

STATE DEBATING FINALS TONIGHT

The Dalles High School Will
Meet Albany High at
Eugene.

The Dalles, Or., May 31.—The Dalles high school debating team, consisting of Howard McDonald and Erma Bennett, left this morning for Eugene where they will meet the debating team of Albany high tonight in a discussion to determine the championship of Oregon, each team having won against all comers in their respective districts. The question to be debated is, "Resolved: That the cabinet form of government should be adopted in the state of Oregon, permitting the governor and cabinet members to go upon the floor of the legislature to propose and debate measures." The local team was coached by Miss Allie Miller, teacher of history and literature in The Dalles high school.

GRIFFIN HALSTEAD MUST STAND TRIAL

Washington, May 31.—After having fought for nearly two years to escape trial, Griffin Halstead, son of the famous journalist, the late Murat Halstead, will be arraigned in the criminal court here next Monday to stand trial.



on a charge of embezzling funds of former customers of the brokerage house. The firm of Griffin Halstead & Co. failed in January, 1911. Several weeks later a complaint was made in the district attorney by Richard Halstead, brother of the late Murat Halstead, that Halstead had wrongfully withheld the shares of New York, Ontario & Western Railway stock. The stock represented Halstead's share of a life time contract for the construction of a canal across the state of New York.

He denied having wrongfully used the stock in question and friends tried to obtain a settlement of the case. In October the federal grand jury indicted the broker on charges of embezzlement. His attorneys and lawyers Mr. Halstead filed a plea in abatement some months ago, claiming that his constitutional rights had been invaded when the United States attorney presented to the grand jury the books of Halstead's brokerage business, which were in the custody of a trustee in bankruptcy. The lower court sustained the contention, but on appeal the government obtained a reversal and the broker will now have to stand trial.

BEST BEHAVED CHILDREN GIVEN PRESENTS OF PIGS

Kelso, Wash., May 31.—Pigs for prizes are the latest in Cowlitz county. Alfred Johnson, one of the directors of the school district at Hazel Dell, five miles from Kelso, offered four pigs to the boy and girl with the best record for good behavior during the term just closed. George Swenson was awarded the honor among the boys, but there was a tie between Annie Johnson and Hilda Leonard for first place among the girls. The result was that George received two pigs while Hilda and Annie were compelled to be satisfied with one each. Director Johnson is a well known farmer of the Hazel Dell district. He says that he thought of giving a cash prize, but concluded that the pigs would be better, as they would create an interest in the industry among the children.

Field Day for Cowlitz Roads.

Kelso, Wash., May 31.—Cowlitz county will observe Tuesday, June 11, as field day, when every citizen is expected to turn out and work on the roads. A committee appointed by the county commissioners, at a meeting here, named 20 captains, whose duty it will be to organize parties who will work on the roads on that day. The idea is to improve the lateral highways as much as possible, leaving the main roads for the regularly employed crews. The citizens of the county are taking hold of the scheme with zeal, and it is expected that at least 2500 men will observe the day.

MRS. ASTOR GIVES 'WIDOW LUNCHEON'

Captain of Carpathia Dined
With Women Rescued
From Titanic.

New York, May 31.—Mrs. Madeline Farrow Astor, widow of Colonel John Jacob Astor, emerged from retirement long enough today to entertain at luncheon Captain A. H. Watson, commander of the Carpathia, upon which the Titanic survivors were brought to this port. The luncheon was given in the Astor mansion on Fifth avenue, only members of the young widow's immediate family and a few intimate friends being present.

NORTH BEND STREET WORK EXTENSIVE

North Bend, Or., May 31.—Extensive street improvements for this year were recommended to the city council in a message from Mayor L. J. Simpson. Much street work has already been done, but the mayor recommends that Union avenue, Washington street, Sherman avenue, Montana street and Sheridan avenue be improved and that a hard pavement of some kind be laid on Sherman avenue. The council will take action on the mayor's recommendations in a few days. A number of important public improvements are being contemplated for the city when railroad activities start.

COLONEL ROOSEVELT SPEAKS AT GETTYSBURG

Gettysburg, Pa., May 31.—Colonel Roosevelt spoke to a large crowd on the Gettysburg battlefield yesterday. He came as the guest of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, in convention at Harrisburg. The body came to Gettysburg to spend Memorial day. In closing his address Colonel Roosevelt said:

"There are great existing evils and that we must work with all our heart and soul and mind to solve them, there we shall prepare disaster to ourselves in the future. We shall no less prepare disaster for ourselves if we fail to work with Lincoln's broad kindness of spirit toward all our fellow citizens with malice toward none, with charity to all, striving resolutely to accomplish our end but frowning on all vindictiveness and doing everything in our power to prevent the rankling hatred, whether shown in the form of envy or of arrogance and the disregard for the rights of others which have so often in the past turned movements for the betterment and uplift of mankind aside from the goal at which they were aimed and have disastrously marred what would otherwise have been achievements of the more far reaching good for all humanity."

CONDEMNED WOMAN MAY BREAK DOWN

Boston, May 31.—For the first time since her conviction with her "fellow" Harry Marshall of the murder of her husband, Mrs. Lena Cusumano today showed signs of breaking down. Evidence of weakness came when, after a good rest, on her first night in one of the Charlestown prison death cells, she awoke to hear carpenters hammering in the death chamber. Fearing the death chamber might be open, Mrs. Cusumano quickly snatched the sheets from the couch and pinned one to each side of the cell, thereby preventing any possible chance of her eyes alighting on the electric chair.

Harry Marshall, her lover, occupies a death cell near by. Both will die next week, the woman probably going to the chair first.

BRITISH CAPITALISTS WILL TOUR CANADA

London, May 31.—Three score of eminent representatives of British capital and industry sailed from Liverpool on the steamship Empress today for Canada. The party is the most notable of its kind that ever left England for a visit to the dominion. The London chamber of commerce and the trades bodies of many of the principal cities of the provinces are represented. Other members of the delegation include the chairman of managing directors of many of the leading concerns of Great Britain. The party will arrive on June 4 at Quebec, and from that point will begin

their tour of the dominion. The delegation will travel from coast to coast, seeing all that there is to be seen and observing all along the route what openings there are for the development of British trade and the location of British industries in Canada.

Paris to Entertain Queen.
Paris, May 31.—Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands, accompanied by the prince consort, will arrive in Paris tomorrow for a three days' official visit. Elaborate preparations have been completed for the reception and entertainment of the royal visitors. The coming of the Dutch queen has aroused extraordinary interest among the Parisians, which is scarcely to be wondered at, in view of the fact that Wilhelmina will be the first queen in her own right to be received in Paris since Queen Victoria's last official visit here nearly half a century ago.

Discuss Industrial Diseases.
Atlantic City, N. J., May 31.—In connection with the annual convention of the American Medical association a notable conference is to be held here the coming week for the discussion of health problems in modern industry and the best methods for stamping out industrial diseases. The American Association for Labor Legislation will be in charge of the conference, and the participating bodies will include the International Association of Labor Commissioners and the International Association of Factory Inspectors.

Belgium May Be Involved.
Paris, May 31.—That the neutrality of Belgium is threatened by the somewhat strained relations existing between Germany, France and England is the belief expressed in Brussels, according to a dispatch received here today. Certain Belgian statesmen believe that Germany would invade the country for strategic purposes against France.
