"Need You Here and Need You Badly," Wire Chicago Leaders; They Say Colonel Will Come.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, June 13.—Theodore Roosevelt will come to Chicago on the first train if the progressive leaders here have their way. After an all night conference the leaders of the Roosevelt campaign decided today to notify the colonel that he is needed here, and needed badly.

Governor Johnson of California and Francis J. Henry of San Francisco are expected to arrive here today. Colonel Roosevelt was coming, explaining that he was to have been held at the Auditorium theatre tonight, was postponed to Monday night.

Taft Men Hold Conference. Following the announcement that a hurry-up call had been sent for Roosevelt, the Taft leaders, including William H. Barnes of New York, Senator Penrose of Pennsylvania, Senator Crane of Massachusetts and Senator Stephen of Wisconsin, held a long conference. Later they declared they expected the Roosevelt people to attempt a demonstration in the hope of stampeding the convention. The Taft leaders admit they have arranged to elect the colonel, although it may start a riot on the floor of the convention.

Chairman Barnes of the New York state Republican committee, who is the head and front of Taft's steering brigade, announced today that he had talked with all the delegation leaders here, and said that he had a list of signed delegates which showed that President Taft will have a clear majority.

Root is Due Today. The Taft forces will be augmented this afternoon by the arrival of Senator Willis Root of New York, Taft's choice for temporary chairman of the convention. Root is bringing a personal message from President Taft to the Taft leaders.

The Roosevelt leaders branded today the charges advanced by Taft men that money was being freely used to buy Taft delegates for Roosevelt. Roosevelt, Senator of Montana, Roosevelt's campaign manager, was made clear through when he heard of this allegation. He immediately demanded that Congressman McKinley, director of the Taft bureau, specify instances.

ROOSEVELT WILL TAKE
LINDSEY AS RUNNING
MATE TO WIN WOMEN?

Denver Newspaper Charges That Plan Hatched to Swing Balance Held by Fair Sex.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Denver, June 13.—Charging a Roosevelt plan to capture the votes of a million women who will hold the balance of power throughout the nation next November, the Denver Republican declares today that Judge Ben H. Lindsey, of the juvenile court here, notes as a reformer, may be Roosevelt's running mate.

Mrs. Sarah Platt Decker and Lindsey, the paper says, conferred here before Judge Lindsey started east, with the result that Mrs. Decker agreed to throw her influence among the western suffragists to a ticket headed by Roosevelt and Lindsey, whether this ticket is a regular Republican ticket or a bolt ticket.

In return for this, says the Republican, Mrs. Decker is to get the nomination to congress from a Colorado district, receiving Roosevelt's personal support. This plan, says the paper, caused Roosevelt to announce yesterday in favor of woman suffrage.

Mrs. Decker was formerly president of the National Federation of Women's Clubs and has always been an active suffragist. It is reported that it is her ambition to be the first woman to occupy a seat in congress.

DIXON DARES TAFT
AIDES TO PRODUCE
BRIBED DELEGATES

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, June 13.—Furious at published charges by Congressman McKinley, director of the Taft bureau, that Roosevelt leaders were resorting to bribery to control the national convention, Senator Joseph M. Dixon of Montana, Roosevelt's campaign manager, issued today the following statement:

"I dare to name any of our men they say were involved in the bribery of delegates. In this fight it is a case of McKinley being a pot and calling the kettle black. Let him name the Roosevelt men who offered to take a Taft delegate or the delegate accepting the bribe."

McKinley in a glass house. A national committee man who is voting with us was offered a federal membership if he would go over to Taft. I told him not to take a phony money, for his name would never see the light of day when it came to confirmation in the senate."

Senator Dixon said he was in a position to give the name of the committee man, and added:

"I want a showdown on McKinley on the bribe charges. It is easy enough to get out cheap clapnet. McKinley is like a rattlesnake which muddies the water so its own hideousness may not be seen. They know we are not using disreputable methods to secure delegates like that bunch at the Columbus convention who already are guilty of stealing more than 100 votes."

Senator Dixon talked with Colonel Roosevelt over the telephone today and then conferred with Amos Pinchot, Congressman, William Kent of California, George W. Perkins, Medill McCormick, former Secretary of the Interior James R. Bartfield, Alexander P. Moore of Pittsburgh and William Allen White of Kansas.

White called the national committee a "bunch of highbinders."
