Monday's Delayed News Briefly Told

Resume of World Happenings Received From 8 o'Clock Yesterday Afternoon Until 3 o'Clock This Morning.

**Congressional.** There was a lively debate in the senate Monday over Mr. Hitchcock's resolution calling for full information of corporations as disclosed in the corporation tax returns. The returns, he said, encouraged a disposition toward imperialism, made evident the disparity of wealth, had increased lists of millionaires and showed that protected interests had a revenue of \$1,000,000,000 a year over legitimate profit.

Disagreement over the provisions of the bill for the relief of Sherman county settlers, discussed on account of the Gallegos military road deadlocked the house committee on public lands Monday morning and the result indicates the committee is not likely to attempt to secure further consideration of the bill this session.

Labor was extolled and the workmen crowned by more than a score of performers during the house debate on the naval appropriation bill Monday. The sum total of the oratory was the adoption of an amendment to the bill providing that hereafter all coal purchased for the navy must be mined under the eight-hour workday law. A proposed amendment requiring the miners to be paid not less than the union scale of wages was voted down.

During a debate in the house Monday, Representative Foust of Pennsylvania (Republican) resorted to an allusion to labor conditions in Pennsylvania made by Representative Hefflin of Alabama (Democrat). He assailed the conditions in turbulent camps of Alabama, where he said, were more barbarous and inhuman than in the mines of Siberia.

The army appropriation bill with the anti-administration amendments was reported back to the senate and house by the conferees Monday. The amendments would legislate Major-General Wood out of office as chief of staff and would leave the location of military posts to a commission of retired army officers and two members each of the senate and house committees on military affairs.

**Political.** Mrs. Bellamy Storer, recipient of the "Dear Maria" letters, which figured in an unpleasant political-diplomatic incident in the Roosevelt administration, has written a letter to the Washington Evening Post attacking Colonel Theodore Roosevelt and urging Catholics to vote for another candidate, if he is nominated for president. In her letter she said that no friend of "Tat," of law, order and authority, Democrat or otherwise, would support Roosevelt.

Thirty lastest from Scotland arrived in New York Monday and were met by 20 young men from all parts of the United States and Canada, and all the young maids will go where their fiancés have made homes.

The highest price since 1882 was reached by beef in the wholesale market at New York Monday, when it sold at 13 1/2 cents a pound in bulk. It is said to mean from 1 1/2 to 2 cents a pound increase for prime meats at retail.

Edward Bok discharged 16 young women Monday when he caught them indulging in the "burlesque" on the third floor of the Ladies Home Journal building in Philadelphia. The girls were enjoying their noon luncheon when Mr. Bok happened in.

Each member of the Irish-American Athletic club team, which competed at the annual games for the benefit of the Manhattan State insane asylum last Saturday is the proud possessor today of a check for \$1,000,000, signed by one of the inmates.

**Pacific Coast.** Dr. C. C. O'Donnell, who was active in San Francisco politics for many years, died in that city Monday. He was a resident of San Francisco for 62 years and during recent years was a candidate for either corner or mayor at nearly every election. He was a veteran of the Mexican war.

Mayor George F. Cotterill of Seattle has vetoed the council bill known as the anti-red flag ordinance, and which was passed because of the red flag demonstration on May day. The mayor fears that the law would prohibit fraternity banners.

Mrs. Nancy Jacobs of Portland, a survivor of the Whitman massacre in 1848, will be one of the principal speakers at the annual meeting of the English Land Empires' Pioneers' association in Wallman chapel, Walla Walla. Mrs. Jacobs was a small girl at the time of the massacre and escaped by hiding under the floor. She will relate her experiences at this meeting.

John Fournier, father of John Fournier Jr., the well known young catcher for the Chicago White Sox, was injured at the East Side Shingle mill in Hoquiam Friday, when an ax, struck by a log, hit him in the side, and he is not expected to live.

The National Lumber & Box company mill, the largest on Grays Harbor, which has been closed down for two years, will begin operations within 30 days. The mill will employ 600 men and have a monthly payroll of \$10,000. W. E. Schrieker, principal owner of the private bank of W. E. Schrieker & Co. of La Conner, Wash., which closed its doors April 15, was arrested Monday on a charge of receiving deposits after he knew the bank was insolvent. Bond was fixed at \$5000.

After being told by physicians that her chances for recovery were only one in a thousand, Mrs. Fred Basko has left the hospital at Klamath Falls in good health. She had received six distinct perforations of the intestines as the result of having been accidentally shot by her husband.

Henry T. Cowley, a Spokane pioneer, has lost his suit to force the Northern Pacific to give him back land in that city now worth \$200,000, because the company has refused to carry out the consideration for the deed, which was to give Cowley and his wife passages for life and five Cowley children passages for five years each. The supreme court says that congress passed an act prohibiting free passes, and the railroad company is not to blame for obeying the federal law.

George L. Toek, aged 45, who went to Tacoma a few days ago from Portland with his wife and secured employment as a night clerk at the Arcade hotel, shot himself to death in the hotel bathroom Monday night. His wife says he has been despondent.

**Foreign.** An expedition under Professor George Rehnor of Harvard has just completed a series of excavations in the palace of King Ahab in Palestine. One of the most remarkable finds was the kitchen of the palace, where more than 5000 ancient household utensils were uncovered. Eighty persons were killed Monday night in a fire in a theatre at Villa Real, Spain, caused by the explosion of a cinematograph. The little garrison of Jimenez, Mexico, evacuated the town Monday, burning the bridge at the Rio Florida. The federal military trains have therefore been blocked several days. The rebels also destroyed a number of other bridges. Mining men from the Moerito section of Mexico say that the general belief that American intervention is probable has brought about strained relations between natives and Americans. They say the Americans are preparing to leave their properties. Roberto Alameda, millionaire member of one of the chief families of Sinaloa, was executed Sunday night by the federalists for treason. His execution has caused consternation, as it was the first time a wealthy man has paid the ex-

**MILLIONS OF SERFS STARVE IN RUSSIA**  
Suffering More General Among Peasants Than Since the Famine of 1891.

(Special to The Journal.) London, May 28.—Famine conditions in Russia, due to the failure of last summer's crops, continue widespread, according to latest advice received by the London relief committee, which has issued an urgent public appeal for funds. It is conservatively estimated that 13,000,000 peasants are in a state of destitution, and the committee states that suffering is more general than in any similar calamity since the famine of 1891.

In some of the Bashkir villages, writes one correspondent, "where no relief has yet been supplied, the peasants simply lie down on the floors of their huts and patiently wait for death." Reports are praying for the death of their children so they may not see their continued sufferings," writes another correspondent. "They themselves are often tempted to end their own lives by suicide."

The order peasants, declares the committee, have noticed the absence of help from abroad. "In 1891," they say, "people came to help us everywhere, even from America. Where are they now?"

**EIGHTH GRADE PAPERS EASY? 9-10 PASS, SAYS STATE SUPT. ALDERMAN**

(Salem Bureau of the Journal.) Salem, Or., May 28.—State School Superintendent Alderman is today sending out the eighth grade questions for the school examinations to be held June 5 and 7. This examination will be for those who failed to pass in all studies in the examination held this month. The superintendent estimates that 90 per cent of all those who have taken or will take the examinations will be graduated from the eighth grade this year.

**BIG COLD STORAGE PLANT FOR APPLES**  
Brick Structure to Rise at Hood River for Apple Growers' Union.

(Special to The Journal.) Hood River, Or., May 28.—Work has begun in wrecking the old wooden structure that has been used by the Apple growers' union for storage purposes, and the ground will be used as a site for a cold storage plant 40x100 feet that will be used by the union. The building will be built of brick and finished in time to handle this year's crop of apples.

With this added room the union will be able to store about 150,000 boxes of apples. The present ice plant of the union may be able to afford refrigeration for the added space. A few years ago the union purchased the water power owned by Joseph Wilson, which will give ample power for the entire plant.

Since the annual election, held several months ago, the affairs of the union have been conducted by an executive committee consisting of three members of the board of directors. It is expected, however, that a manager will be elected this week to manage the affairs of the association. Rumors are current that John P. Moore, who has managed the Fruitgrowers' association at Grand Junction, Colo., for 10 years will probably be the manager for the Hood River concern.

**Game Warden Busy.** (Special to The Journal.) Hood River, Or., May 28.—Louis Fritz, district fish and game warden, has had a busy week in Hood River county looking after the state's affairs. W. E. Pizam was arrested for having undersized trout in his possession, and on a plea of guilty, was fined \$25 by Judge Buck. J. P. Huff was arrested for fishing without a license, and upon a plea of guilty, was fined \$25. George Grubb and Hol J. Speer will have a hearing before Judge Buck tomorrow on a complaint charging them with fishing too close to the fishway located at the dam.

**TIES STEPSON TO HORSE; CAUSES BRUTE TO RUN**  
(United Press Local Wire.) Cape Charles, Va., May 28.—Because his 15-year-old stepson was guilty of a trivial offense, Thomas Drummond, a negro, tied the boy to a horse and then caused the animal to run away. The boy's neck and back were broken by being dragged along the road and by blows from the horse's hoofs. Drummond was arrested and today is awaiting the action of the grand jury.

**Erecting Electric Signs.** (Special to The Journal.) Hood River, Or., May 28.—Several Hood River merchants are installing electric signs to advertise their places of business. Hood River has a sign ordinance that prohibits signs from projecting over the sidewalk, but in the case of electric signs permission is given to place them on hinges.
