Jury Unable to Agree.—An all night session of the jury in the case of white slavery which was tried before United States District Judge Bean against Carl Jensen failed to bring in a verdict, and the jury was discharged yesterday afternoon. The case will be tried again at the next term of the court. From a partial statement by one of the jurors made before Judge Bean could stop him it appeared that the session was stormy, and that at one time nine of the 12 jurors were for conviction. Jensen was charged with taking his wife, Louise, from Astoria to Seattle, on the way to Alaska, and with bringing Maude Adams from Missoula, Mont., to Astoria. The complaining witness, Louise Jensen, disappeared shortly before the trial opened, and the government attorneys think that she was given an interest in a saloon belonging to Jensen to get her to disappear.

Rev. Dr. Wilson Back.—Rev. Dr. Clarence True Wilson and Mrs. Wilson returned yesterday from a four months' tour and are at their home, 8 East Seventeenth street. Dr. Wilson leads a strenuous life, having traveled 46,000 miles in the last 18 months and he and an assistant have held 1000 public meetings in a year. He visits every state in the union, addresses Methodist conferences, conventions, mass meetings, Sunday schools and fills pulpits every Sunday, besides maintaining a printing plant in Topeka, Kansas, the headquarters of the society. The general conference of the Methodists voted an appropriation of \$50,000 per year to the work of which Dr. Wilson is the founder and superintendent. His official title is general secretary of the Temperance society of the Methodist Episcopal church.

Foresters' Picnic at Oaks.—The annual picnic of the Foresters No. 1247, Rose City No. 189 and Elk Rock No. 4667 of the Independent Order of Foresters, will be held at the Oaks amusement park Sunday afternoon, when a special program of entertainment is being arranged by the Foresters in addition to the bill at the park. Deputy Sheriff Leonard took Wednesday morning from word of Lyman Davis, constable at Sandy, that the boys had been seen in that vicinity Tuesday. The Bell boy was recently released from the reform school. Complaints have been lodged against both lads.

Friend Has His Wallet.—John Stinson of 312 Vancouver avenue has appealed to the police to help him locate Ben Davis, an acquaintance, to whom he gave his wallet containing \$45, last night. Stinson reports that while hurrying to catch the Vancouver car, he stopped to write Davis a card and just as the car was pulling out, he thrust the card and the wallet on which he was writing into the hands of the friend. Later he realized his mistake and asked the police to locate his friend. He states that the friend probably has no intention of keeping the wallet, but does not know where to find him.

Feast on Cherries.—Big, ripe, luscious, highly colored, finely flavored, perfectly formed, scientifically grown, Bing cherries were served in generous portions to the guests of the Commercial club today and at the luncheon of the Royal Rosarians. Fugitive Is Caught.—R. V. Mixen, a prisoner at the Linnton rockpile who was sentenced for discharging a firearm in the city, made an effort to escape from the rockpile yesterday morning but within less than an hour after leaving the stockade and just as he was about to take the car for Portland, J. F. Leonard, engineer at the rockpile, discovered the fugitive and returned him to the place. He was placed in the dark cell, where he will be kept on bread and water for several days.

Readers of the Atlantic Monthly will remember Mr. Sharp for the keen, humorous and sympathetic turn he gives to natural subjects, his "Secrets of Skunks" being a classic in that line. Mr. Sharp will give a number of lectures during the season in the east side library for the Audubon society. The public is invited.

Fire Cause \$3000 Damage.—Fire caused from a defective flue, this morning destroyed the home of Frank West, at 409 Willis boulevard, causing about \$3000 damages. The fire department responded to the call but was unable to save much. West is a foreman employed by C. J. Cooke & Co. Fire broke out last night shortly before 10 o'clock in the separating room of the Weber Bros. tannery, doing about \$500 damage.

J., a well known English lecturer, will deliver a lecture on "Our Homes, the Pillars of the States," Sunday evening, at the St. Mary's Cathedral, Fifth and Davis streets. The money derived from the sale of tickets will be used in charity work. Already many people have purchased them and it is expected that the lecture will be well attended.

The elevator fell four floors, it was alleged, breaking the plaintiff's left ankle, and otherwise injuring muscles on the right side.

MUCH WORK AHEAD FOR RAILROAD EMPLOYEES

Thousands of railroad laborers will be employed by the Southern Pacific and its subsidiary, the Portland, Eugene & Eastern railway, this summer. Many will be employed by the company direct, others by contractors to whom sections of work will be let.

Flag & Standifer, railroad contractors of this city, who have done much work for Robert E. Strahorn on the North Coast line, the O-W. R. & N. short line between Spokane and Astoria, have been awarded contracts for grading the Molalla valley branch of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern, and have already put a couple hundred men to work.

New contracts will be let from time to time, and by the middle of summer dirt will be flying in all directions. Flag & Standifer have begun track-laying on the O-W. R. & N. short line, and it is hoped to lay two miles a day until the 103 miles of steel have been stretched. Ballasting of this stretch has also been let to this firm. This will be a big undertaking, as all of the gravel will have to be hauled at least 50 miles, and some a great deal farther.

Most of the gravel will be taken from the Snake river. To complete the short line, two bridges will have to be built, one across the Snake river and the other across the Spokane river. The contracting firm also has the contract to fill a number of bridges of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle line near Spokane, and to make fills and grades for the new O-W. R. & N. terminals at Spokane. The firm is also relaying the Northern Pacific track through Marshall canyon, where it crosses the O-W. R. & N. short line. Guy Standifer has just returned from an inspection tour of the work under way.

FAMOUS CLUB HOUSE BURNED; LOSS \$60,000

(United Press Local Wire.) Santa Barbara, Cal., June 22.—The clubhouse of the famous Santa Barbara Country club at Montecito was burned early today with a loss of \$60,000. A supposed tramp who had severely cut the club's steward during an encounter, set fire to the building in an effort, it is believed, to hide what he believed was a serious crime. The steward will recover. The tramp escaped.
