Tehran, May 21.—Kahn Zephren, known as "The Garibaldi of Persia," and constitutional general of that country, is dead today by the hand of an unknown assassin. He was murdered while sitting in his tent after a brilliant victory over Salard-Dowleh's command, when with only 400 men he completely routed the 15,000 Persian official's force of 1500 men. The murder has created a tremendous sensation throughout Persia.

AVIATOR AS MAIL MAN TO FLY TO WASHINGTON. (Special to The Journal.) New York, May 21.—Paul Peck, the well known young aviator, has fixed tomorrow morning as the time for beginning his attempt to carry 100 pounds of mail matter from this city to Washington by aeroplane. The experiment has the sanction of the postoffice department, and will be watched with much interest by the officials, especially in view of the fact that the recent progress made in the science of aviation has given rise to the hope that ultimately the regular conveyance of mail by this means may be practicable. In order to comply with the law, Peck has been sworn into the postal service, and his machine, on its departure from New York for the capital, will fly a pennant bearing the words, "United States Mail."

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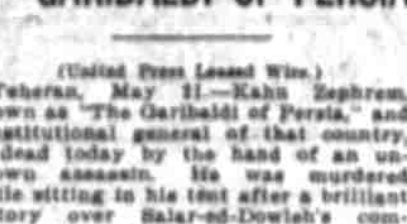
