

### WELCOME HIKERS WITH BAND, PLAN OF LOCAL B. P. O. E.

#### Elks Hope to Meet Missouri Walkers at Outskirts of City and Celebrate July 4; 10 Steamers Chartered.

If the three hikers who are walking from Brookfield, Mo. to Portland to attend the Elks grand lodge reunion can complete their trip by July 4 they will be met at the outskirts of the city and escorted to the lodge headquarters here by the Elks administration band, the marching squad of lodge No. 147 and about 100 automobiles according to the plans of the 1912 Elks commission, announced today.

As there is no special celebration of the Fourth planned, it is believed a large crowd would turn out to welcome the long distance walkers.

Secretary McAllister stated today that the commission had just chartered the steamships Monarch, Tahoma, Undine, Iona, Harkness, Burton, Modock, Kellogg, Italia and America for the Elks' big excursion to the Willamette and Columbia rivers, Friday, July 12. The vessels have a combined passenger capacity of 2000.

Negotiations are on to charter the steamships Rose City and Bailey Gatzert in addition, as it is expected that fully 6000 people will want to take the trip. On the day of the excursion the Elks' big river parade will be held also.

The Elks' commission has induced the plan of the Portland Auto club to hold auto races and an aviation meet at the Country club on Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons of Elks' week. The attraction will be placed on the official Elks' program. The Auto club has decided to hold the races and meet on the night of July 6, following the state convention of Elks there, July 5 and 6. They will arrive at Portland on the morning of July 8. The Montana Elks will make the Portland hotel their headquarters.

McCredie women bearing Elk identification cards will be admitted free to the baseball park during Elks' week and provided the consent of Al Baun, president of the coast league, and J. C. King, of the San Francisco team, can be secured. San Francisco plays here during the week.

### GOVERNOR OFFERS REWARD TO STOP STOCKMEN'S FUSS

#### Trouble Between Sheepmen and Cattlemen in Baker County Leads to Appeal to Executive for Relief.

Salem, Or., June 19.—As a result of reports to Governor West that "lawless men have destroyed flocks, intimidated employes and menaced the lives of sheep owners" in various sections of eastern Oregon, the governor has announced a reward of \$500 for the arrest and conviction of the guilty persons.

This is another chapter in the feud between cattlemen and sheepmen in Baker county. It is said these stock owners have been bitterly contesting one another's rights to grazing land in forest reserve grazing districts. So far no arrests have been made.

### CURRY CO. CAN'T USE ROAD FUNDS ON RIVER

The attorney general advised him that the road funds could not be used for that purpose.

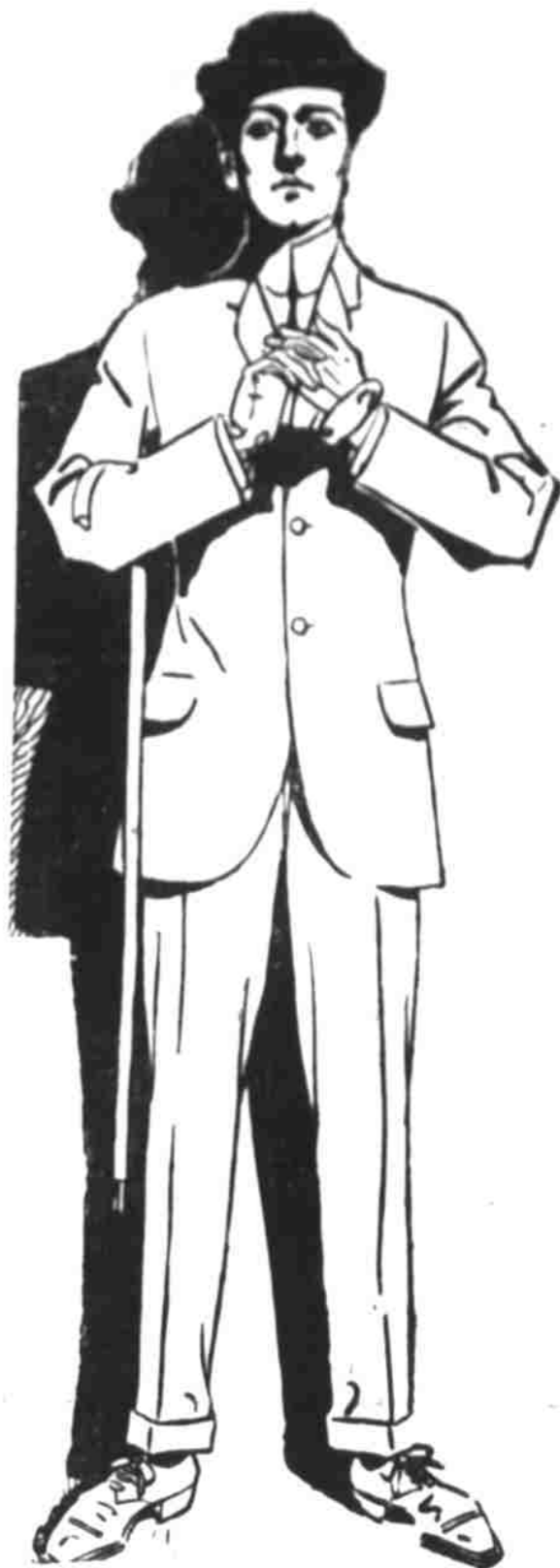
