

EVERY CITIZEN IS ORDERED TO ARMS

Gomez Will Endeavor to Put Down Rebellion Unaided by United States.

(United Press Local Wire.)
Washington, June 7.—Plat warning to President Gomez of Cuba that his government must at once suppress the negro insurrection there on pain of an American occupation of the island was delivered in a note sent to Gomez on Wednesday by Secretary of State Knox. The text of the note was published here today. The government has ordered the commanders of the transports Meade, McClellan, Kilpatrick and Sumner, now at Newport News, to hold their vessels ready to sail at a moment's notice. Five thousand soldiers at Fort Oglethorpe, Fort McPherson, Ft. Mifflin, Ft. Porter, Fort Niagara and at Governors Island are also simultaneously ordered to be in readiness for Cuban service if necessary.

Havana, June 7.—Following reports of violence by the negro rebels in the suburbs of Havana, President Gomez today called every able bodied man in the island to arms to protect property and prevent outrages, to avoid the necessity for American intervention in Cuba. Scattered fighting between small bands of negroes and whites is reported. Reports reached here today of an attempt by rebels to destroy the Toledo Sugar mill, owned by Spaniards.

Washington, June 7.—Reports to the state department here indicated today that the Cuban army is beginning to make some headway against the rebels. The federalists, say the reports, defeated a band of insurgents near Guantanamo, killing seven men.

Must Pay for Loss of Lives.

Washington, June 7.—Mexico must pay for killing and wounding American citizens during the Madero rebellion by shots fired into United States territory from across the border. In reaching this decision the senate foreign relations committee decided to have the American government pay wounded persons and the heirs of those killed, and then demand of Mexico to remit to the government the amount paid out.

MAYOR TO FORCE TAZWELL, CAMERON TO ANSWER CHARGE

Collier, each refused to give a single bit of testimony. A surprising fact was learned when Police Commissioner Seton asked two of the witnesses if they were familiar with several sections of the city charter that the May jury charged had been violated by the police department. Henry Farr and R. J. Wagner, the two interrogated, declared that they did not know what the sections referred to provided for. From this it is surmised that the letter signed by the grand jury was perhaps instigated by someone not included on the personnel of the grand jury.

At any rate yesterday's events proved a boomerang on the district attorney's office, if, as has been freely rumored, the letter published under the signatures of the May jurors emanated from that office.

"Friend of District Attorney."
Mayor Rushlight, Police Commissioners Seton and Coffey and Chief of Police Stover were plainly angered by what they consider the uncalled for and unjust criticism contained in the letter and the testimony elicited from more than 20 members of the police force at yesterday's session constituted a severe arraignment of the district attorney, his deputies and Municipal Judge Tazwell.

Patrolman Wiley testified that he had arrested a man named Campbell on a charge of extorting money from a woman. "Deputy District Attorney Hennessey," said Patrolman Wiley, "told me that a simple case of larceny would be made of the affair, as Hennessey said, Campbell is a friend of District Attorney Cameron."

Patrolmen Black and Lillis testified that only yesterday they had called up the municipal court clerk early in the morning and requested that the case

against Nixon and Gibson, charged with being parasites, be held back until later in the morning. The patrolmen said they raided the Bushmark hotel about 8 o'clock and could not appear in the court against the two men before 10:30.

Case Is Dismissed.
"Yet when we appeared in the court at that hour," said the officers, "we learned that the case had been dismissed for lack of prosecution."

Sergeant of Police Harms also submitted damaging testimony against the police judge. He said that he had arrested 20 French parasites of the North end one night.

"Hardly had we arrived at the station, however," he said, "when I walked Max Cohen, an attorney, and who said he represented these parasites, Cohen called up Judge Tazwell and asked that the offenders be released on their own recognizance. The men were released, and although Cohen said they would appear for trial, some of them did not."

Patrolmen Hutchings, Wardle and others testified that they had been hampered by the district attorney's office and by the municipal court judge in their efforts to secure convictions against persons charged with various disgusting crimes.

Municipal Court Record.

Mayor Rushlight caused the municipal court record to be brought before him. This showed that the police had made 390 arrests since last July for serious crimes, and that the majority of cases only light fines had been imposed, though in some instances suspended sentences had been given and undersheriffs compelled to leave the city.

In spite of all the charges made in the letter signed by the May grand jury, one of these yesterday swore that he knew of nothing that had transpired while he was serving on the jury that would lead him to believe the police had not been doing their duty. This man is Henry Farr.

Mayor Rushlight announced before the session had adjourned that he will summon all the officers of the district attorney's office and those of the municipal court to explain why the police had not been more successful in prosecuting cases.

"I am disappointed over the result of my interview with the May grand jury, in view of the serious charges that body made against my police force," said Mayor Rushlight after the session. "I had hoped that the grand jurors would, as public-spirited citizens, aid me in every way possible to cure the evils they have called attention to, if, indeed, these evils actually exist."

Starwell on Warpath.
Municipal Judge Tazwell today flatly denied that he has obstructed the course of justice in his court and said that before he gets through he expects to make some of the officers who complained against him "look pretty small." While he declined to make any direct expression on Mayor Rushlight, he also intimated that the mayor is also due for shrinkage.

Deputy District Attorney Hennessey,

who shared with Judge Tazwell in the attacking testimony of the policemen and the mayor, said he would appear before the mayor if the latter desires, but could not understand why the mayor would want to call him.

"When we attended St. Michael's academy together about 20 years ago," he remarked meditatively, "I led Rushlight about 20 per cent in all the classes. I think I can lead him by just about that much now."

Doesn't Mind Criticism.

Judge Tazwell declared that within the last few weeks the attorneys in his court have been demanding jury trials. This, he said, indicates that they do not want to run the risk of conviction by trying cases before the court. He asserted that in every case where the evidence has justified convictions, the parasites have been convicted and given jail sentences, sometimes being also fined.

"I do not mind being criticized, so long as they play fair with me," said the judge, "but I don't like to be lied about and have only part of the facts told. Some of the policemen told lies about me in their testimony before the mayor."

"Take for instance the Bernard and Kugelmann cases, concerning which Police Officer Lillis testified. Those were cases where two men and two women were arrested who were living in a house in Irvington. The testimony in that case showed the defendants had been seen to enter the house, that voices of men and women were heard inside, that men's clothing was found in the rooms of the women. There was no question as to the character of the women, but no testimony to sustain the charge of an indecent and immoral act."

Didn't Know About Tampering.
"I suggested myself that new charges should be filed against the men for vagrancy. That was done and I found the two men guilty. I gave them the limit, \$100 fine and 90 days in jail. The cases have been appealed. Nothing was said in the testimony before the mayor about the later conviction of these men."

"Then Lillis said that he arrested a man in the court room for tampering with one of the witnesses, and that when he stepped out for a moment I allowed the man to get away. That is absolutely false. I did not hear any commotion, as Lillis says, and knew nothing at all about it. I don't believe there was any tampering, either."

"As to the dismissal of the Nixon and Gibson cases yesterday, I had no notice that Lillis, Black and other officers were engaged in a raid on the Bushmark hotel. These officers were witnesses in cases set for yesterday morning, and when these cases were called and the officers were inquired for, I was informed by the clerk that the officers were on their way to court. So I put the cases over."

Thinks Policemen Overstept.
"They were called again about 9:30 and again at 10 o'clock. Still the officers did not appear, and about 10:45 I dismissed the cases for failure to prosecute."

demanding trial, and I did not think I should hold the witnesses longer. Had I known the officers were engaged in a raid, I would have put the cases over again. The court's business comes first, and I cannot always be setting cases over to accommodate officers and lawyers.

"Policeman Black is nearly always late when he has a case in court. He oversleeps, probably. He brings in cases here with no evidence to support them. I have instructed the clerk that hereafter he shall take no messages and no orders from policemen. If a policeman wants a hearing postponed hereafter he will have to make the request himself or send someone to represent him."

"In the matter Policeman Long complained about, some gambling cases, he had arrested eight men. He testified four were gambling, but he could not tell which four."

Case Dismissed.
"I had to dismiss the cases, of course. In the case of the 20 men arrested as parasites who were released on their own recognizance after Captain Bailey had fixed bail, I acted on request of Attorney Max G. Cohen. That is the practice, where an attorney promises to have his clients in court. As a matter of fact, all but three of those same men have been convicted and sentenced to jail, their cases being now on appeal. In three cases it was conceded there was nothing upon which to hold the defendants."

"So it goes all down the line. I am ready to make a statement giving the story of each of the cases of which the policemen complained. There is a lot of absurdity and half truth about this thing. I have certainly done all anyone could to assist the police in cleaning up the city."

Deputy District Attorney Hennessey referred to the mayor's inquiry as a "farce," and said he did not like the play, because he and Judge Tazwell were not given the star parts.

Says He "Roasted" Policemen.
Referring to the T. D. Campbell case, Hennessey said it was true he told Police Officer Wiley that Campbell was friendly to District Attorney Cameron, and he presumed Cameron was friendly to Campbell, charged as a parasite. He said he suggested filing a single larceny charge, as the grand jury was not in session. He told Wiley that if the policeman did not like that plan he could take the case directly to the grand jury. He said Cameron's friendship would make no difference in the treatment of the case.

Hennessey said it was true he "roasted" Policemen Hutchings for bringing in the Lizzie Shoemaker case without testimony to back it up. The case was turned over to the juvenile court. In the Carl Strickland case, said Hennessey, he had the case in good shape, but after sending to Vancouver, Wash., for the prosecuting witness, she reversed her story she had told and the case failed.

Hennessey denied other charges made by policemen and said he did not believe the mayor's "farce comedy" would amount to much.
