

MAN BALKS AT DEATH PENALTY

Dan McAllen Excused From Jury Service in Roberts Trial.

Dan McAllen, "father of the law" and Clark expedition," was excused from jury service this morning in the case against H. E. Roberts, accused of killing Donald Stewart, because he does not believe capital punishment should be exercised in circumstantial cases. The jurist was somewhat doubtful if it should be used in direct cases, but presumed there are cases in which it may be proper. He qualified on all other points.

John P. O'Brien expressed a shaky feeling about the death penalty, but said if sufficient evidence was introduced to warrant this penalty he would vote for it as a juror. He said, however, that if he were in the legislature and a bill came before him to abolish capital punishment he would vote in favor of it. The juror is bound by as long as it is on the statute books, was his opinion. Circumstantial evidence, as is the case of Roberts, would have to be very strong for him to vote a verdict of guilty, he said. He was accepted.

Herbert Hollman was excused by a peremptory challenge, and W. B. Glafka was called to take his place. Glafka qualified as a juror according to both sides in 25 minutes this breaking the record for fast work in selecting a juror. J. Schiel was called to the box at noon and will be examined this afternoon.

Judge Morrow has announced that there will be no court Saturday afternoon, or any afternoon next week upon which parades are given by the Rose Festival. Several prospective jurors have sought excuses from serving on the jury, but Judge Morrow said he looked up, if accepted, and thereby be unable to see the festival.

BORAH INSISTENTLY DEMANDS ROLL CALL VOTE; WINS HIS POINT

The Taft people in this way secured control of the districts and the state convention. The Taft people argued that the committee could not go back of the returns.

Delegates instructed for Senator La Follette will not aid Colonel Roosevelt, but will vote for La Follette to the end.

Roosevelt Managers Angry.

The Roosevelt managers are mad clear through, charging that the committee hoped to further the colonel's boom by deciding every contest against him. If this prediction is borne out, the Roosevelt leaders will carry the fight to the floor of the convention in an effort to get the committee on credentials to reverse the rulings of the national committee. Senator Joseph M. Dixon, Roosevelt's campaign manager, charges the committee with resorting to "gag rule" in demanding that 20 delegates shall unite before a record is forced on contests. He maintains that if a record vote was ordered in each contest, many of the committee-men would not dare to oppose Roosevelt's claims. Roosevelt's strength in the national committee is away below that conceded to Taft. Taft has 29 of its members, while Roosevelt's strength is but 14.

When the committee opened its hearings this morning, Senator Borah of Idaho moved that the national committee amend the rules so that 10 members could force a record vote on contests. This motion was tabled. Borah then scathingly denounced the committee and a bitter debate followed.

Borah Gets Floor.

After demanding that the committee-men go on record in every case, Senator Borah began a vitriolic speech. While he was still speaking some one moved to table his amendment, and when Chairman Roosevelt put the motion over Borah's protest it was declared carried.

Fourteen times Borah shouted "Mr. Chairman!" but each time he was ignored by Roosevelt. Senator Borah, however, refused to surrender the floor. He continued talking and finally was permitted, by unanimous consent, to continue his remarks. He said that he knew the steam roller had been used, and demanded record votes.

The incident but served to emphasize the fact that President Taft controls the committee. It is believed to mean that only Taft contestants will be seated and also indicated that Roosevelt will come to Chicago and personally take charge of his fight.

Charles D. Hille, secretary to the president, is in constant communication over the telephone with the White House. He insists that President Taft will be nominated on the first ballot.

Talk of Colonel Roosevelt bolting the convention was renewed here today, but Senator Dixon insists that such action will not be necessary.

Oscar Hudley, a Roosevelt man, charged that federal officeholders dominate the Republican organization in Alabama and attacked the legality of the election of the Taft delegates. Most of the committee men paid little attention to Hudley's remarks. O. B. Street, a Taft supporter, immediately denied that intimidation and fraud had been used by the Taft people in Alabama. During the arguments Senator Borah, who is one of Colonel Roosevelt's staunchest supporters, conferred with Senator Crane of Massachusetts, one of President Taft's right hand men outside the committee room. Neither would talk of the matter discussed, but it was learned that Crane is anxious to placate Borah and prevent another outbreak. Senator Borah, it is known, intends to continue demanding a record vote on each contest and it is reported that some of the Taft committee men are in favor of making this concession in certain cases.

fairly luminous. A big lighting plan has been made by the Portland Heights club. Every yard will be dressed with electric lights, lanterns and color schemes that will transform the night appearance of the district. The celebration is called the "Feast of the Lanterns."

Meantime a dense, bewildering storm is gathering on the peninsula. It will grow thicker and more blizzard-like until Friday morning of next week, when it will burst over the city, not a crashing crescendo of hailstones, not a crashing rain, not even an Oregon mist, but a fluttering fall of millions of roses and petals that will envelop all along the line of the peninsula rose shower, with their myriad, perfumed presence. The committee in charge of the rose shower and battle wants every rose grower on the peninsula to gather up all the petals that have fallen, and the roses that can be spared and take them over to the fire hall at Killingsworth avenue not later than next Thursday evening.

Burst of Music. A burst of music and the ringing notes of happy voices will be the first formal notification to the world that the Rose Festival has commenced and that the Rose City is ready to do honor to the king of happiness, Rex Oregonus. The Rose musical chorus will give its first program of the Rose Musical Festival Sunday afternoon. One thousand voices will sing the songs of festivity. The greatest singers of the country are to be heard. Elliott Van Hoesen, one of the celebrated soloists of the musical festival has already arrived in Portland and is a guest of the Hotel Portland. Mary Cheney, the Welsh-American soprano, is to arrive today.

Everything is progressing slowly as far as the marine parade is concerned, said Admiral C. V. Cooper of water events, today. "Up to noon Thursday there were 51 boatside entries. Amongst the vessels that will appear in line beautifully decorated for the occasion is the San Francisco & Portland Steamship company's steamer Bear. Invitations have been issued by the company for numerous guests and the big steamer will be crowded with an enthusiastic throng. The Bear will have two cannon on board and will fire salutes as she comes up through the harbor. This vessel will lead the procession, passing up through all the bridges, turning around above the Hawthorne bridge."

The yacht Bay Ocean has been held over from her regular trip by her owners as a special courtesy to the Rose Festival, and will carry prominent guests, including the governors of seven states, mayor, councilmen and other dignitaries.

Bridge to Remain Open.

The Oklahoma, Tanana, Monarch, and several other river steamers will be in line. H. C. Wortman's beautiful yacht Sea Otter has been converted into the king's barge. She will be handsomely decorated, and will convey Rex Oregonus to the city to the accompaniment of cheering thousands, whistle blasts, ringing bells and reports of cannon.

The county commissioners have issued instructions to bridge tenders to keep the bridges open during the parade, as the time consumed will not be over 30 minutes. It is hoped that all persons who desire to be on either side of the river between 11:30 and 12 o'clock Monday forenoon will make arrangements accordingly, so as not to be inconvenienced.

Salutes will be fired by the Maryland and the Boston, as well as by the Bear when Rex Oregonus appears. Captains of large boats are requested to slow down while passing the small motor boats in the countermarch. While the waves from these large steamers are

in no way dangerous, says Mr. Cooper, they make it very uncomfortable for small boats, especially if women and children are passengers.

Evening Parade.

A little white flag with the official letter and number upon it will be mailed to the marshal to each boat entered. This flag should be flown under the lack of burgee on the jackstaff forward so that the judges will be able to distinguish boats by their numbers. First and second prizes will be awarded to the two best-decorated boats in each class, "A" being the workboats, "B" being the cruisers or cabin boats, and "C" the open pleasure boats.

"The evening parade," said Mr. Cooper, "to take place on Thursday evening, June 13, is scheduled to be the most elaborate affair. Workmen are now engaged in building a Mount Vesuvius on a large snow barge which will be towed through the procession by the Wilson, one of the Port of Portland tugs. Experts have been engaged to handle the fireworks, which have been prepared on an elaborate scale, on the barge. This barge will be moored not later than 7:30 p. m. Thursday alongside the Olympic dock and all boats participating in the night parade on that occasion should sail alongside to receive their supply of Roman candles, red fire and other fireworks. There is no danger whatever in handling the red fire as it comes in sticks and can be held in the hand extended overboard."

GIVES AVERAGE COST OF FEEDING PRISONERS

The average cost of meals furnished to city prisoners at the Linnton rockpile during the month of May was 75 cents, according to the monthly report of Superintendent A. J. Rose, submitted to Mayor Rushlight today.

The number of meals given prisoners was 1294, and the number of meals prepared for guards was 140. The average price of meals for guards was 30 cents. There were 58 prisoners at the rockpile May 1. During the month 75 more were received. Ninety-one served out their sentence, and there were 25 still there June 1.

The city turned over 1848 tons of crushed rock to the county, and kept on hand 270 tons crushed during the month.
