An injection in the gum will make all the little nerve ends there dead to any pain and the dentist can drill away in the tooth without disturbing the patient in the least, it was demonstrated today. If the nerve in the tooth itself is to be extracted, after thus treating the gum a hole is drilled high in the tooth through the outer coating and into the spongy interior of the bone. An in-jection into this, it was shown in the clinics, will filter up to the nerve, and when the nerve is pulled out the patient might be taking a nap without losing a wink of sleep.
