

TO MAKE ATTEMPT TO RAISE DEFICIT

Rose Festival Chorus \$2000
Behind, to Hold Two Con-
certs at the Oaks.

In an attempt to raise the heavy deficit of over \$2000 which now confronts that organization, the Rose Festival Chorus will hold a picnic at the Oaks Wednesday afternoon and evening and will give two grand concerts aided by the Oaks Park band.

In addition, Walter H. Evans will speak from the bandstand in the afternoon at 4 o'clock and will make an appeal for funds which 25 pretty girls will collect.

At 8 o'clock, C. Chapman, publicity manager of the commercial club, has promised to take the bandstand and will tell why to the benefit of the Portland Commercial club the Rose Festival chorus should have support.

The afternoon concert will be exclusively by the junior members of the chorus, some 400 in number, who will be seated about the grandstand. The evening concert, which is expected to be aided by several leading Portland soloists in addition to Misses Michaela Ruiz and Signor J. Luvet, who will be heard in grand opera, will be given by the adult chorus of 150 voices. The afternoon concert will commence at 2 o'clock and that in the evening at 8 o'clock.

The attendance at the concert, if favorable weather is forthcoming, is expected to be larger than at any time at the Olney Smith intervale, and for this reason Rev. Albert Elmgren is hopeful of raising the \$2000 required to set the organization on its feet financially.

Following is the program that will be offered, with the exception of the interpolated numbers by The Oaks Park band.

"How Lovely Are Thy Messengers," (St. Paul), Mendelssohn, "On to the Battle," from Joan d'Arc, Alfred Gaul, "My Love Dwell in a Northern Land," Edward Elgar, "March of the Toreadors," Carmen, "The Heavens Are Telling," from "Creation," Haydn, "Trixie Land," Dan D. Emmett.

Frederick Elmer Chapman will direct both choruses and William Lowell Patton will be the accompanist. Philip Pels will direct The Oaks Park band.

"The J. J. Murray family is now comfortably located in a very pretty bungalow about three miles distant from Portland. It is a regular garden of Eden spot. No matter in what direction the eye wanders, it is feasted with beautiful scenery. To say that we are all very much pleased with this country is but to mildly express our feelings. The 'Rose City' is a very appropriate name for the city of Portland. The climate here is almost perfect. Leaving Hooker, Okla., and coming here is almost like dropping into another world, the change is so radical. The writer found the Oregon fields almost knee deep with green grass and clover; the rose bushes and fruit trees were in full bloom, the perfume of which was taken up by the soft cooling air reminding one of some pleasant dream instead of a reality.

"The J. J. M. bunch is very busy at this time so please pardon me for closing this rambling letter, this with a promise of more about this country in the near future. I believe you can safely and sincerely say that the writer has about made up his mind to live and die, not in Dixie, but in Oregon."

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LONDON SOCIETY REVELS IN "HUNDRED YEARS AGO" BALL



Family Archives Sacked to In- sure Accuracy in Costumes of Brilliant Affair.

London, June 15.—The "Hundred Years Ago" ball at the Albert Hall was one of the most interesting social events of the season. The ladies organizing quadrilles not only ransacked family archives, but had recourse to the British museum so as to insure absolute accuracy in the characters to be represented, and theatrical costumes were ruled to the limit in executing orders. Men, however, experienced considerable difficulty in getting their orders executed, for Georgian hunting coats and knee breeches must be made by first class tailors, hundreds of whom were still on strike. No one was admitted to the ball room who was not in fancy dress, but there was freedom of choice, so long as the style in vogue a century ago was followed.

The most important of the quadrilles was the "Waterloo" in which the Duchess of Marlborough appeared as the Duchess of Richmond in a dress which is a replica of that worn by her grace at the famous ball on the eve of Waterloo. This quadrille was arranged by Lady Arthur Paget, who found a Napoleon in Sir Charles Hartopp, Wellington was represented by Lord Hardinge, Lord Titchfield appeared as the "Prince of Orange," Lord John Cavendish personated Blucher, Captain Albert Paget represented Lord Uxbridge, and Mr. Monckton-Arundell, represented the Duke of Brunswick.

The ladies in this quadrille are among the most noted beauties in society. Prominent among them were, Mrs. Sarah Bingham, Miss Muriel Wilson, Lady Desborough, Lady Helen Vincent, and Lady Beatrice Herbert.

Lady Minto's three daughters, Lady Errington, Lady Charles Fitzmaurice, and Lady Ellen Elliott, were among those dancing in her Indian quadrille in which some of the most magnificent old Indian dresses presented to Lady Minto during her husband's viceroyalty were worn.

Court Beauties Take Part.
Court beauties of the regency assembled for the two square dances which Lady Kilmorey presented in which a bevy of beautiful young women representing "Court" and "Society" in 1812 were seen.

Prince Alexander of Battenburg, danced in the "Society" quadrille as well as Lady Kilmorey's son, Lord Newry, Lord Victor Paget, Lord Desmond Fitzgerald, Lady Inglestre, Miss Sackville West, Mrs. Henegge, and Miss Lavinia Bingham.

The ball was held in aid of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Help society. A particularly effective costume was one designed from the German lancer regiment's uniforms of 1812, cleverly adapted to a lady's dress by the artist of a short skirt of green cloth, slit up to the knees and slashed with red. The black leather helmet had a metal top and coque plumes, two chains linking it on to the breast. Another uniform which was greatly admired was that of the German grenadier guards of 1812. It is of blue and white cloth, with collar and cuffs of bright red cloth.

The Nelson quadrille gave a fine op-

portunity for varied naval uniforms for the men partners, and "Nelson" was seen in a tunic identical with the one in which the national hero met his death.

CHILDREN DECORATE PRIZE-WINNING CART

A ten-year-old girl and a boy of five, who decorated their own little pony cart and drove their bay Shetland pony, Nellie, in the horse and vehicle parade, are proud of the big trophy cup they received as second prize. Jones, of South Mt. Taber.

Their pony cart, adorned with pink Caroline Testout roses, the official flower of the festival, was one of the daintiest and prettiest in the parade. Many folks thought it was the prettiest. Nellie's harness, in white, was in pleasing contrast with her bay body and the pink cart.

Harriet and Alewyn say that Nellie is every bit as proud of the prize cup as they are, and deserves just as much credit for winning it. Nellie was on her mettle in the parade.

SCHUEBEL SUES GUSTAV SCHNOERR

Morning Enterprise Also Sued
by Oregon City Lawyer,
Who Asks \$20,000.

Oregon City, June 15.—Alleging that an advertisement published in the Morning Enterprise before the recent primary libeled him, C. Schuebel, of the firm of I. Men & Schuebel, today filed suit for \$20,000 damages against Gustav Schnoerr, president of the Deutsche Verein in this county, and vice-president of the German-Soviet in Oregon and Vice-President of the newspaper. The plaintiff asserts the charges are untrue. Schnoerr has been indicted and has re-

tained George C. Brownell and J. E. Hedges to defend him. German friends and others are rallying to the assistance of Schuebel. Schnoerr and Schuebel are both Republicans nominees for representative.

The complaints in both cases are similar, the following being a part of them: "That in the issue of the Enterprise of April 13, 1912, and April 19, 1912, there appeared and was printed and published and circulated by defendant among many subscribers of said paper and among the reading public in general an article of which the following is a true and correct copy:

To the legal voters of Clackamas county, Oregon:

Quintessen—A man must be judged by his own words and deeds, not by the words of his enemies and false friends. For weeks Christ Schuebel has been attacking me, most shamefully, some persons or persons must be supplying him with large sums of money and his vocation surely does not keep him very busy since he finds so much time to roam over the whole country telling atrocious lies, very good he himself is, and how despicable his opponents are. This I could not do. I have neither time nor money nor brass enough to

attack and slander those who have always been friendly and kind to me. Neither can I understand how a person can afford to spend hundreds of dollars for the small compensation he can possibly get if elected to the legislature.

Mr. Schuebel tries to make his audience believe that the 'interests' or 'corrupt' private parties have 'bought me.' He is not deceived. No! I, but he, has been bought, if signs fail not, and because he is used to being bought and being sold, as everybody knows he made an effort to buy me in my own house. This happened March 31, 1912.

The legal voters must decide whether they want honorable, experienced and successful men, chosen from their ranks, as their representatives, or whether they want politicians and demagogues who seek only their own honor and welfare, who trample on the rights and honor of their fellow men, and who are the cause that our political life is as corrupt as it is.

I declare and prove by my daily life that all attacks which Mr. Schuebel is making on me are malicious lies, manufactured by himself and sown broadcast, contrary to his own better knowledge."

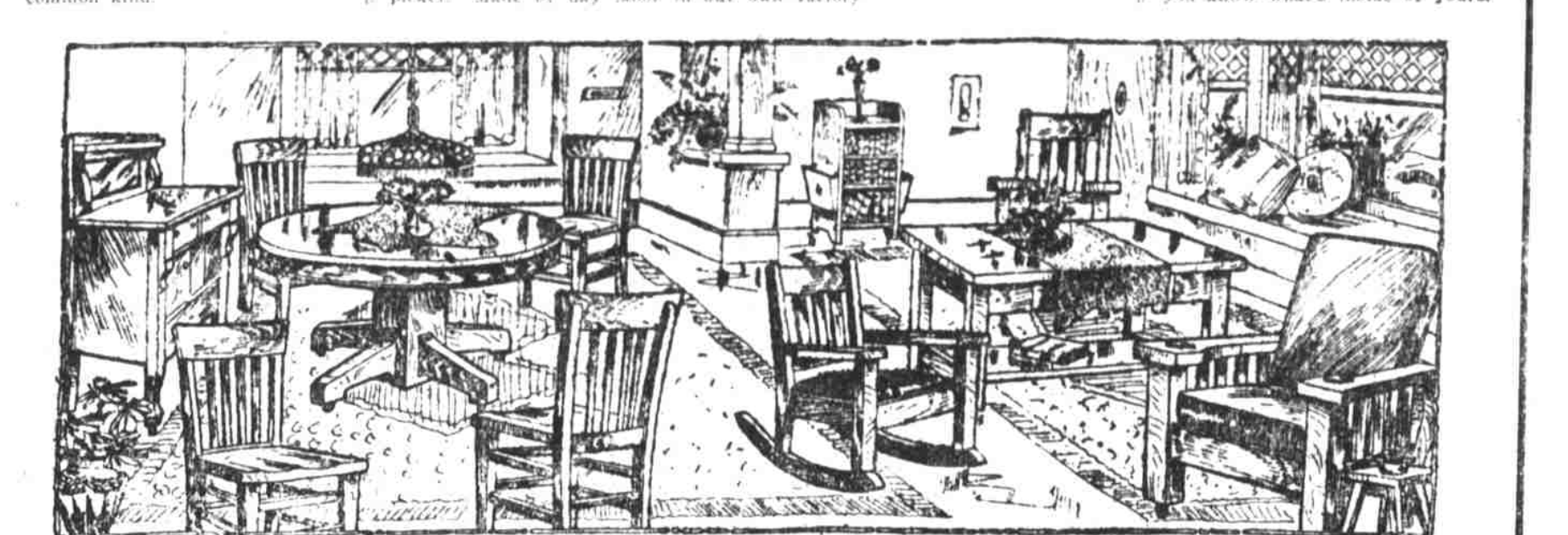

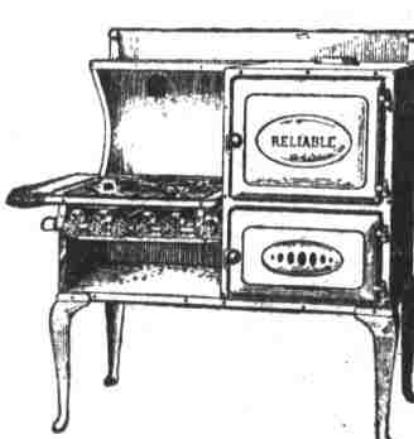

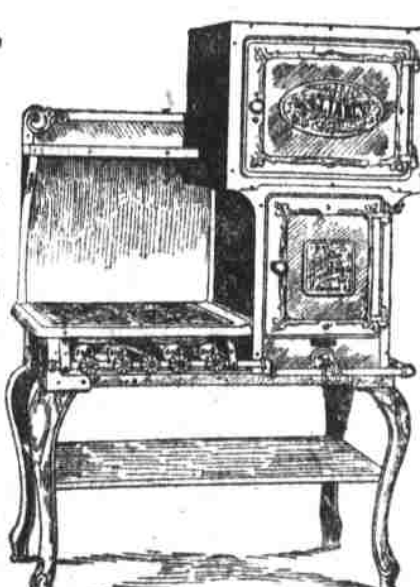
