They had commenced a war whoop. Suddenly it died in their throats. Around the corner came a delegation of real Indians, with great feather head dresses and ferocious insignia and hideous war paint. Yelling and whooping, the Indians surrounded the "Indians". The latter surrendered without a struggle and stood in meek captivity for their pictures.

The arrival of the ad men from Spokane had been preceded just a few minutes by a smaller delegation from San Francisco and other California points. Their coming was not only the first considerable event of the Rose Festival, but was the beginning of the ninth annual convention of the Pacific Coast Advertising Association.

The Spokane special trainload of Ad Indians is led by a queen, Miss Marguerite Motie, who rules right regally and is as fair as the sunny city whence she comes. Other special trainloads are to come from Seattle and Tacoma. Big delegations are expected from Vancouver and Victoria. Many more are coming from California.

The ad men met this morning for their first session in the Multnomah hotel. Badges were distributed. The irrepressible Spokaneites were heard and seen everywhere in their buckskin suits and feather headresses.

STILL TOO EARLY TO VISIT CRATER

Seventy-Five Feet of Snow Is Found in Places by First Party Going In.

(Special to The Journal.) Klamath Falls, Or., June 10.—Chief Ranger H. E. Mommyer and a party of tourists have returned from a trip to Crater lake. The last 20 miles of the trip was made on foot and with saddle horses. In many places the party traveled over snow ranging from 20 to 75 feet in depth. At the superintendent's station the snow was about 10 feet deep and entrance to the building was gained through a second story window. In places the snow is not very deep at the rim of the lake, but in the sheltered spots there is frequently 75 feet. The party, which consisted of Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Neighbor and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Trower of Oakland, Cal., besides Mr. Mommyer, is the first to visit the lake this season. During the winter several people made trips to the great wonder on snow shoes. Mr. Mommyer states that the season for the regular tourist travel will open about July 1, and he advises those who do not want to under any hardships in seeing the lake to postpone their visit for about one month.

OREGON OSTEOPATHS HOLDING CONVENTION

The eleventh annual meeting of the Oregon Osteopathic association opened this afternoon at the Hotel Portland. The meeting will end tomorrow at noon. Delegates from all parts of the state are present, with several visitors from outside points, including Dr. F. G. Houseman of Nampa, Idaho, secretary of the board of osteopathic examiners of Idaho; Dr. A. B. Ford of Seattle, and Dr. J. L. Walker of Sunnyside, Wash. Dr. Walker was assistant bacteriologist at the American School of Osteopathy, Kirksville, Mo., and will speak on bacteriology and pathology tonight. WAR SHIP FINDS PLENTY OF WATER IN RIVER, ON BAR

With Draft of Practically 26 Feet, U. S. S. Maryland Had No Trouble Coming Up From Harbor Entrance.

Seated in his cabin aboard the armored cruiser Maryland this morning, Captain J. M. Elliott, commanding the largest war vessel that has ever entered Portland harbor, and also senior officer of the Pacific coast, said that the fighting machine had a fine trip up and that she had plenty of water both in the river and coming in over the bar.

"I myself brought the Maryland over the bar at 6 o'clock Friday evening," said Captain Elliott this morning, "coming in on high water, and at no time did we find less than six fathoms—24 feet—of water on the bar. There was also plenty of water under the keel of the cruiser on her trip up the river although she has a draft of practically 26 feet."

Captain Elliott, who left Portland July 6, 1911, having done shore duty here for over two years as lighthouse inspector for the seventeenth district, began to have an ambition to bring one of the larger vessels of the navy into the local harbor shortly after he came here. He had studied conditions in the river and knew that he could do so without difficulty and so after he took command of the Maryland at Mare Island on July 8, 1911, the Rose Festival association, Chamber of Commerce and other public bodies began a campaign to have the cruiser in command of Captain Elliott here for the festival.

Trip in Less Than Nine Hours.

The Maryland arrived in the local harbor at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon and was moored on the east side of the river just north of the Broadway bridge. The trip was made up the river in less than nine hours, Astoria being passed at 6:15 yesterday morning. Captain Elliott, who piloted the warship up the Columbia and Willamette rivers, and C. E. Forsythe, a quartermaster, first class, a Portland boy, conned the wheel on the trip up.

In addition to the large crowd of spectators and the vessels in the harbor which gave the Maryland a noisy greeting, she had an ovation practically all the way up the river, the population of all the towns and landings turning out, while steamers and mills greeted her with their whistles to each of which she answered with three blasts of her own whistle.

To many of the officers of the Maryland this is the first experience of Portland and one of them this morning compared the scenery on the trip up the Columbia river with that of the Kennebec river in Maine. The cruiser will remain in the harbor until Monday, June 17 when she will weigh anchor and proceed to sea with from 100 to 150 members of the Oregon Naval militia aboard for their annual summer training cruise. The cruise will be combined with a test of a sample of 900 tons of Colorado coal and consumed.

During the stay of the Maryland in port visitors will be allowed aboard every afternoon between the hours of 1:30 and 5 o'clock in the afternoon. It is understood that a number of functions for the entertainment of the officers of the cruiser have been arranged. Officers and crew of the Maryland number 894, there being 29 officers, 737 blue-jackets and 63 marines. In her main battery are four 8-inch guns, there being only two cruisers which carry larger ones of 10 inches. She also has the usual complement of smaller guns carried by cruisers of her class.
