BUREAU HANDICAPPED BY INTERNAL STRIFE

Three score witnesses crowded into the mayor's committee room at the city hall yesterday to attend the hearing given former clerk John G. Schroeder Jr. of the municipal free employment bureau by the city civil service commission. The commission spent three hours in examining witnesses and then continued the hearing until Monday.

The evidence submitted shows that the bureau is badly disrupted by internal strife. There are three members of the bureau, W. H. McConnel, one of these, is standing out for the reinstatement of Clerk Schroeder, suspended by Mayor Hueslight on the recommendation of Ralph C. Clyde and J. L. Ledwidge, the other two members of the bureau.

One of the charges filed against Schroeder was that he endeavored to establish a private employment agency while working for the city. Schroeder admitted having negotiated with lumber companies with a view to forming a private agency, but he said he did all this on his own time.

The clerk was also charged with having absented himself from the bureau frequently to engage in the study of law. Other charges were that Schroeder has been discourteous to patrons and has used abusive language in addressing applicants for work.

A number of men were called yesterday by the defense to show that Schroeder had always been courteous to them. Still others were summoned by the prosecution to show the exact opposite.

A summary of the testimony shows that the bureau has been since last February in a state of turmoil, with Schroeder and Assistant Clerk Christensen not on speaking terms. Christensen, now filling Schroeder's place temporarily, testified yesterday that he
