Besides speaking by other former residents of the Hoosier state, a good program will be given consisting of several specialty numbers. The railroad companies have run excursions from different parts of the state bringing many out of town Indians to help make the day a great success. The Indiana alliance, composed of women of the Unitarian church, are also holding an out door celebration at the Oaks today. This is their annual picnic, and is in charge of a committee, of which Mrs. J. B. Comstock is at the head.

Reed College Record—Some advance copies of the Reed College Record for May have just been issued. The cover decoration shows the entrance to the Arts building. Within are some unusually attractive views of beauty spots on the college campus. The text is largely taken up with pictures and descriptive articles concerning recent additions to the Reed college faculty. The list includes Stanley Astredy Smith, professor of Romance languages, Frederick Anderson, instructor in French, Karl Taylor Compton, instructor in physics, Doris Woodward Foote, assistant librarian, William Conger Morgan, assistant in chemistry, Kelly Rees, professor of Greek and Latin, Maude Hueston, librarian, Karl Baldwin Smith, instructor in art.

Car Company Is Sued—For injuries sustained while alighting from a street car at Third and Morrison streets on the night of January 25, Mrs. A. R. Masters started suit this morning against the Portland Railway, Light & Power company for \$15,000. The complaint was filed in the circuit court, by Attorney Bradley A. Ewers in behalf of the injured woman. It is in the complaint that the car stopped opposite a man hole, at the side of which a hole had been worn in the pavement to a depth of four inches. It is set forth that the woman stepped into the hole, tearing the tendon of her left ankle, which has compelled her to go on crutches since the accident.

Father Has Son Arrested—The failure of Charles Tooley, 34 years old, to pay his board bill to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. Tooley of 10 East Sixty-third street, this morning led to a warrant for his arrest on a charge of trespass, signed by his father, a member of the fire department. He said that he did not want to sue the son for he knew he could not collect, but he did want him to leave home and stay away until he could secure employment. The warrant was issued at noon today and put in the hands of the police to serve.

Library Change Favored—The Brooklyn Improvement club at its regular meeting last night adopted resolutions regarding the office of the Greater Portland Library association to have the proposed location of the new public library building changed to some other more suitable place than Tenth street. The club also recommended that telephone pay stations be established in the Brooklyn district for the benefit of patrons and that the signs on the Sellwood cars be changed to "Brooklyn-Sellwood."

Stocking Woman's Bank—A woman's bank, a long bank stocking, in which a Mrs. Starrett, of 323 Thirteenth street, secreted \$5, has been reported stolen from the woman's apartments and the police have been asked to aid in the search for the valuable hoard. It is believed the room was entered by climbing from a room in the adjoining building.

Mrs. E. S. Benson Funeral—The remains of Mrs. Emma Josephine Benson, wife of E. S. Benson, former auditor of the O. W. R. & N. company, who died in Chicago yesterday, will arrive in this city Sunday, and will be taken from the train direct to River View cemetery, where the services will be held.

Heat Kills C. J. Linquist—The extreme heat this morning coupled with infirmities of old age resulted in the death of C. J. Linquist, aged 75 years, a pioneer artist, as he sat on a bench by a grocery store at Twenty-second and Thurman streets. He sat down on the bench about 11 o'clock and half an hour later he was found dead by an employee of the grocery company. His body was removed to the morgue and a son in Los Angeles was notified. Linquist and his son maintained a studio at 130 Gilliam street, where he made his home.

INJUNCTION AT ALBANY STOPS RAILROAD WORK

Albany, Or., June 5.—When the track gang of the Oregon Electric company started to cut the rails of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern company at Fifth and Lyon streets yesterday evening at 6:30 a streetcar of the P. E. & E. was stopped at the middle of the intersection and at 7:40 an injunction was served on John Geist, foreman of the work for the Oregon Electric, restraining him from interfering with the track of the P. E. & E. for a period of 24 hours. Later a similar injunction was served on Lyman Griswold, division engineer for the Oregon Electric.

Fare of the Oregon Electric company to sign the customary maintenance contract was the cause of the blockade. Contracts have already been signed for the crossings at Lafayette street and Railroad street, where the Southern Pacific and Corvallis & Eastern tracks crossed, but there has been some delay in the signing of the agreement with the Portland, Eugene & Eastern.
