Attorney General Webb Gives Ultimatum to Chief; Tells Him He Will Have to Handle Labor War.

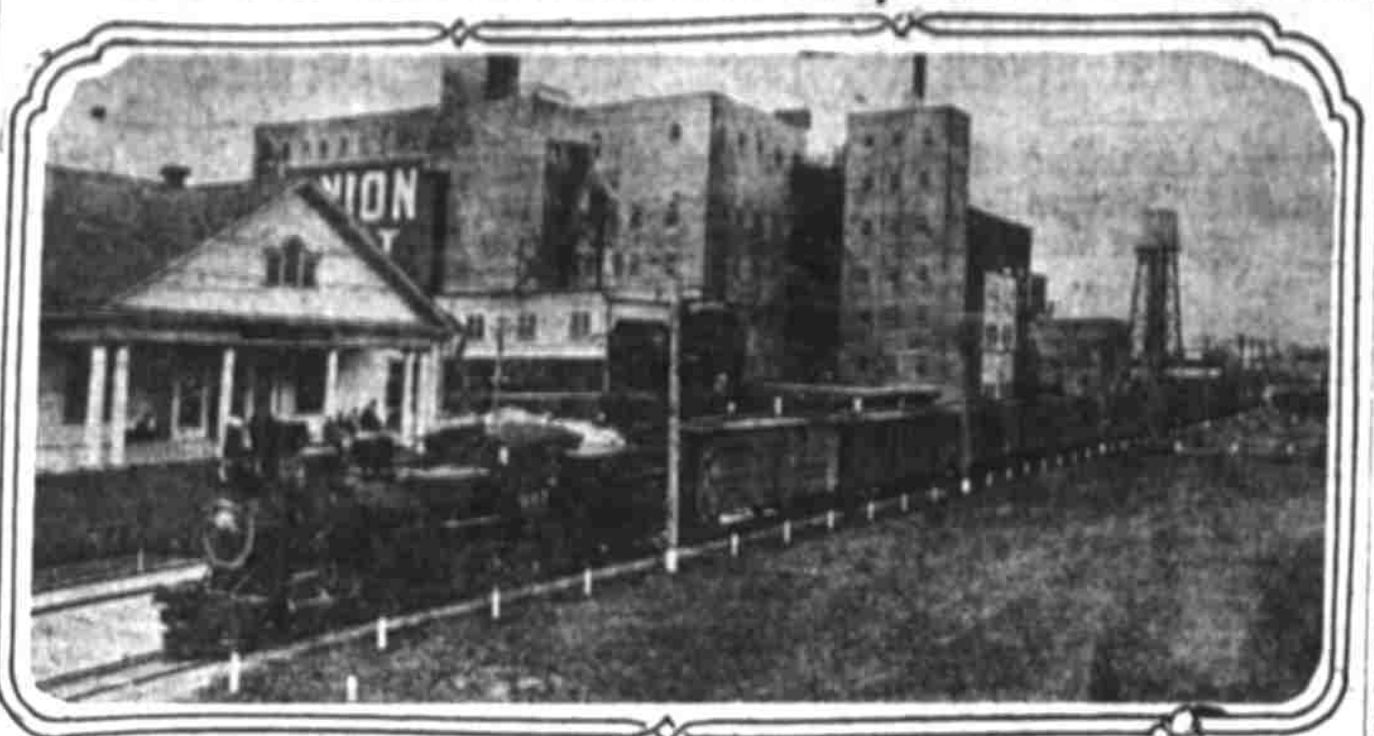
