Condemned Murderers Perfect Appeal in Effort to Avoid Noose.

Cale a Burney of The Joshual b Salem, Or, Jude 11.5-A transcript on appeal in the came of the state against George and Charles Humphrey, sentenced to be hanged June 14 for the murder of Mrs. Eliza Griffith, an aged woman w-o lived alone near Philomath. was filed with the suprems court to day by attorneys for the condemned men. Judge Hamilton, of Buesburg. who tried the case, has granted a writ of probable cause for stay of execution pending the supreme courts decision on appeal. The attorneys for the de-fendants will have 10 days to prepare their brief and the state will have 20 days to file an answer.
Although Governor West has refused

to say what his course will be in grant-ing reprieves to the Humphreys, pending a decision by the voters of the state on the question of abolishing cap-ital punishment, it is taken for granted that he will follow his previous course and allow the reprieves until the question has been settled by the ballot. As criminal cases are given first consideration over all others by the supreme court, it is probable the question of an appeal will be decided before the election in November. In case the appeal is denied, the fate of the Humphreys will rest entirely in the ands of the voters, as well as the fate of, other prisoners under sentence of death at the penitentiary. Governor West has said that if the voters deagainst abolishment of capital punishment, he will not interfere again with any of the men awaiting execution, but allow the law to take its OUTS&




