Chinese to Be Deported.—Lee Ti Yeh, a Chinaman, arrested last week for compelling his white wife, formerly Lottie Brown, to lead a life of shame, and who was first locked up on a vagrancy charge, is to be deported following an investigation by government authorities, who declare he is in the United States illegally, and it is expected that by this arrest a system of forging what is known as the "Chink Check" or certificate of legal residence has been disclosed.

Fortuna for Portland Woman.—Somewhere in Portland is an heiress to what is believed to be a valuable California estate, for whom the police are searching. A letter was received this morning by Chief of Police Stover from L. C. Griswood, of Antioch, Cal., asking them to find his niece, Mrs. Sadie Crowder, who is somewhere in Portland.

Revolver Shots Mysteriously.—Five mysterious shots fired from a revolver at 1:30 o'clock this morning near the new Mount St. Helens reservoir has mystified the residents in that vicinity and was the cause of a long and careful investigation by Patrolman Post, who, however, was unable to explain the mystery. As soon as Post heard the shots he rushed to the place from where they seemed to originate, but found no one who knew what they were, although many residents heard them.

Veteran Found Dead.—Edward L. Currier, a Civil war veteran who lives at 214 Main street, was found dead in his room yesterday afternoon by mail carrier, and the coroner was called to take charge of the remains. Death was probably due to heart failure. Relatives have been notified and will take charge of the body. He was 74 years of age and was a member of company H, Thirtieth Illinois volunteer regiment.

Kramer Bound Over.—Sam Kramer, who was arrested last week by Detectives and Patrolman Malone on a charge of extortion following the payment by Max Wagner and Sam Gross of \$10 each for alleged police protection, yesterday afternoon waived a preliminary examination before Judge Tawell on the extortion charges and was bound over to appear before the grand jury.

Gets \$5000 Damages.—A verdict for \$5000 was given Peter H. Eitelson against the Portland Railway, Light & Power company this morning for personal injuries. The case was heard by Judge McGinn. Nine jurors signed the verdict. The plaintiff is in charge of the waterworks at St. Johns and was injured early this spring while alighting from a streetcar at Union avenue and Macgley street.

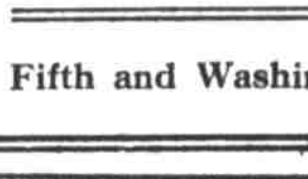

Ladies and Gentlemen— I have your communication of June 9 requesting that I permit the use of my name for re-election to the office of school director of School District No. 1, Multnomah County, Oregon.

Feeling a keen appreciation of the honor that you thus confer upon me, I have decided, after careful consideration, to accept your call and become a candidate for the office.

If re-elected to this position I promise that I will favor in the future the introduction into the school system of Portland of such progressive features of school work as may be shown by the experience of other cities to have substantial value.

For some years it has been the policy of the Board to obtain sufficient school grounds to permit outdoor play for all the pupils. I have favored this policy and will strive to see it continued.

While thus endeavoring to keep our schools in touch with the progressive spirit of the times, I shall strive to keep the expense at the lowest point consistent with efficiency, mindful ever of the heavy burdens of the taxpayers.

I favor greater security to the teachers in their tenure of office, either by the establishment of a system of civil service, or an increase of the term for which they are elected, together with the rule that before a teacher's application for re-election shall be rejected, she shall be granted an opportunity before the full Board to explain or deny her alleged shortcomings.
