### Missing Children Found

The police were called upon no less than 15 times Saturday to locate lost children who had wandered away from their parents in the shopping districts. Six of the little youngsters found their way to police headquarters where they were called for soon after. The oldest of the six taken to police headquarters was four years, and the youngest was but two years old. Many of the lost children were found in the department stores shortly after the frantic appeals to the station. The six taken to the station were Howard McKernan, aged four, who was found at Fifth and Morrison; Hazel Gross, aged three, Imogene Miller, aged two, and Mildred Miller, aged four, found at 310 Union avenue; Charles Simpson, aged four, who was found at Fifth and Jefferson streets; and Ben Lavin, aged four, who was found at First and Morrison streets. One little fellow's name was not secured, as the very much angered mother carried him out of the station under her arm, threatening the boy a good spanking, and failing to heed the officers' request to leave the name.

**Patrolman Hurt, Catches Runaway**—While mounted Patrolman M. B. Burrows was trying to stop a runaway horse that was dashing south on East Water street this morning, the frightened animal suddenly veered to the right, bumping into the patrolman's mount, and hurled him and rider to the street. Burrows managed to fall clear of the horse, but the animal, attempting to jump to its feet at once, was struck by the wagon drawn by the runaway, and fell on the officer and he was painfully injured, but mounted again and took up the chase. He finally overtook the runaway in the yards near the Portland Railway, Light & Power sheds at the end of Hawthorne avenue bridge, and held him until the arrival of the driver, Sam Purpura, who works for Pierce & Page.

**Isthmian Is Labeled**—Suit for libel of \$20,000 was filed by George Wolf against the steamer Isthmian, of the Hawaiian-American line, in the United States district court Saturday. Wolf asserts that he was permanently injured when he fell with some lumber through a hatch on the boat while she was unloading at Albers dock on the night of June 6. He says that he had of lumber on which he was working was larger than was safe. He fell 25 feet and was painfully injured.

**Chinese Target for Boys**—Hurling electric light globes at a Chinese peddler, at 4 o'clock yesterday morning, furnished great amusement for John Gommens, Charles DeWar, N. Young and Clarence Conroy, until the annoyed peddler, who was equipped with a police whistle, blew shrilly and brought Special Patrolman Childress and Patrolmen Niles and Hutchings. The four boys started to run, but all were caught after a chase and arrested for disorderly conduct.

**Two Houses Burned**—Two vacant houses at 6027 and 6029 Forty-first avenue, the first owned by H. Young and the second in charge of C. W. Wells, burned at midnight yesterday, entailing a loss of several hundred dollars. Police are investigating a report that the fire was of incendiary origin. The blaze was first discovered by H. J. Lowrey, of 6021 Forty-first avenue and engine No. 9 responded and fought the blaze.

**Radishes 10 Inches Long**—Mrs. J. W. Powell, 6028 Fifty-seventh avenue, south-east, has demonstrated the possibilities of the soil in that section of Portland for the production of vegetables. May 12 Mrs. Powell planted radish seed, June 10 she took from her garden delicious radishes an inch in diameter and nearly 10 inches in length. The garden land had been cultivated deeply but is practically new.

## TO FINISH INSPECTION OF GARDENS THIS WEEK

Driven by the necessity of making hundreds of inspections in the most limited time, the inspectors of the general school garden contest committee covered yesterday the gardens of Shattuck, Alnsworth, Bellwood, Llewellyn, South Mount Taber, Lents and Thompson schools. This nearly finishes both the all-city inspection by local advisory committees and the inspection for special awards by experts from O. A. C. and the office of the state superintendent of schools. "Emergency" was the reason assigned for conducting the inspection on Sunday.

As the hours of yesterday were on the need for increasing speed became greater and greater and the route seemed longer and longer. The last gardens were being visited when the voice of a motor car "cop" sounded unpleasantly in the ears of the garden auto driver.

"You report at the police court at 8 o'clock tomorrow morning," he ordered. "You were traveling at the rate of 23 miles an hour."

The driver and all the committee members averred that the machine was traveling only at the rate of 22 miles an hour and they expected the municipal judge or the city not to interfere with the garden contest work by assessing fines for excessive speed.

In one inspection party yesterday were Professor Bouquet, D. L. Dillard, of State Superintendent Alderman's office, Mrs. B. T. Voorhorst, assistant secretary of the committee, Ralph R. Routledge, vice chairman of the committee, and Mrs. McCutcheon. In another party were J. L. Duffey and A. L. Voorhorst, and O. M. Plummer, vice chairman of the committee.

The final inspection of gardens will be completed this week and the best community school gardens and the finest individual gardens will be announced together with the awards made. The general exhibit of vegetables grown by the 10,000 boys and girls who entered the contest will be made at the Armory next Saturday.

## SUFFRAGISTS TO SEND OUT "LUNCH TRUCK"

The "feed" auto truck of the suffrage committee of the Woman's club was not started today, owing to delay in getting the materials ready. Tomorrow noon it will be very much in evidence in the downtown district, and sandwiches, pop, doughnuts and other dainties will be dispensed to the hungry by suffragists. The proceeds from the sale of these lunches will be used to aid in defraying the expenses of the coming campaign.

Materials for tomorrow's lunch are being gathered at the Women of Woodcraft kitchen at Tenth and Taylor streets, and a large force of workers will prepare the food tomorrow morning. The truck will be stationed in the business district each day of the Festival during the noon rush. Many prominent business men have agreed to purchase their lunches from the women. The distribution of suffrage literature was carried on by young girls yesterday morning at the close of early mass at 26 of the Catholic churches of the city. All but a few of the smaller outlying churches were visited by the workers. The work among the Catholics is being carried on under the direction of Mrs. Ringrose, a suffrage worker from California.

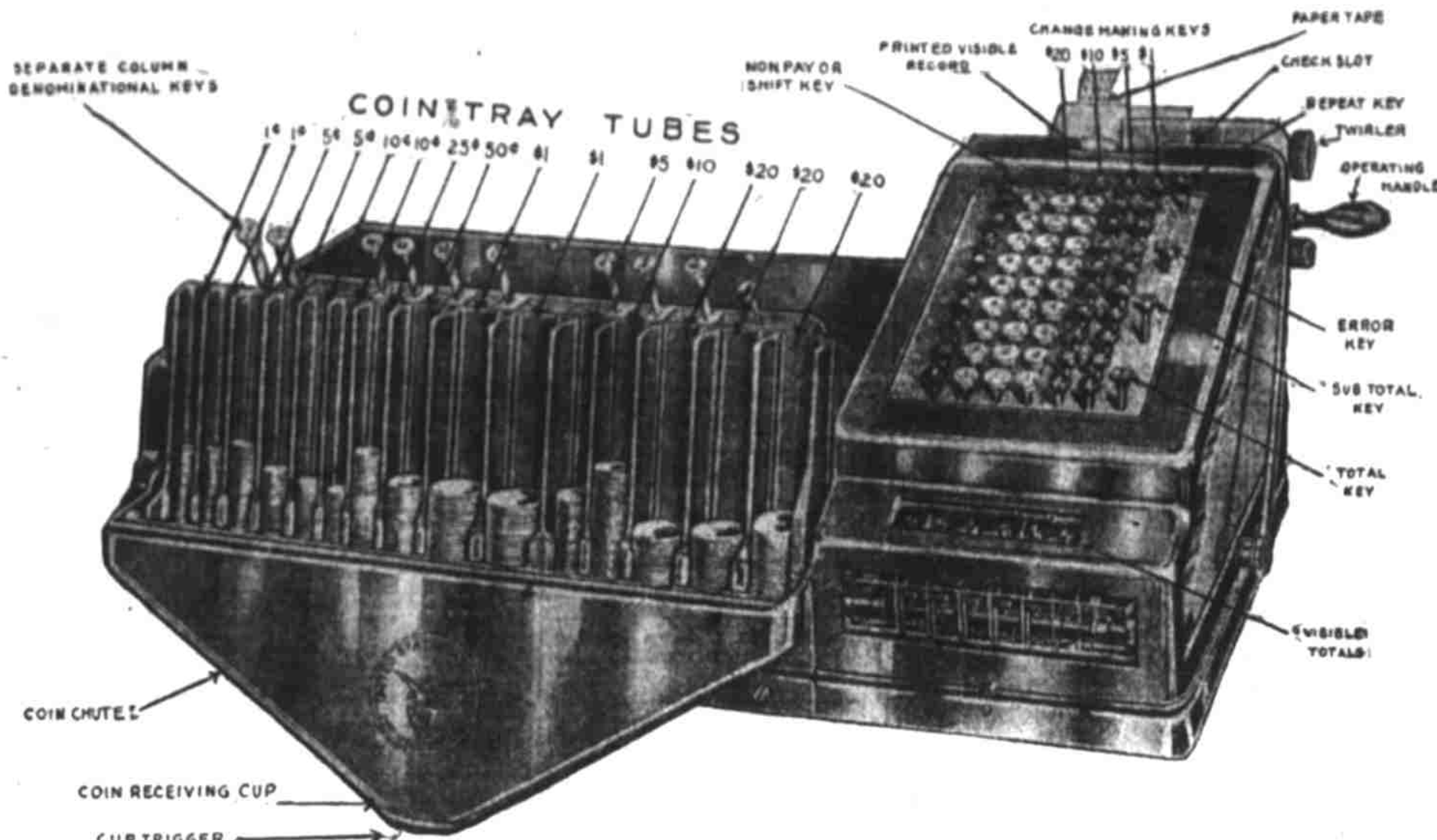
