

SCHOOL ELECTION POLLING PLACES ARE DESIGNATED

Thirty-three Voting Stations to Be Provided for Election of Director to Be Held in City, Monday.

Thirty-three polling places have been designated by the city board of education for the annual school election next Monday afternoon, when a school director will be chosen to succeed J. V. Hesch, chairman of the board. Mr. Hesch is a candidate and is opposed by O. M. Plummer, a quiet but active campaign being waged by both.

While polling places have been named in each ward, it is not necessary for the voters to cast their ballots in the wards where they live. The voting may be done in any place convenient to them, either men or women can vote if their names are on the tax roll, or if they own stock in a partnership or corporation that pays taxes. The polls will be open from 2 to 4 o'clock p. m.

PROHIB OF LANE CO. PUT IN FULL TICKET

(Special to The Journal.) Eugene, June 12.—The prohibitionists of Lane county will have a full ticket at the November election. The county convention was held in this city yesterday and a ticket named as follows:

For representatives—T. H. Garrett, William R. Porter and Jefferson H. Irish; sheriff, Edward Zumwalt; treasurer, W. W. Beary; assessor, L. A. Colborn; county school superintendent, A. A. Kyberg; county commissioner, G. M. Bailey. The platform adopted was as follows:

"We endorse the national and state platforms of the Prohibition party.

"We affirm our belief that the 'good man' theory of government is not the solution of the liquor problem. Good men are helpless so far as permanent results are concerned, without parties that are pledged in their platforms to a definite moral lesson.

"It takes a party absolutely pledged to the solution of this question to win this fight. This party is the Prohibition party.

"For the upbuilding of this party we must begin to elect men to office in each county. Building from the top down never built a party."

A. O. Stillman, candidate for congress, addressed the convention.

RIOTS BREW IN CANTON; TROOPERS HELD READY

WESTERN PACIFIC GAINS WHILE ESPEE IS LOSER

Sacramento, Cal., June 12.—That the Western Pacific Railroad company is cutting into the Southern Pacific's business at least is shown by the statement of gross receipts by both roads compiled by the state equalization board in fixing the tax assessments for the fiscal year, 1912. The Southern Pacific's gross receipts decreased almost \$2,000,000 in the tax levy year, 1912, as against 1911, while the Western Pacific gained more than \$0 per cent.

EPIDEMIC OF SUICIDE SWEEPS RUSSIAN CITY

(United Press Leased Wire.) St. Petersburg, June 12.—The unaccountable epidemic of suicides in Russia is continuing at the rate of nearly ten a day, most of the victims being under 25 years of age. Poison is the usual means employed. Several have jumped through holes in the ice of the Neva. An aged nobleman, ruined, leaped from a sixth story window to his death.

VISITORS JAMMING CHICAGO HOTELS

Big Loop District Hostels Expect to Care for at Least 15,000.

(Special to The Journal.) Chicago, June 12.—An army of visitors that is expected to surpass all records for a national political convention week in Chicago Sunday is marching into the city by companies and regiments, and by Saturday the hotels in the downtown section will be filled to capacity.

Within two weeks after the national committee decided last winter to give the convention to Chicago every room in the Congress hotel, where both the Taft and Roosevelt headquarters have been located, had been sold out for the convention week, an indication of the crowds that are expected to be attracted to the city by the big quadrennial meet of the Republicans.

The Blackstone, LaSalle, Sherman house, Great Northern and other big hotels report a similar demand on their capacity, and the proprietors predict that by Saturday night every downtown hotel, both big and little, will be hanging out the sign "Out Room Only." Officials in charge of the passenger traffic of the railroads entering Chicago likewise are of the opinion that a new record for crowds will be established in Chicago this week and next.

PIPE LINES ARE CLASSED AS COMMON CARRIERS

Washington, June 12.—Interstate commerce commission decided today that the commerce law imposing all common carrier obligations on all pipe engaged in transporting interstate commerce, even though such lines are constructed over privately acquired rights of way and transport only their own oil.

CRUELTY'S YEARLY TOLL IS 1255 TOTS

Humane Society Takes Up 2356 Prosecutions, Only 61 Cases Dismissed.

London, June 12.—The number of children killed by cruelty in England, Ireland and Wales in the past year reached the appalling total of 1255, exceeding any previous record, according to the annual report of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children published today.

More than 80,000 complaints of cruelty to children came to the notice of the society during the year. Of these 499 were for assault and general ill treatment, the rest being for starvation. Only 61 cases were dismissed out of the 2356 prosecutions undertaken directly by the society.
