

# OREGON TRACKMEN STRONG FOR MEET

Twelve Men Will Meet Washington in Dual Clash Saturday.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Or., May 22.—The Oregon varsity track team will leave Eugene tomorrow morning for Seattle to compete in a dual meet against the University of Washington. Trainer Hayward will carry twelve men on the trip. Eleven of these men are assured of their places. The remainder being position lies between Obersteuffer and Brooks, one of whom will run on the relay team.

Captain Kelling will be entered in the shot, hammer and discus. Neil will take care of the javelin and will compete in the discus throw. Stoller will compete in the high jump and Williams in the triple vault. Hays will still run his distance men in competition. Holden, McClure, McGuire and Higgins will be carried on the trip. It is probable that McClure will run the half and the mile, Higgins the mile, Boylen the quarter and half, and McGuire the two miles.

Oregon may be without an entry in the century, as Jones will probably be reserved for the 200 and quarter. Luretts will be run in the hurdles and Hawkins will take part in the hurdles, the broad jump and the javelin throw. The relay team will be composed of Brooks or Obersteuffer.

## DECISIVE VOTE UPON MEASURE TAKEN IN COUNCIL TOMORROW

(Continued From Page One.) railroad, remained in the measure after heated debate.

This is a matter of the gravest importance and the country and especially the Pacific coast, cannot afford to lose in the fight for free tolls to American shipping in the domestic trade," said J. N. Teal, counsel for the transportation committee of the Portland chamber of commerce and chairman of the special committee appointed by the chambers of commerce of the Pacific coast to wage the campaign for free Panama canal tolls.

### Ack Eastern Friends.

Tomorrow the question will come up for final settlement and in the meantime we must do every endeavor to strengthen our position. The Pacific coast delegations stand solid for free tolls and therefore our every effort must be made to clinch a complete victory by bringing to our assistance congressional representatives from the eastern states. This must be through our eastern connections and friends and everyone having the welfare of the country at heart is urged to use every influence at his command in behalf of this campaign. Action must be prompt, for tomorrow the final vote will be taken.

If we succeed in our efforts to have the free toll measure adopted, there is nothing that has happened in years that will have as profound effect on Pacific coast development.

### Railroad Monopoly Barred.

The eastern burning railroads from holding stock in vessels engaged in the coastwise trade and which will profit by the amendment is most important, for it will mean an impetus to American shipping. It will mean that individuals and independent companies will find a field for operations that would be less inviting were the railroads interested. It throws open competition between water and rail, for which purpose the canal is being built. It will mean the upbuilding of an American March machine.

The majority report of the special committee was for \$1 per ton on domestic traffic through the canal, but the vote of the house as a committee of the whole yesterday afternoon turned down this report and voted for free tolls. I received this morning from Congressman Lafferty a telegram stating that free tolls for coastwise traffic was agreed to by the house in committee of the whole, and that the amendment carried by a vote of 100 for and 90 against. He stated that the telegram that the final vote will be taken all Thursday morning. Congressman Lafferty stated that tremendous enthusiasm marked the victory yesterday, and that provisions were retained in the bill barring railroads from owning stock in ships using the canal under the free toll amendment.

### Need for Promptness.

Mr. Teal this morning urged the various commercial and industrial organizations in the Pacific northwest to do all in their power in aid of the campaign.

## The Oregon Law on Advertising

Any person, who in a newspaper or other periodical, or in public advertisement, or by letter, telegraph, or otherwise, makes or disseminates any statement or assertion concerning the quantity or quality, the value, the price, the method of producing or manufacturing, or the source or purchase of such merchandise, or the motive or purpose of any sale which is untrue or calculated to mislead, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding \$500 and on conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$50, or by imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding 20 days, and if the fine is not paid, by imprisonment in the county jail until and if necessary to satisfy the same.
