

ALIENIST AVERS THERE IS NO TEST FOR MAN'S SANITY

Dr. Williamson Testifies He
Would Adjudge Roberts In-
sane Merely on Testimony
Already Submitted.

Cross examination of Dr. W. T. Williamson, alienist, who gave his testimony for the state yesterday afternoon, occupied this morning session of the trial of Jack Roberts, charged with first degree murder of George M. Brown and George Hastings on the White House road, March 29, 1912.

The cross examination was largely a review of yesterday's testimony. Dr. Williamson defended himself on his direct statements as to the sanity of Roberts, but admitted the authority of the reference books used by himself as well as by Dr. Brown of Tacoma, who testified for the defense. Dr. Williamson said that there is no test for a man's sanity, but that a man is sane unless he shows upon examination, some evidence of insanity. Dr. Brown, on the other hand, proceeded in another manner to get at his results, according to his testimony, and by following up Roberts' insanity, and taking into consideration Roberts' own peculiarities, he had determined to his own satisfaction that Roberts is insane.

Examination Unnecessary.
Dr. Williamson said that if he relied upon the truthfulness of the testimony in the case to base his opinion, and had not made a personal examination of

Roberts, he would consider that Roberts is insane.

The cross examination of Dr. Williamson was probably the most interesting part of the trial. Dr. Williamson of the state mental hospital will follow him on the stand. Dr. Williamson will be the last witness. Judge Morrow is anxious that the case shall be completed so that he can instruct the jury early Monday morning.

Says Roberts Is Not Insane.

Roberts was not insane on the night of March 29, 1912, and is not insane at this time, according to Dr. W. T. Williamson, alienist, of Portland, who took the stand yesterday afternoon as a witness for the state in rebuttal. Dr. Williamson gave many reasons for his belief, after making an examination of Roberts and hearing the testimony of Roberts and hearing the testimony of Roberts and hearing the testimony of Roberts.

In his testimony, Dr. Williamson said: "The test of a man's insanity depends altogether on an examination of the man himself. It does not depend upon his own statement or upon the statement of others. It does not depend upon the conditions, and is a very interesting study. It does not follow that because a man's parents are insane, or because all of his ancestors have been insane, that the man himself is insane."

Roberts talked intelligently for five and one half hours concerning his life, telling especially of his trip across the country and back, after his release from the penitentiary, and of his actions on the night of the White House road tragedy. He told of having been followed across the country by his "persecutors." This was the only detail mentioned which might indicate another than normal mind, and though Roberts probably had a delusion that he was being followed, it was not an insane delusion.

The only points in his narrative where he became confused, where he said he had "bursing" in his head and could not think clearly, was where he was on the point of saying something

which might incriminate him. He seemed to realize that he was going to be tried for murder, and that his plea was going to be insanity.

Roberts said at different times during his talk that he guessed he was "nuts" or "buggy." The true insanity rests on an indication that he intended firing over the heads of the persons in the automobile, and did not intend to kill them. If Roberts were a paranoiac he would not hesitate to admit that he intended to kill them, because his delusion of persecution would be so strong that he would consider it proper to do so. Roberts admitted that he was sorry he killed the boys. Again, the paranoiac would express no such regret.

Dr. Williamson was formerly first assistant physician at the State Mental hospital at Salem.

"BLUE SKY" LAW PETITION BEING RAPIDLY SIGNED

In two days nearly 1000 signatures have been secured for the "Blue Sky" petition against fake stock sales which is being promoted by the Chamber of Commerce, Realty board and other business organizations. It is expected that the 10,000 signatures necessary to place the bill on the ballot will have been secured by tomorrow night, as an emergency force of circulators is at work. The "Blue Sky" law is aimed at promoters of swindling concerns like the Columbia Orchards company, which lured credulous investors out of several million dollars, when its officers disappeared with government prosecutors close on their trail. It is said its passage will save to Oregon annually \$1,000,000 hitherto lost by people who put small savings into "wind and water" enterprises.

STRANGER DUPES FRANK GRAY'S TWO FIANCEES, STEALS 1

Gets \$54 From Mrs. Settle
"Until Remittance Comes by
Wire," Then Leaves on
Train With Mrs. Metcalf.

Redding, Cal., June 25.—Officers who searched Southern Pacific train No. 12 here failed to find George Gray and Ethel Metcalf, who supposedly got aboard the train at Oakland, Or.

Roseburg, Or., June 25.—Mrs. Carrie Settle, a widow living at Oakland, who recently lost \$50 in an alleged swindle, has again been made a victim, and Miss Ethel Metcalf, an 18-year-old girl, who won Mrs. Settle's fiance away from her, has been lured away from home by a stranger, under the pretense that she was going to her present fiance, Frank O. Gray, who is in jail here on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses from Mrs. Settle.

Gray formerly was a lodger at Mrs. Settle's home and Miss Metcalf was employed as a domestic there. Gray became engaged to be married to Mrs. Settle, but later, after winning Miss Metcalf's consent to marriage, broke the engagement with Mrs. Settle. He borrowed from Mrs. Settle \$100 which he said he needed to save mortgaged property in California. After securing the money Gray left presumably for California but later wired to Miss Metcalf to meet him in Oregon City from where

they would go to Portland and be married. Mrs. Settle loaned the funds, and caused Gray's arrest on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. He was placed in jail here in default of bonds.

A few days ago a stranger who slightly resembles Gray in appearance appeared in Roseburg and presented himself as a brother of Gray's. He said his mission here was to repay the money which his brother had secured from Mrs. Settle and to furnish the \$100 bonds under which Gray is being held. His story was so plausible that he deceived Mrs. Settle's attorney and Mrs. Settle, who jumped at the opportunity to get back her money she loaned Gray. The stranger said the necessary money for his purpose had been telegraphed to Roseburg from Pittsburg, Kansas, where Gray's relative reside. He made Mrs. Settle believe this and on the strength of it she readily complied with the stranger's request for a loan of \$100 with which to arrange matters satisfactorily. He also made Miss Metcalf believe his story and easily induced the girl to consent to his plan that they go to San Francisco together, with the understanding that he had beforehand baited Gray out of jail and that Gray would immediately join them in San Francisco, where they would be married. The couple left for the Bay City yesterday morning. To Mrs. Settle, the impostor said the man and the girl were going only to Roseburg, that Miss Metcalf and Gray would be married here, and that he immediately would remit to Mrs. Settle the full amount of money due her.

Gray has a brother, but when the man was described to him he denied any relationship to the man or knowledge of him in any way.

The train carrying the couple had left Ashland before the facts were known and instructions for their arrest were telegraphed to several towns south of Ashland.
