

GRAMMAR STARS TO MEET TUESDAY

Annual Track Games Will Give Fans Some Interesting Events.

Tuesday, May 22, is the definite date of the annual track and field meet of the Portland grammar schools.

Professor Krohn will try to secure the consent of the school board to have school dismissed at 2:30 o'clock on the afternoon of the meet to allow the boys plenty of time to get dressed for the affair, which will begin promptly at 3:30 o'clock.

Open—100 yards dash; 120 yard hurdles, low, half mile run; half mile relay; 4 runners; running high jump; broad jump; pole vault; shotput, 12 pound; throwing baseball, for distance.

Only one entry from each school for each event will be accepted. No pupil will be permitted to enter for more than three events, including the relay races.

A first and second prize medal will be awarded in each event. The winning relay team will receive a cup for the school, and each of the winning teams will receive a medal in addition.

Class of 1912 Will Greatly Deplete Athletic Strength of Oregon.

(Special to The Journal.) University of Oregon, Eugene, May 21.—The graduation of the class of 1912 will add a number of illustrious names to Oregon's Hall of Fame. In President Robert Kellogg, Martin M. Hawkins and Ben H. Williams are three Oregon track champions. Kellogg has been heavy point winner in nearly every event he has entered. Hawkins is holder of the northwest record of 15:3-8 seconds for the high hurdles and 25:1-5 seconds for the low hurdles. His time of 15:3-8 seconds for the high stakes gives him a tie with Beeson and McClive of California, and Kelly of Southern California for the coast record.

Williams is holder of the northwest record of 13 ft. 1 inch in the pole vault. The track team will also lose Earl Latourette, the hurdler; Ed Henderson, in the weights; J. L. Watkins will start the running events and Edgar E. Frank will be clerk of the course. The rest of the officials will be selected tonight.

The entries will close tonight and work on getting the program printed will be started tomorrow. Columbia university is the only school that has turned in its complete entry list. The others will be filed before tonight.

The meet Saturday will be the largest and best ever held by the local scholastics and several records are expected to be made that will stand for some time to come.

Some Close Races. Some close finishes of the running races are expected. In the hundred yard dash the race between Dick Grant of the Washington high school and Goresky of Columbia should be a bumper, as both runners have made the distance in 10:1-5 seconds this season.

A new state record in the high jump is also expected. Bob Woodworth of the Lincoln high school made the mark of 3 feet 9:1-3 inches at the O. A. C. meet last Saturday.

Veit Windnagle of the Washington high school also expects to break a world record in the mile and half mile events.

The Washington high school will enter at least three men to each event. Lincoln will enter at least a dozen athletes and Jefferson will probably be represented by 15 men.

Columbia has entered 10 men in the meet, including Malarkey, Kirkland, Mulhead, Goresky, Fitzgerald, Lake and Lacey.

The meet will begin promptly at 2 o'clock and the receipts will be devoted to the American Olympic fund to send Uncle Sam's athletes to Stockholm this summer.
