

**WILL DEDICATE NEW
BAPTIST CHURCH AT
LENTS NEXT SUNDAY**

Services to Be Held Both In
the Morning and Evening—
History of Church.

Services tomorrow will be held morning, afternoon and evening at the location of the new Baptist church at 1401 Madison. The church has just been completed at a cost of about \$1000 and the lot in addition will make the entire cost in the neighborhood of \$2000.

March 16 the former meeting house of the congregation at First avenue and Foster road was destroyed. At once plans were taken to provide for a new home; it is the result that the present building was placed under construction in three months at Fourth avenue and Foster road. The work has been rushed from the very start and almost record time has been made in the construction. The new building is a three-story structure with a full concrete basement. The main auditorium has a seating capacity of 300 and the lecture room in the rear which can be thrown open into the main hall adding an extra 100 seats. The basement is to be used for Sunday school and entertainment purposes. The pews for the new church were

taken from the old Baptist church at 21st and Main streets, which was recently burned. They are a present from the East Side Baptist church.

In the morning Dr. C. A. Woody, Pacific coast superintendent of the American Baptist conference, will preach. At 3 o'clock in the afternoon the dedication sermon will be preached by Dr. Walter Benwell Hinson, pastor of the White Temple. He will be assisted by various pastors of local churches. Rev. F. W. Parker, general secretary of the Oregon Baptist state convention, will preach the evening sermon. Music at the services will be furnished by the Ladies' Harmony chorus of which Mrs. C. C. Tringali is the director. In the afternoon J. F. Perkins, bass, will sing a solo.

Rev. J. M. Nelson, pastor of the church, has been here for the past two weeks. It was formerly for the past two years at Los Angeles, Cal. The church now has a membership of 117 and a Sunday school of 100. Now that more room is available every effort will be put forth to enlarge these numbers materially. As the new building under the block on the fifth avenue plans will be made later for a paragon on the rear of the lot.

Masonic Festival Services
