The operator's book showed the following message from Captain Rostron of the Carpathia:

"Ismy's under opiate." Both Captain Haddock and Operator Moore swore that they had not received orders to suppress messages. Captain Haddock said that his first information of the disaster came from the Carpathia.

At the request of Senator Smith, Captain Haddock lowered one of the Olympic's lifeboats. It only required five seconds to get the lifeboat from the deck to the water.

Dr. House and Williamson ask \$50 each to make an examination of Roberts, who will be placed on trial June 3 for the Whitehouse road murders. The county court has refused to allow this fee. Kay said the girl was misrepresented the facts. Kay replied that Powers was not telling the truth. Each man then asked the other if he wanted to make out that he was a liar.

"Will take it which ever way you wish," said Powers. "You're a liar," said Kay. At this, Powers called Kay a bigger liar, whereupon Judge Gates ordered the two men to desist from such accusations. "Call me that outside the courtroom," Kay said, "and there will be something doing." "I'll call you that outside the room, too," answered the attorney. However, when the men left the courtroom, neither said anything.

Myrtle Creek Man to Do Missionary Work
E. B. Barber, a prominent and active resident of Myrtle Creek, Or., leaves Portland today for St. Paul, Minn., Chicago and other centers in the middle states, to do missionary work for Oregon. He will lecture on country life and farm education in the public schools of Oregon, with a view to spreading the movement and arousing interest in this state.

Barber is a member of Governor West's country life commission, and is an enthusiast in the work of spreading information and education that will arouse interest in country life. He is also organizer for the State Grange.

Sentenced to Rockpile.
James Valcourt, Henry Blanco and Buck Tilman, three alleged burglar, who were found guilty by a jury last Thursday, were this morning sentenced by Judge Tawell to 30 days each on the rockpile, and Mary Smith and Josie Gorman, arrested at the same time and place, were each sentenced to 30 days in jail. The arrest was made at Fifth and Couch streets.

PANAMA CANAL WORK GOING AHEAD FAST

O. M. Clark returned this morning from Panama, bringing the report that work is progressing on the canal with splendid dispatch, 36,057 employees being on the payroll. Mr. Clark was a member of the Pacific coast business men's excursion which left San Francisco for the canal zone about two months ago. He was accompanied by Mrs. Clark.

"We had a most enjoyable and instructive trip," said Mr. Clark this morning, "although at times the weather was very tropical. We stayed two days in Guatemala and it was very dry there, without a drop of rain since September of last year. Guatemala is the home of some large mahogany forests and we saw mahogany timber shipped in the states."

The canal will easily be completed by January, 1914 at the rate work is now progressing, and it will be open for navigation long before the time originally set. They are now engaged in filling some of the lakes with material taken from the canal ditch.

There were 180 in the excursion party and of these six were Oregonians. All of them, Mr. Clark reports, were much pleased with the trip. The weather at Panama was calm and warm, at times uncomfortably so.

Will Ask Court to Furnish Alienists
Sheriff Stevens and Deputy District Attorney Fitzgerald announced today they would go before the circuit court early next week and ask for an order authorizing Dr. William House and William T. Williamson, two local alienists, to examine Jack Roberts as to his sanity. This move on the part of the prosecuting officers will be made in view of the county commission's refusal to allow the two alienists the regular fee for such work.

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COLLEGE MERGER

Plan to Unite U. of O. and O. A. C. to Be Studied Thoroughly.
The committee of nine appointed by Governor West to investigate the Oregon Agricultural college and the University of Oregon for the purpose of securing data regarding the advisability of either consolidating the two institutions or maintaining them under one board of regents or as at present under separate boards decided to make a thorough investigation at a meeting this morning. Chairman Newell was authorized to appoint a committee to secure information regarding conditions in Oregon conditions in other states where separate institutions are maintained and states where the institutions have been started as one or consolidated.

Two members of the committee were in favor of at once putting the question of consolidation to a vote as they had studied into the matter and already formed opinions, but the majority favored the most minute investigation. The committee will start work as soon as they are announced by Chairman Newell and if possible recommendations will be made in time for initiative action at the next election.

Governor West attended for a few minutes and stated that in appointing the committee he had selected men in whom he believed the people could place the utmost confidence and that he expected their reports would have weight with the people and end all controversy. He would not make any suggestion as to whether the committee should work out the problem without influence.

A large amount of data which had already been collected by Chairman Newell, with the assistance of Miss Marvin, state librarian, was placed at the disposal of the committee. President Kerr of the O. A. C. also made several suggestions to the committee. Invitations were extended to the members by Judge Bean and W. K. Weatherford to visit and inspect the two institutions. This the members decided to do whenever convenient.

The appointment of Chairman Newell was confirmed by the committee and State Superintendent of Public Instruction L. B. Alderman was made secretary, though not a member of the committee.

The members of the committee present were: Chairman W. K. Newell of Clatsop, president of the state board of horticulture, George Putnam, editor of the Medford Mail-Tribune, United States District Judge R. S. Bean, E. L. Thompson of Hartman & Thompson, Dr. C. J. Smith, of Pendleton, W. K. Weatherford of Albany, chairman of the board of regents of O. A. C., Honorable John Smith, of Astoria, and William H. Daly, president of the Oregon Federation of Labor. Honorable W. J. Martin of Blakely was absent.

President W. J. Campbell of the state university, and State Superintendent L. B. Alderman were present to give whatever information they could to the committee.

Lawyer Dismisses 27 Schmitz Indictments
San Francisco, May 25.—Superior Judge Sawyer today dismissed from the calendar the 27 indictments standing against former Mayor Eugene E. Schmitz. These are the last of the hundreds of indictments arising from the graft case against dozens of former San Francisco officials and corporation magnates. Dismissal was entered on the ground that the cases had not come to trial within the 60 day limit directed by law as ordered by the appointing authority.

In the cases of the late Mayor Patrick Calhoun and others indicted by the grand jury here some six years ago.

Indian Sentenced to 20 Years for Murder
William Judah Jim, Klamath Indian, convicted a week ago of murder in the second degree for the killing of Quimby Cheekasne, of the same tribe, on November 22 on the reservation, was given a sentence of 20 years imprisonment in the federal penitentiary at McNeil's island by United States District Judge Bean. The killing was done as the result of a quarrel at the home of the parents of the wives of both men.

Hoffrine, for cruelty; Isabella Wittenberg from Herman Wittenberg, for cruelty; Emma B. Haas, from Charles E. Haas, for cruelty; Irene T. Baldy from Milton L. Baldy, for desertion; Michael G. Kennedy from May E. Kennedy for cruelty; Sampronia DeBord from J. F. DeBord for cruelty and Joseph Foley from Laura C. Foley for cruelty.

Mistrial Results in Indian Murder Case
The jury in the case of Anderson Faithful, Klamath Indian, on trial for killing his wife on October 24 on the reservation, failed to agree after being "out" all night. The jury was discharged this morning by United States District Judge Bean. The vote stood seven for acquittal and five for conviction. Myra Faithful, the wife, was found terribly beaten in their home and the children of the couple testified that they quarreled violently. A new trial will be held later, probably in July.

Taft Addresses 18,000 Standard Oil Employees

DEFEATS YOUNG
Pastor of Taylor Street Methodist Church Given Great Ovation.
(Special to The Journal.)
Minneapolis, Minn., May 25.—Because a rumor gained credence in the general conference that Dr. Benjamin Young of Portland, Or., used tobacco, the conference failed to elect him to a bishopric. Dr. Young's friends discovered the condition when it was too late to overturn the decision which the tobacco story had brought into the ranks of the Portland divine. Dr. Young has red hair and when the story of his tobacco using appeared the combination was too strong for the sedate Methodist ministers.

Dr. Young gained strength until the twelfth ballot, when he had 340 votes, while 511 were necessary to election. On the next ballot Dr. Young's vote dropped to 198. His cause was lost to the tobacco story.

Yesterday Dr. Young was given a great ovation when the injustice was discovered by the conference. In a masterful address Dr. Young seconded the nomination of Marvin Fisher, bishop of the Philippine Islands. In concluding his address Dr. Young took occasion to assure the conference that Fisher did not have red hair and did not smoke.

The bishops elected are: Homer C. Stuntz of New York; T. B. Henderson, of Brooklyn; W. D. Shepard, of Chicago; Nathaniel Liscook, of Kansas City; Francis J. McConnell, Greensboro, Ind.; F. D. Leete, of Detroit; Mich. R. Cooke, of New York; W. P. Thirkield, Washington, D. C.

The conference is considering the retirement of Dr. James Buckley, aged 75, for 25 years editor of the Christian Advocate. If he is retired, Dr. George Eckman of New York, probably will be chosen to succeed Dr. Buckley.

The conference is expected to adjourn today, probably will adjourn May 29.

Financial Questions Troubling Chinese
(United Press Leased Wire.)
Nanking, May 25.—In the absence today of President Yuan Shi Kai, Vice President Li and the national assembly, General Huang Hsing, chief of staff of the Chinese army, in the strongest terms opposed the preliminary loan of 5,000,000 taels to the Chinese government by European powers. He demands that the government annul the contract, because the stipulations are tantamount to investing the particular loan in the loan with control of the Chinese army.

General Huang strongly urged the issuance of inconvertible paper currency, the basis of which is to be raised by popular subscription.

Cabinet May Be Dissolved.
(United Press Leased Wire.)
Peking, May 25.—The Chinese capital today is unsettled over the opposition to the movement to borrow 5,000,000 taels from the European powers and the organization of President Yuan Shi Kai's cabinet is imminent. Lack of funds is the principal cause for the expected dissolution of the cabinet.

Don't Need Jersey, Says President Taft
(United Press Leased Wire.)
Newark, N. J., May 25.—That his renomination as Republican candidate for president of the United States is certain, no matter how the New Jersey primary elections may result, was declared today by President Taft, speaking from the European hotel in Newark. The president declared that the nomination of Theodore Roosevelt at the Republican national convention in Chicago on June 18 is impossible.

"I want my renomination made emphatic," declared President Taft. "I can get along without the New Jersey delegation. I have 575 delegates already pledged."

Sunday Papers Asked to Omit Stories of Saturday Conference

Seattle, Wash., May 25.—The Sunday papers of the nation will give their readers no account of today's session of the United States senate, it was instructed today in Seattle, if a resolution passed by that body yesterday is observed. In a rigid Sabbathian spirit, Rev. Henry Bell, of Philadelphia, introduced the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the assembly request that no assembly matters be reported for publication in the Sunday edition of the press."

The measure carried unanimously.

FORMAL OPENING OF HOLTZ STORE

Scattered throughout the store, to harmonious confusion, were hundreds of baskets of flowers—roses, carnations, lilies, snap dragons—the gifts of manufacturers and friends.

New Goods Admired.
Despite the crush of humankind, there was no disorder. Arrangements had been made to care for the things by Aaron Holtz, president of Holtz, incorporated, who was assisted by his brother, Max Holtz, of New York, who came especially to Portland to aid in the preparations for the opening today. Every one of the 225 employees had been thoroughly schooled in regard to the duties and business and no slip marred the success of the formal launching of the new \$600,000 enterprise.

At present, merchandise displays occupy only four floors of the building. Later the remaining floors will be filled with all sorts of goods which are now being purchased in the east.

Report Praises Captain Rostron.

Washington, May 25.—The senate committee's report on its findings in the Titanic inquiry will be submitted to the senate Tuesday.

The report will hold Captain E. J. Smith largely responsible for the disaster. The British Board of Trade will be denounced for lax inspection. J. Bruce Ismay will be arraigned. Captain Lord of the Californian will be criticized for failure to take necessary steps when near the Titanic at the time she sent up distress rockets.

The report will ask congress to reward Captain Rostron of the rescue steamer Carpathia. The White Star company will be generally criticized.

COMMONWEALTH

MEETING HEARS
ABLE ADDRESSES
Problems of Taxation, Good Roads, Cooperative Selling and Profit Sharing, Discussed by Well Known Men.
(Special to The Journal.)
The fourth annual session of the University of Oregon, held at the University of Oregon, began yesterday with the first group of more than 1000 interested speakers were made in charge of the day's work of the state tax commission. H. A. Harris, state printing expert George Putnam, editor of the Medford Mail-Tribune, and W. K. Newell, state horticulturalist.

Mr. Galloway opened the discussion with a paper on "Taxation and Justice," in which he pointed out the needs for taxation and the great evils of the present system. Mr. Galloway stated that the general property tax is a dismal failure, both as a method of raising revenue and as a measure of justice. The latter weakness of the system, he said, is due to its inability to reach the intangible securities. The remedy suggested was a flat rate on the intangible property, notes, bonds, etc., a mortgage registry tax, and an income tax. Tangible personalty was classified as productive and nonproductive, the former being such personal articles as clothing, furniture, watches and personal effects, which should be exempt from taxation.

Single Tax Not a Tax.
"Single tax, rightly understood," said Mr. Galloway, "is not a tax at all. It simply urges the employment of the present tax machine for the appropriation of the so-called unearned increment. The result would be the appropriation still farther of the hard earned increment and would be productive of a gross injustice to those most poorly fitted to stand the burden. In conclusion, Mr. Galloway stated that the tax system must necessarily be the result of time, environment and experience and must be a gradual development, not a product of one or two legislative actions."

Profit Sharing.
One of the most interesting talks was that of R. A. Harris, on "Just Division of Product of Industry Between Employer and Employee." The address was an exhaustive discussion of profit sharing. "Profit sharing," said Mr. Harris, "is as yet largely in its theoretical stages, and, like most economic changes that come as more or less willing concessions from the dominating industrial powers, it is treated with considerable suspicion and mistrust by the rank and file of the class conscious working people. It is hard to get on a mutual plane, however, since there is such a great diversity in the hopes, ambitions, passions and natural propensities of those who are economically related."

"The time is coming, however, when profit sharing will put the wage earner in a position where he will be economically independent. The first stage in human development was the stage in which the worker was a slave. We are now in the second stage, in which the worker is allowed to work out his own independence under control of government. The later stage will be one in which the worker will receive a just proportion of the amount he produces."

Causes of Unrest.
"Social unrest in the United States is not due to desperate poverty of the individual working man. It is rather due to the broader vision that comes as the result of free thought and discussion. With improving economic conditions the agitation will increase until a more natural and democratic relation is realized. While the per centage of wealth and economic power is very unequal the individual struggle for life is no harder, not so hard, in my opinion."

Road Problems.
George Putnam, of Medford, followed with a strong appeal for better roads in Oregon. Mr. Putnam quoted the case of Jackson county, where attempts to make better roads have been a failure, due to the lack of proper laws. In speaking of the case of the Crater lake road and the Jackson county road bonds, which were declared illegal by the supreme court, Mr. Putnam said that the Oregon supreme court has always been an effective and consistent enemy of good roads, and where ever possible had taken a narrow interpretation of the constitution to prevent highway building.

Improvement of the Economic Organization of Oregon for Securing to the Producer His Full Share of the Values Created." Mr. Newell desired the cooperation of the fruitgrowers of the state so that the great profits of the commission might go to the producers themselves.

The amateur hold-up sent two bullets through Mr. Howell, both of which passed through the top of the buggy.

Herst's eyes had been turned but a minute when he discovered the boat on the water, completely alone from land, with no trace of his companion in sight. The body had completely disappeared. Heart disease is presumed to be the cause of death.

Edwin Lewis was grandson of C. E. Griffiths, of 1853 Mallory avenue, and a nephew of C. A. Lewis of the First National bank. He was a student at Jefferson high school. Funeral services will be held at the Piedmont Presbyterian church tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock.
