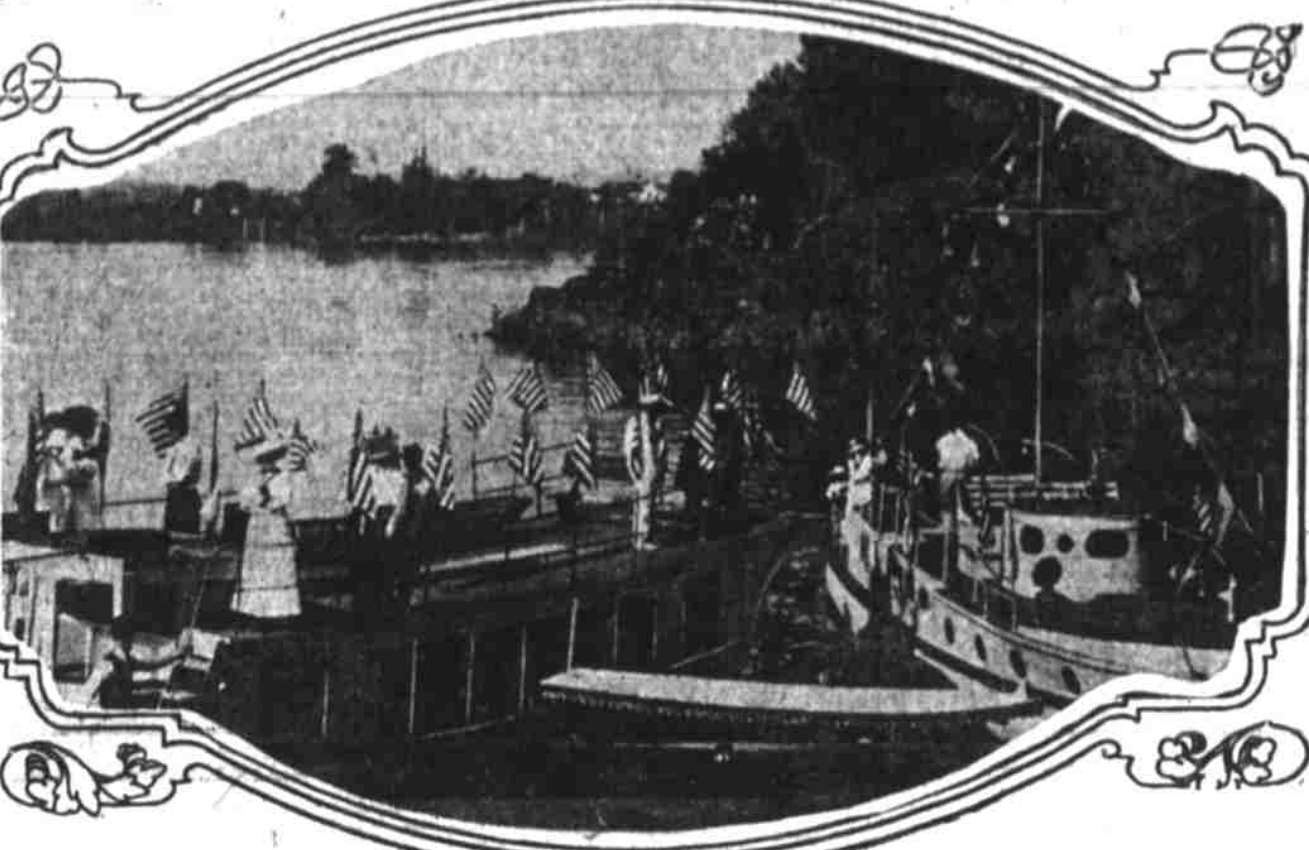

WASHINGTON LUMBERMEN BUY KLAMATH MILL

Klamath Falls, Or., May 20.—Through a deal closed last week the Innes-Clarke Lumber company disposed of its sawmill and lumber plant in West Klamath Falls to G. A. Daly, S. G. Daly and

J. D. Morrison of Leavenworth, Wash. Under the name of the Klamath Lumber company the new concern expects to open the plant early next week. The plant has a daily capacity of 50,000 to 60,000 feet, and it is the intention of the owners to run the mill to its full capacity all summer. The company has quite a large amount of logs ready to be rafted to the mill.

GOVERNOR ASKS TIME TO NAME SUCCESSOR TO JUDGE CULBERTSON

Salem, Or., May 20.—The resignation of County Judge Culbertson of Hood River county was received by Governor West today. Judge Culbertson is preparing to move to Portland. Governor West said:
"In conversation with me some days ago Judge Culbertson intimated that he might resign and that 'so and so' would be a good man to succeed him. I do not remember who 'so and so' was, but it was perhaps one of the men the judge suggests in this letter of resignation, which arrived only this morning."
"Inasmuch as I have been bombarded with telegrams of endorsement and protest during the last few days, I would suggest that the good people of Hood River just calm themselves for a short time and give me a chance to look over the field and pick out a man who will know something about both business and roads."
Judge Culbertson recommended W. L. Clark and also mentioned M. M. Hill and Lawrence Blowers as desirable men for appointment.

STRAWBERRY FESTIVAL AT MILTON, JUNE 6

KELSO TO BUILD TWO SCHOOL HOUSES

Kelso, Wash., May 20.—Two school houses are to be built in Kelso this summer. The west side school is to be a two story nine room building 62x92 feet in size, with a full nine foot concrete basement, a principal's room and library. The south side school is to be 64x80 feet in size, one story and four rooms, besides a principal's room and full basement. Modern sanitary drinking fountains and plumbing, roomy cloak rooms, wide halls and ample fire escape equipment feature the plans.

TRY GRAIN CROPS ON OLD LAKE BED

Experiment in Harney County
May Show Value of
Waste Land.

Drewsey, Or., May 20.—Dr. Denman is seeding 200 or 300 acres of old lake bed land near Saddle Butte to grain crops. It is an experiment that will be watched with interest, as it is on rather a large scale and on a class of land that has not been farmed to any extent in this section. Dr. Denman will devote most of it to barley, but will also try oats and wheat. It was necessary to dig to prevent the lake water from submerging the land, which was formerly lake bed. Should a good crop be produced on this soil it will open up a large area that has been considered almost worthless. Another beneficial feature will be the hastening of a reservoir system to keep such land from overflowing and thus do a twofold duty—conserve the flood water for use on dry land at a season when needed and reclaim the swamp now being submerged by the floods.

WHAT IS PENALTY FOR SABBATH BREAKING?

Will Sabbath breakers in this life have any part in the eternal Sabbath of heaven? This question was left with his audience yesterday by Rev. J. H. Leiper, secretary of the Northwest Sabbath association, who spoke on the observance and meaning of Sabbath. According to Mr. Leiper, the Sabbath has two uses—rest for the body and growth for the soul. The time for each, he declared, has been wisely arranged by the Master. The day he also arranged for when the decalogue was given to the people.
"Six great events of Bible history occurred on the Sabbath," said Mr. Leiper, "the completion of the creation, the giving of the law from Sinai, the fall of Jericho as a type of the final overthrow of the kingdom of Satan and the triumph of Christianity, the resurrection of the Saviour, the descent of the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost, the descent of the glorified Christ to Patmos to give John the final revelation. The second coming of Christ is also prophesied for the Sabbath day."

GIRL DANCERS AGREE NOT TO GET MARRIED

One dozen girls who arrived in Portland this morning from Seattle are under contract not to marry in their tour of America. They are the "Famous Twelve Sunshine Girls," headliners of the Orpheum bill which opens this afternoon. Each of the girls is a graduate of the school of dancing conducted by John Tiller, who is hailed as the greatest dancing master of the world. Tiller required all the ladies under his charge to bind themselves to an anti-alter obligation before leaving London. He has been appointed their guardian throughout their American tour and has guaranteed to return the girls to London single.
"We do not want to marry any way," say all the Sunshine Girls.
As an example of the care John Tiller takes of his charges, it is related that he was summoned before court in Paris on complaint of a "masher" whom he thrashed for annoying one of the girls.
