Thursday's News Briefly Sketched

Happenings of Human Interest Occurring Throughout the World After Yesterday's Issue Went to Press.

Political.

President Taft's confidence in his success at Chicago is so great that he motored out to Chevy Chase Thursday, and passed the day on the golf links. Theodore Roosevelt has declined to join in the New York Men's league for woman suffrage. After the recent announcement by Colonel Roosevelt that he was for women suffrage, Secretary Hedges of the league called at the former president's office and left a membership blank for him to sign, but the colonel answered that he did not wish to avail himself at this time of the kind offer. By a roll call vote of 203 to 149 the state constitutional convention has rejected a proposed amendment to the constitution granting votes to women in New Hampshire. Declaring he did not wish to be made the laughing stock of the convention, Senator Borah has appealed to his admirers to recall their campaign material and lay aside their badges, streamers and handbills bearing the legend "Borah for President."

Foreign.

Defeat by the federalists in the approaching battle at Bachimba, 45 miles south of Chihuahua, will mean incessant guerrilla warfare by the Mexican rebels, according to the assertion of General Pascual Orozco. The rebel army, in case of a reverse, will be divided into numerous mobile bands, the largest under the immediate control of the commander in chief, who also would take with him the state officials necessary for the establishment of the state capital at whatever place General Orozco may designate. Luther Maynard Jones, former law partner of the late William C. Whitney, and first secretary of the Yale Alumni association, was found Tuesday in a hospital at London, after a disappearance of three years, due to loss of memory, caused by abscess on the brain. Jones went to London in connection with an important lawsuit, and disappeared. He was found by J. R. Quinn, a lifelong friend, after a year's search. General Orozco gives out the statement that he will evacuate the city of Chihuahua rather than allow its residents to be submitted to the dangers of a bombardment. The rebels have changed their minds about engaging the federalists at Ortiz, and are placing their cannon in position to await the advancing government troops at Bachimba. Eight bridges were blown up north of Ortiz, one of them being a big steel structure. On the rapidly with which the forces of General Huerta can repair these is the hour of the big battle dependent.

Local.

Postmaster J. H. Conrath and State Bank Commissioner J. E. Swanger headed a delegation of 26 Hadley admirers who left Jefferson City Thursday night on their way to the Republican national convention. They intend to start a "Hadley for President" boom. Supreme Justice Hughes will not permit his name to be mentioned in connection with the nomination for president at the Chicago convention. Asked if, under certain circumstances, he might reconsider his decision, he replied: "I have said as justice of the supreme court I am rendering public service and may continue to do so for some years, but the supreme court must not be dragged into politics and no man is as essential to his country's well being as is the integrity of the courts." Ada county voted to retain the licensed saloon by a majority of 1700. The fight waged in Boise and the county precincts was one of the most bitter in the history of the state. Issues rolled up a majority for the "wet" issue that the "dry" country precincts could not overcome. Returns give the licensed saloon a larger majority by 1900 than they received two years ago, when an attempt was made to place the county under the local option law.

Eastern.

Evvin Nesbit Thaw appeared Thursday as a witness for the state against her husband, who is endeavoring to prove in Justice Keogh's court that he is now sane and should be released from the Matteawan asylum. Mrs. Thaw testified that her husband made a proposal in New York in 1904 that they both commit suicide. He had the details all planned, she said. She refused to accede to his plan. She testified further that Thaw had complained to her that the food given him while he was in the Tombs was poisoned. General Edward S. Bragg, commander of the famous "Iron Brigade" during the Civil war, died at Fond du Lac, Wis., Thursday. General Bragg was 95 years old. He served several terms in congress as a Democrat from Wisconsin, and later represented the United States in Mexico, Cuba and China. He gained fame when, in securing the nomination of Grover Cleveland he used the expression, "We love him for the enemies he has made."

Miscellaneous.

The police of New York are searching for William Sloan, a wealthy Chicago promoter who disappeared from a downtown hotel on the morning of June 1. On the day before he had received \$250,000 in cash for his services in settling a claim for J. P. Knight of Chicago. It is believed he has been murdered and robbed. A test of the automobile truck as a substitute for the army mule has just been concluded at Madison, Wis. In favor of the mule. The commanding officer reports: "The automobile demonstration has been such as to warrant the conclusion that it is unwise and unsafe to supersede army mules and wagons with the trucks by any other form of locomotion." Ludlow Chambers and his three daughters of San Francisco will receive \$1,500,000 as the result of the settlement of an old lawsuit in St. Louis. In 1832 Thomas Beatty, grandfather of Chambers, bought the St. Louis property, but failed to record it, and afterward lost the deed to the land. Others took possession of the property and it was not until 1843 that Beatty, having recovered his deed, began suit to regain the land. After Beatty's death his heirs continued the suit. The detention hospital at San Francisco holds a man of mystery in a middle aged Russian, unable to speak English and supposed to be insane, and who has been lying in seclusion for months on the sea beach. After being taken to the hospital for examination as to his sanity, he was searched. Papers in the name of Undritz for wireless telegraph patents obtained in this country, and money consisting of 146 Russian in Russian banknotes and \$2073 in United States currency, were found in his clothes. Through the Aberdeen chamber of commerce that city is making an effort to secure the erection of a pulp mill. Through government tests it has been found that the timber of the Pacific coast is adapted to the manufacture of paper. Within the past few weeks over 2000 range cattle from the Utah ranges have been shipped into Baker county and disposed of among the farmers, for the purpose of building up the cattle industry in that section. Death in a form that is little known on the Pacific coast came to Philip Barnhardt, a farmer living near Lynden, Wash., Wednesday night, when he was struck by a bolt of lightning. The storm was the most violent that has occurred for 10 years. Members of the Portland presbytery held an interesting conference at Tillamook, which lasted all day Tuesday and Wednesday, when plans for the ensuing quarter were arraigned. The visitors were given a trip through the valley, with visits to the different creameries, and were entertained with a luncheon at the commercial club Wednesday. COOS BAY ROAD IS TO BE BUILT SOON

Representatives of Contractors Announce Preparations for Construction. (Special to The Journal.) North Bend, Or., June 21.—Immediate preparation for the construction of the Southern Pacific line from Eugene to Coos Bay will be made by representatives of McArthur Bros. & Perka company, which has the contract. General Superintendent Tinkler will arrive next week and Thomas Dixon, who is head man in the absence of Mr. Tinkler, arrived today on the steamer Washington from San Francisco, together with George H. Cool of the financial department of the company. It is announced by the representative of the company that he will take up his residence in this city and will open offices. Much of the machinery to be used at this end of the line is in Arizona and the moving of the equipment to this point will begin soon. It is estimated that it will be the middle or latter part of July before work can be started. Mr. Dixon says he will be able to announce plans within a few days. Assurance is given that there will be no further delay in the starting of construction.

ASHLAND LOSES WATER OFFICIAL

William Patterson, for Years Water Commissioner, is Victim of Apoplexy. (Special to The Journal.) Ashland, Or., June 21.—William Patterson, for years city water commissioner, known by the entire community, and a public servant of great worth, was buried in Ashland cemetery yesterday morning, the services being conducted under the auspices of the Christian Science society, the A. O. U. W. and the Knights of Pythias. Mr. Patterson's death came shortly after noon last Monday from apoplexy. He had been about his duties as usual in the morning and had eaten an unusually hearty dinner. His daughter found him dead on the lawn a few moments after he had left the table. Mr. Patterson was born in Ohio in 1845 and came to one of the old pioneer families. He was the third in a family of 14, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joshua Patterson, of Ashland county, Ohio. He came to Jackson county, Oregon, in 1862, the family settling on some of the choice land of the valley, about four miles north of Ashland. He was married to Miss Bessie Cliff, at Jacksonville, March 11, 1871. He is survived by a widow and six children, one child having died in infancy. They are Mrs. R. R. Robley, of Portland; Mrs. Jessie Perotval, of Independence; Mrs. Elsie Churchman, Mrs. W. C. Mitchell, Harold, and Margaret Patterson, of Ashland. He also leaves six brothers and two sisters, three of whom reside in this vicinity. Mrs. James Thornton and Sylvester Patterson, of Ashland, and Joshua Patterson, former county commissioner, of Talent. Mr. Patterson had been at the head of the city water system for a number of years and knew it better than anyone else in the community.

EUGENE COUNCIL GIVES STREET RIGHTS TO ROAD

The railway company has begun the work of constructing its crossing tracks at the intersection in question and the tracks will be completed as soon as possible.
