

TIME FOR FILING CONTEST EXPIRES

Oregon Delegation, However, Might Have Been Unseated.

Had a contest been filed with the Republican national committee, at least two of the delegates from Oregon, and perhaps the entire delegation, would have been unseated.

This is the inevitable conclusion from the action of the committee in Chicago today in seating the Taft delegates in the Fourth district in California. Taft carried that district, and the state law providing for election of all delegates by the state at large is rudely set aside.

La Follette carried the Third district in Oregon, comprising Multnomah county, and by the same rule is entitled to two delegates from that state. It is reasonably certain that had some political genius filed a contest, the Oregon delegation would be split, the state primary law notwithstanding.

The California and Oregon laws differ in regard to the rule for nomination. In California the law requires nomination of two from each congressional district, though all are elected at large. In Oregon the nomination and election are alike at large, with no recognition whatever of the congressional district lines.

The call of the national committee for the convention provided that no election should be held that would deprive the voters of any congressional district of the right to choose the delegates from that district. This rule was violated both in California and Oregon.

There is thought to be no danger of the Oregon delegation being thrown out at this time, because no contest was filed with the committee, and the time for filing expired late in May.

The Taft case in California was weakened by the withdrawal within the last few days of the certification of the vote of the Fourth district made by the secretary of state. Congressional lines have been recently changed, and in many instances they bisect the precinct lines. This makes it impossible to tell the exact vote for Roosevelt and Taft in the congressional district. Before learning of this condition the secretary of state of California certified that Taft had carried the district by about 300 votes.

American Lumber Must Pay Duty.

Ottawa, Ont., June 13.—Justice Cassels handed out judgment in the exchequer court sustaining the contention of British Columbia lumbermen in the case of the Ross Lumber company vs. the king. The decision means that American lumber sawn and dressed on one side, hitherto admitted duty free, especially in the prairie provinces, must pay a duty of 25 per cent.

San Francisco, June 13.—Joseph Havelock Wilson, president of the National Unionist and Farmers' union of Great Britain and Ireland, arrived here today on the steamer Tahiti from Australia, to remain for two weeks as the guest of the maritime unions of San Francisco.

Wilson was met outside the Golden Gate by a reception committee consisting of Mayor Ralph, Walter McArthur and Paul Scharenberg, of the Sailors' union of the Pacific, and a number of representatives of the Alaska Fishermen's union, the Marine Engineers' association, the Bay and River Steamboat Men's union, the Marine Cooks' and Stewards' association and the California Harbor Workers.

Wilson is one of the world's foremost industrial organizers.

O.-W. DISREGARDS ORDERS ON WOOL

Gives Car Lots Third Class Rating in Disobedience to Interstate Ruling.

Salem, Or., June 13.—A feature of the long drawn out fight between the railroad companies and the shippers over wool rates was an order by the interstate commerce commission reducing the classification of wool shipped in carload lots from the second class to the fourth class, with a minimum carload of 34,000 pounds. This applied to both sacked and baled wool. It now appears that this order of the commission was disregarded by the O.-W. R. & N. Co. in its new freight tariffs, recently filed, which give wool in carload lots a third class rating instead of fourth class, thus materially increasing the freight rate.

As soon as this rule in rates was discovered by the state railroad commission that body communicated with Charles A. Froudy, chairman of the interstate commerce commission, who gave assurance that the commission would at once take the matter up. He said, however, he thought it would be better to let the new tariff as filed remain in effect this season, and that the commission will protect the shippers by forcing the railroad to rebate to the shippers the amount of excess freight charges.

Then the state commission took the matter up with the officials of the National Woolgrowers' association, and the commission will hold a meeting in Baker on June 20, with the executive committee of the association, and Victor O. Johnson, chief attorney, and ex-Governor Gooding of Idaho, for the purpose

of deciding on what course to pursue in keeping the matter before the interstate commerce commission.
