

STATE'S WITNESS APPEARS AGAINST CLARENCE DARROW

Testifies Attorney's Brother-in-Law Offered Him Money to Stay Away From Los Angeles During Trial.

Clarence Darrow's brother-in-law gave him \$10,000 and expenses to Chicago and offered to pay him \$100 a week during his stay there if he would remain out of the jurisdiction of the California courts during the trial of James H. McNamara in Los Angeles.

K. A. Deakman, formerly a clerk at the New Hamilton hotel in Los Angeles, who identified J. H. McNamara as a man who stayed at the hotel under the name of J. B. Bruce the day before the Times building was blown up, made this statement today while testifying for the prosecution in the trial of James H. McNamara.

Worked as Detective. Hanerstrom is alleged to have worked as a detective for the McNamara defense according to Deakman's testimony today. Hanerstrom sought him out in Albuquerque, N. M. when it became known that he would testify against McNamara and offered him a number of inducements to go east.

Deakman finally went, but returned to Los Angeles after an interview with Hanerstrom at Darrow's Chicago office, according to his testimony. Deakman is one of the witnesses introduced to prove the "retainer" conspiracy to hush witnesses and jurors in the McNamara trial as charged by District Attorney Fredericks at the beginning of the Darrow trial.

Identified by Dunne. Hanerstrom took me to ex-Mayor Dunne's office in Chicago, testified the witness, and asked Dunne to identify him as Mr. Darrow's brother-in-law. He had previously passed himself off to me as 'Mr. Higgins.' Mr. Hanerstrom then introduced me to Edward Neckela, a Chicago labor leader, and told me he would be under his (Neckela's) care while in Chicago.

HUMPHREY CASE TO HIGHER COURT

Condemned Murderers Perfect Appeal in Effort to Avoid Noose.

Salem, Or., June 11.—A transcript on appeal in the case of the state against George and Charles Humphrey, sentenced to be hanged June 14 for the murder of Mrs. Eliza Griffith, an aged woman who lived alone near Philomath, was filed with the supreme court today by attorneys for the condemned men.

Although Governor West has refused to say what his course will be in granting reprieve to the Humphreys, pending a decision by the voters of the state on the question of abolishing capital punishment, it is taken for granted that he will follow his previous course and allow the reprieve until the question has been settled by the ballot.
