

KOREAN HATRED WORRIES JAPAN

Powerful Organization Said to Be Behind Revolutionary Feeling.

(United Press Special Wire.)
Chefoo, China, June 6.—The Japanese government has renewed its activity against persons charged with complicity in the plot to assassinate Count Terauchi, governor general of Korea, in connection with which about 110 Koreans were arrested recently. Japanese officialdom is hardly trying to disguise the alarm it feels at the extent and bitterness of the anti-Japanese feeling in Korea, revealed by investigation of the plot. It is admitted that at least 250 persons in the attempted assassination are still at large, against whom it is impossible to secure sufficient evidence.

Russia Gets Talons on Mongolia.

Peking, June 6.—The Chinese foreign office is unofficially calling the attention of foreign diplomats here to the fact that, despite his denials of any intention to grab Mongolia, the czar is pouring money into the Mongolian treasury in return for mining and other concessions. These concessions, the Chinese charge, are granted to furnish Emperor Nicholas with an excuse for financing the Mongolian prince's attempt to make good their recent declaration of independence of Chinese authority. China is in no position as yet to risk precipitating a clash with Russia by a formal protest to St. Petersburg against this breach of neutrality and it is believed President Yuan Shi Kai will seek to arouse the powers' jealousy of Russia to such an extent that without being definitely requested to do so, they will bring pressure on the czar to refrain from further mischief-making in Manchuria.

FINE QUALITY OF GAS DISCOVERED



Gas flow coming through 1200 feet of water.

W. W. Zollars, vice president of the N. C. H. Oil company, visited the company's oil well at Nehalem, Or., last Saturday, and found burning gas spouting to a considerable height from the casing of the well.

The well is now 1450 feet deep and the showing for the last 100 feet has been so good that it is believed it will be unnecessary to go much deeper to get the desired results. In the last 100 feet a formation of dark brown shale, an almost black shale and a fine blue shale has been passed through. Under the shale was found a mixture of five gravel and shale, and at the last drilling a very fine almost black sand which feels like velvet, was encountered.

Because of lack of casing at the well this sand was entered but a short distance. The gas is quite strong, and there is now about 1200 feet of water in the well. The water is kept there to hold down the gas until there is sufficient casing in the ground to proceed with the work. One man who lives at Nehalem got too close to the gas last Saturday afternoon and was somewhat singed.

The gas will burn almost constantly, and were it not for the water in the well it would be unsafe to set it afire for fear of burning the entire rig. The driller is very sanguine and says he expects success within the next 50 feet of drilling.

The company is capitalized for but 50,000 shares.

1500 START RIOT WHEN BUTCHER DESERTS BODY

Chicago, June 6.—Fifteen hundred persons, mostly women, participated in a riot yesterday afternoon which started yesterday afternoon when H. Kovinski, a butcher, started selling

meat in violation of his agreement with 145 other Kosher butchers who have refused to sell meat until prices are lowered. One man was stabbed during the riot and the windows of Kovinski's shop smashed.

The meat strike has been on here for some time, as a protest against what the Kosher butchers declare is an unfair boost in prices by the beef trust.

THEATRE FIRE FAILS TO FRIGHTEN PATRONS

"BLACK CATS" WILL HAVE REAL BANQUET

Next Wednesday evening a hundred or more black cats will sit down in the blue room of the Multnomah hotel to enjoy a banquet as the preliminary function to the concatenation to follow. The black cats are not real members of the feline family, but simply go by that name because of their affiliation with the Concatenated Order of Hoo Hoo, the insignia of which is a black cat.

Graham A. Griswold is at the head of the entertainment committee and he announced this morning that the affair Wednesday night will be the most elaborate and interesting ever pulled off by the Hoo Hoo organization in Portland since the big concatenation of 1905, when it was a feature at the Lewis & Clark exposition. This time it will be a sort of a side issue to the Rose Festival, although not officially connected with the Rose show. The date was fixed for the Rose Festival week in order that the concatenation may enjoy the benefit of the increased attendance that the concatenation will bring, for it is known

that several outside members will wander into the city to be with their fellow black cats that evening.

The banquet will begin promptly at 8:30 and it is planned to have the 25 or more kittens initiated into the order by 8:45, so that after their trying ordeal they may go out and enjoy the Rose Festival festivities. In the past it has been the custom to have the "on the roof" after the initiation, but this time it will come first.

David Davies, vice general snark for the northern Oregon district, will conduct the concatenation ceremonies. There will be no time for speeches.
