

SHE WALKS 1070 MILES IN 43 DAYS

Wife of Wealthy New Yorker Takes Long Tramp on Raw Food Diet.

Chicago, May 28.—Completing her 1070 mile tramp from New York City, Mrs. David Beach, wife of a wealthy New York business man, walked into Chicago today and was escorted by a large enthusiastic crowd through the principal streets to the office of Mayor Carter H. Harrison.

Mrs. Beach was just 43 days on the trip. During all this time she lived on a nonmeat raw food diet exclusively. Her daily food consisted of raw vegetables and fruit, with cakes made of ground whole wheat, raisins and apples. She drank nothing but fruit juices. When she started Mrs. Beach weighed 145 pounds, when she finished, 123.

She said: "Eating the right kind of food gives me good blood, and not wearing tight shoes gives the blood circulation. So I have not a corn or even a chafe."

The trip was not an advertising scheme. It was a fad of Mrs. Beach.

HALF HOUR CUT FROM THE RUNNING TIME OF FAST MAIL ON O.-W.

To get the eastern letter mail out on the first carrier delivery, which leaves the postoffice at 7:15. The half hour concession would simply delay the first delivery in the morning and a corresponding delay in the other deliveries of the day would result.

Business Willing.
According to Mr. (Brien) the Harrison lines stand willing and are ready to aid the business men in every way possible to secure earlier service but a cut of 30 minutes in nine's running time is the best they can promise. In this connection, the question has been raised that the postoffice department might take away one of Portland's five daily carrier deliveries, should the fast mail's running time be shortened an hour. This is not probable, however. In the opinion of men familiar with the situation, who point out that the Chamber of Commerce could protest and show conclusively that the rapid expansion of the city's business and its growth, make the present delivery system imperative.

According to railroad schedules, Portland enjoys better train mail service from the east than San Francisco, and practically as good as Seattle, which is 70 miles nearer Chicago, where the eastern mails for the west are made up.

TIME COMPARED
The fast mail for Seattle, Portland and San Francisco all leave Chicago at 9:30 a. m. The run to Seattle, a distance of 2224 miles is made in 68 hours and 15 minutes, at an average speed of 38.6 miles an hour. The run to San Francisco, which is 2275 miles, is made in 62 hours and 40 minutes, an average speed of 36.3 miles, while the run to Portland, a distance of 2394 miles is made in 59 hours and 30 minutes, an average speed of 38.6 miles an hour. This high speed average of the Portland mail train, the schedules show, is due to the extra efforts that are made on the Short Line and the Union Pacific. Over these lines the fast mail bowls along at a speed averaging above 40 miles, and in some divisions 44 miles an hour. After the mail train arrives at Huntington, the speed drops to 21 and 32 miles, which is maintained to Portland.

In explaining this slow time, which is almost ten miles an hour less than the Union Pacific and Short Line's time for the same trip, it is said that the grades and curves on the O.-W. R. & N. must be taken into account.

Condition of Grades.
Between Huntington and Portland,

there are 25,570 degrees of curvature, and a west bound train must overcome 4760 feet of adverse grade. There are also 12 scheduled stops between these two points, for No. 1. The stops include taking on and cutting off, also engine helpers in the Blue mountains, taking on water, exchanging mail with No. 12 and putting off the Spokane mail at Pendleton.

In contravention of these arguments former railroad operators who are conversant with the O.-W. R. & N. system declare that these drawbacks are not to be found along the line between Umatilla and Portland to an appreciable degree, and that the grades and heaviest curvature obtain through the Blue mountains. The schedule of No. 9 calls for an average speed of 31 miles through the Blue mountains, and only a little over 22 miles between Umatilla and Portland, which is a downhill water grade, and as free from curves as portions of the Short Line's tracks, where a speed of more than 40 miles an hour is maintained. They declare that engineers would not experience much trouble in increasing the speed of No. 9 if they should receive orders to do so, and this without additional wear on the tracks or rolling stock.

MAIL WILL NOT BE DELIVERED IN CITY ON MEMORIAL DAY

Contrary to the regular custom, Postmaster Merrick has decided to follow the custom of eastern cities and dispense with all deliveries of mail throughout the city on Memorial day. Formerly it was the custom to give two deliveries in the morning in the business district and one in the residence section. The general delivery window will be open from 8 to 10 o'clock in the morning, with the stamp windows and one registry window open during the same hours. Special delivery of mail will be handled as usual. Mail deposited in the main postoffice will be dispatched as usual and one collection will be made in the business section to arrive at the mailing division by 9 o'clock in the evening. The usual dispatches of holiday mail to and from the stations will be made. At the stations mail will be distributed only through boxes.

SUPREME COURT UPHOLDS 8 HOUR LAW FOR WOMEN

HOUSE TURNS BILL FOR TWO WARDOGS DOWN

Washington, May 28.—By a vote of 121 to 50 the house this afternoon rejected the Roberts amendment to the naval appropriation bill calling for an appropriation of \$12,000,000 for the building during 1912 of two battleships, each vessel to cost \$4,000,000. The amendment, introduced by Representative Bartholdt of Missouri, providing for only one battleship, also was defeated.

The debate on the two amendments was extremely bitter, the Democrats standing by the amendment reached in course. Another fight on the same provision is expected when the bill comes to final vote.

The army appropriation bill, with its amendment legislating Major General Wood out of his office as chief of staff, has been reported back to the two houses.
