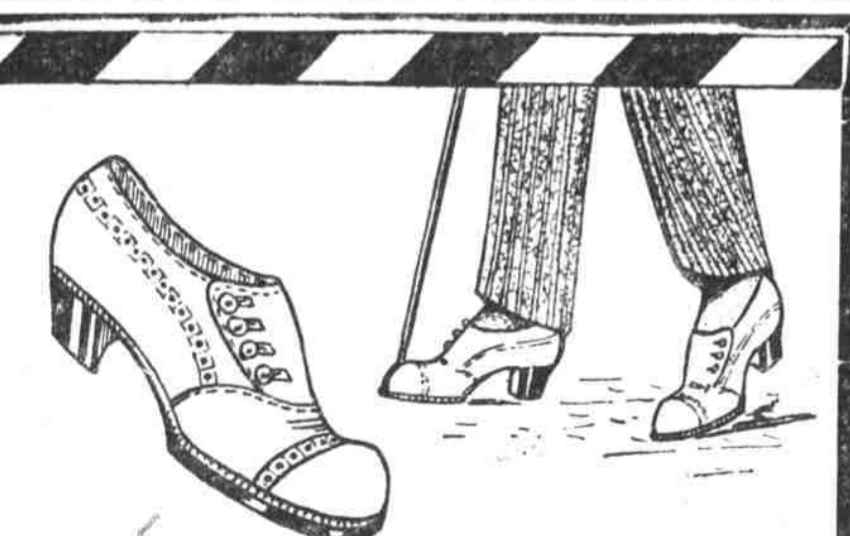

Manufactures Needed.

Bay City has a fine start. It has electric lights, telephones, plumbing, the best of drainage, clean streets and lots, well painted buildings, a commercial club of 50 members, rail transportation and water transportation for very light draught vessels. But there is practically no payroll and of the inhabitants 40 are fishermen and 70 are children.

The burden of last night's elaborate affair, for example, devolved upon fewer than 20 men. Everywhere the town shows evidences of needing outside capital. The resident contingent has done splendidly in giving the place its present appearance and needs help to get lumber manufactures started, to deepen the bar, to start berry raising, to whop out stumps.

On Maunoh Tour.

Yesterday afternoon two large launches left Tillamook with all the Portlanders who were taken all about Tillamook Bay and shown the great port problems of Tillamook, Bay City and Bayocean. On Bayocean itself the private promoters have already spent much money and are achieving excellent results, having a spot of great possibilities to work with.
The thoroughness with which Tillamook and Bay City are acting as host, leaving no time, trouble or expense, has given them a reputation with the party for real frontier hospitality. A chance to show appreciation to Tillamook at least came at luncheon yesterday when a Tillamook speaker chanced to say that \$13,000 had been subscribed by Tillamook men for a hotel and that \$12,000 more would have to be raised.

Raising Building Fund.

"We have subscribed to the common stock ourselves," he said, "and hope to get our rich dairymen to take the preferred stock, which guarantees 8 per cent."
E. J. Jaeger said: "I'll take \$100 worth of that stock." And although Chairman Shrode, president of the commercial club, said the Portlanders had not been told about the hotel to induce them to subscribe, \$3500 was put up in \$100 to \$500 lots, Mr. Jaeger doubling his original subscription.
