**Census Fraud Cases**—Information charging neglect of duty while employed in taking the last government census two years ago were filed against Fred H. Saylor and Samuel R. Mason, Jr., by United States District Attorney McCourt and the indictments charging the men with fraud will be disclosed this afternoon. The two will plead guilty and receive sentence by Judge Bean. It is expected that this will amount to 1200 dollars. The fraud charges against John O'Connor and James H. O'Connell are to be dropped on recommendation of Attorney McCourt.

**Pleas Guilty, Fined**—Pleas of guilty were entered this morning in the circuit court by Frank L. Smith in two cases appealed from the justice court, where he was fined for selling short weight butter and selling misbranded butter. A fine of \$25 was fixed in the latter case, with \$15 to be given in the first offense. He was found guilty on both charges in the justice court. Both cases were brought by the State Dairy and Food commissioner.

**Nothing in "Turkey Trot" Story**—A letter has been received here from the Editors of the Ladies Home Journal, stating that several girls employed by the Curtis Publishing company at Philadelphia, publishers of that magazine, had been discharged because they danced the "Turkey Trot." The denial says the publisher does not know how the story originated, but there is no foundation for it.

**Restraining Order Asked**—The "R. V. I." company, manufacturers of men's summer underwear, filed a complaint in the United States district court this morning, asking that Michel & Siechel, dealers in men's furnishings, be restrained from selling underwear with the "R. V. I." brand for less than the price placed upon it by the manufacturers. They also ask that the local company account for all garments sold at a less price.

## KANSAS CITY WOMAN WANTS GOOD HUSBAND

Several days ago who gave the name of Wagner, but who is known here as Frank Link, who is said to be the man who, on January 2, shot Peatrossian Ambassador, through the head in a revolver shot on Burnside street and who shot Special Policeman Ed. Gansett through the shoulder, when he came to the aid of Peatrossian, Wagner was arrested (there on a vagrancy charge) and his photograph was sent here for identification. When the first report of the man's arrest was made here, little credence was given to the assertions of the copy, but the photograph has dispelled the doubt.

**Case Withdrawn**—Motion for consent in the case of Kidwell vs. the Oregon Short Line Railroad company was allowed this morning by United States District Judge Bean, before whom the case was being tried. The motion was allowed on the ground that according to the contract between Kidwell and the railroad regarding the shipment of cattle for which Kidwell was seeking damages, any claim for damages had to be made within 10 days of the arrival of the shipment at its destination or before the cattle had been allowed to mingle with other stock. This was not done. Kidwell asked \$475 damages for shrinkage and bruises received during shipment from Huntington, Or., to Omaha.

**Two Stores Robbed**—Boys last night broke into a hardware store at 1642 Hawthorne and stole a shotgun, a rifle and six pocket knives and a lantern, broke into a grocery store at Sixteenth and Division streets, conducted by A. J. Murphy, where they tore the telephone box off the wall, but were routed out when Andrew Ellis, a clerk in the store who resides near by, discovered the intruders. He fired several shots after them. When an examination of the store building was made, both the guns and one of the knives stolen from the hardware store were found in the rear of the grocery. The police have a description of the robbers.

## FAMILY BIBLE HAS UNUSUAL HISTORY: PUBLISHED IN 1804

A family Bible of unusual history is owned by Mrs. Charles L. Parcher of Goldendale, Wash., formerly of Portland. Her husband, who is in Portland attending the Rose Festival, has it in Portland today. The volume is bound in sheep, and the binding is well preserved, although it was published in 1804. The cover has been protected by an outer cover of deer skin, which dates back to about 1820. The fawn from which this skin was tanned was killed by James Hobbit, the grandfather of Mrs. Parcher and original purchaser of the book, in his back yard at Lincoln, Ill. Lincoln was then on the border of pioneer land. The rule in the Hobbit family has been to pass the precious Bible, containing the family record within its yellowed leaves, to the youngest daughter. In this way it first became the property of Milcent Hobbit, the mother of Mrs. Parcher. In 198 years it has had only three owners.
