

# BIPLANE CUTS OFF FACE OF GAZING MAN, KILLING HIM

**Aviator Turpin, in Trying to  
Save Life of Photographer  
in Road at Seattle, Kills  
One, Fatally Hurts One.**

(Special From Leland Wire.)  
Seattle, Wash., May 31.—A man was instantly killed and a woman of whom will die, were severely injured by Aviator Turpin's biplane when it flew into the crowd in front of the race track at the Meadows yesterday afternoon. It was many hours of the accident that the body of the dead man was identified. He was George Quibb, a civil engineer, living in this city. His face was sliced off by the whirling propeller.

Raymond Chapman, a 18-year-old boy, who was standing on the path of the biplane, was struck on the head by the propeller and his skull fractured. He cannot recover.

Turpin himself was among the worst injured, his face being crushed and frightfully lacerated.

No trace has been found of the unknown amateur photographer who got in Turpin's way, causing the accident. Although the police have his description, Aviator Turpin was formerly a pupil of the Wright brothers at Dayton, Ohio. The machine he used here yesterday was of modified Wright pattern. It had just been completed, and was used for the first time. It was badly damaged.

Hearing her move slightly in the bed he turned and directed his rays in her face and pointed his revolver at her head.

# MAN'S THROAT CUT IN MYSTERIOUS ATTACK

# CAPITAL OF MOROCCO SURROUNDED BY MOORS

Paris, May 31.—The capital of Morocco is practically surrounded by Moors today, according to wireless advice received here from General Lyautiey, French resident governor.
